Change of Student Information

Contact the school office as soon as possible if there is any change of address and/or phone number (home or emergency).

If this move takes you out of the school district:

- make the teacher and the school office aware;
- return all textbooks and library books; and
- notify the bus driver.

Proof of Residency and Re-Enrollment

Each year, BCSC checks the status of where students reside. As part of this process, the school will contact parents/guardians to confirm the address on file. If the address has changed, the parent/guardian must provide proof of the new address. Acceptable documents include a recent utility bill, lease agreement, or medical bill that shows the parents'/guardians' name and current address. In instances where there is a need to verify a student's address, the school may request proof of residency at any time. Please visit www.bcschools.org for additional information.

ACADEMICS

Grading Information

The Growth Model Report Card (GMRC) is the tool teachers use to provide meaningful communication to parents/guardians regarding a student's growth on a set of identified standards. Growth Model Report Cards communicate specific strengths of individual students while also providing targeted areas where improvement is necessary. Parents/Guardians and students can view scores in real time throughout the quarter via Parent Portal.

Homework

School Board Policy C575

Homework is an out-of-school assignment that contributes to the learning process of the student and should fulfill the following objectives:

- to review, remediate, or extend classroom learning; and
- to provide the opportunity for independent learning.

Library

The school library provides recreational and resource books and materials for school stakeholders. It is a privilege and a responsibility to borrow materials. Students are expected to properly care for and promptly return all borrowed materials. Overdue lists are issued periodically. Parents/guardians are responsible for paying for lost or damaged materials. A refund will be given if a book is later found and returned. Please inform your school librarian if there are any materials you prefer your student not to check out.

Field Trips/ School-Sponsored Trips

School Board Policy C500

School trips are extensions of learning. Students may be charged a reasonable cost for trips, but no student will be prevented from participating solely because of an inability to pay. During the trip, all applicable board policies apply to all parties. Parents/Guardians must submit a signed permission form for their student to attend field trips. This form is

available in the school's annual welcome packet. Chaperones can not use private automobiles for transportation on school trips unless previously approved by the principal.

Assessments

School Board Policy po2623

BCSC students participate in statewide achievement tests to assess growth and learning opportunities, including the following:

- **IREAD**, a reading assessment given to 2nd and 3rd graders designed to measure foundational reading skills based on Indiana Academic Standards;
- **ILEARN and ILEARN Checkpoints**, given to 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th graders. ILEARN measures student achievement and growth according to Indiana Academic Standards;
- **Universal Screening for Dyslexia**, administered to all kindergarten, 1st, and 2nd grade students annually to identify those who may be “at some risk” or “at risk” for learning characteristics of dyslexia.

Curricular Materials

School Board Policy po5513

BCSC elementary students are provided with curricular materials at no cost. Textbooks remain the property of the school corporation, and students are responsible for keeping track of these items and returning them in good condition.

Parents/guardians are responsible for covering the cost of materials that are lost, stolen, or damaged. Fees for unreturned, lost, or damaged materials may vary by subject and grade level.

ATTENDANCE

All students are required to attend school during the days and hours it is in session, unless exempted under other provisions of state law. Daily attendance will be appropriately recorded. Repeated unexcused absences may lead to disciplinary actions. Truancy is defined as willful refusal to attend school as required by the compulsory attendance law (*refer to School Board Policy C175*).

Reporting an Absence

School Board Policy C175

The school office should be contacted **EACH** morning a student is absent. A message may be left before and after school hours. A note will be accepted within two (2) days of a student’s return to school. Absences will be considered unexcused without a phone call or note. A doctor’s statement may be required in specific cases. Parents/Guardians can access student attendance records through Parent Portal. Attendance is recorded using the following:

Excused Absences

The following absences shall be considered excused:

- A. Illness verified by a note from the parent/guardian;
- B. Illness verified by a note from a physician;

- C. Recovery from accident;
- D. Professional appointments—Parents/Guardians are encouraged to schedule medical, dental, legal, and other necessary appointments outside of school hours. When appointments are necessary during the school day, the student shall report back to school immediately after the appointment with a signed statement from the doctor, dentist, lawyer, counselor, etc.;
- E. Death in the immediate family or of a relative;
- G. Observation or celebration of a religious holiday;
- H. Military-connected families' absences related to deployment and return; and
- I. Such other good and just cause as deemed necessary **by the superintendent or designee** and/or permitted by law.

Unexcused Absences

An unexcused absence is any absence not covered under the definition of excused absence.

Absences Due to Other Highly Extenuating Circumstances

Parents/Guardians will submit a request for an excused absence due to highly extenuating circumstances and for participation in non-school sponsored state, multi-state, or national competition on the official form obtained from the school office.

BEHAVIOR/ CODE OF CONDUCT

It is the responsibility of students, teachers, and administrators to maintain a learning environment that:

- allows teachers to communicate effectively with all students;
- allows all students in the class the opportunity to learn;
- has consequences that are fair and developmentally appropriate;
- considers the student and the circumstances of the situation;
- allows respect for personal and others' property; and
- promotes exemplary personal standards of courtesy, decency, and honesty.

The principal can assign discipline to students subject to BCSC administrative guidelines and the student's due process right to notice, hearing, and appeal. Teachers and other BCSC employees with authority over students can address student conduct in all situations and all places of learning (*refer to School Board Policy po5500 and po5600*).

Anti-Harassment and Bullying **School Board Policy po5517 and po5517.01**

Students learn best in safe, welcoming, and inclusive environments. All students are expected to demonstrate respect in their words and actions toward peers, staff, and visitors. Language or behaviors that demean or discriminate against individuals or groups are strictly prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, slurs, disparaging images or comments, and symbols of hate. BCSC schools are committed to maintaining a learning environment free from all forms of unlawful harassment. Harassment and bullying are strictly prohibited and will not be tolerated. This prohibition includes physical, verbal, and psychological abuse and when it is on school grounds immediately before or during school hours, immediately after school hours, or at any other time when a school group is using the school; off school grounds at a school activity, function, or event; traveling to or from school or a school activity, function, or event; or using property or equipment provided by the school.

Dress Code

School Board Administrative Guideline ag5511

Please help your student dress in a way that does not:

- present a hazard to the health or safety of the student or others in the school;
- interfere with school work, create disorder, or disrupt the educational program;
- cause excessive wear or damage to BCSC property; or
- prevent the student from achieving his/her educational objectives because of blocked vision or restricted movement.

Student dress will be respected in accordance with the non-discrimination policy outlined on page 15 of this handbook.

Drug Prevention and Testing

School Board Policy C450

All students, regardless of age, who exhibit behavior that leads school authorities to have reasonable suspicion that they are under the influence of a controlled substance may be immediately required to submit to a drug/alcohol test administered at the school's expense. Items in a student's possession may also be tested.

Wireless Communication Device

School Board Policy A301

Elementary students are not permitted to have a wireless device at school for instructional purposes. If a device is brought to school, it should be placed with the homeroom teacher for the duration of the school day.

Care of School Property

School Board Policy po5513

Parents/Guardians are asked to encourage their children to take pride in their school. Students are responsible for keeping all BCSC learning environments clean, safe, and presentable.

Civility and Decorum

School Board Policy A350

BCSC is dedicated to maintaining a supportive learning environment free from disruptive conduct and treating one another with civility, courtesy, and respect during all school operations, programs, and activities, including on school grounds or at school-sponsored events. Respectful dialogue amongst employees, parents/guardians, and other members of the public is welcomed and even encouraged.

Firearms, Weapons, and Destructive Devices

School Board Policy A200

Indiana law prohibits individuals from possessing, storing, making, or using certain dangerous weapons in or on school property. No person may have a firearm or knife in or on school property, unless specific exceptions apply.

Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance

School Board Policy po8801.02 and 8801.01

There shall be a daily observance of a moment of silence and an opportunity for students to voluntarily recite the Pledge of Allegiance.

School Discipline Plan

School Board Policy po5600 and po5610.02

Conduct is closely related to learning, and an effective instructional program requires an orderly school environment that reflects students' behavior. The principal may discipline students to improve and/or to modify behavior. Detention, in-school suspension, suspension, and/or expulsion can all be administered to create a positive learning environment for all. Parents/guardians will be notified if the above are administered to a student.

Seclusion and Restraints with Students

School Board Policy po5630.01

Student seclusion and restraint may be used only for a short period of time or until the imminent risk of injury has passed.

SCHOOL SAFETY

The safety of students and staff is a priority. Each school has developed a comprehensive plan for response to emergency situations. The complete emergency response document is available for parents/guardians' review in the school office. In the event of an emergency, including evacuation without return to the building, the parents/guardians receiving site will be shared with families via ParentSquare.

Student Search and Seizure

School Board Policy C550

We recognize the obligation to balance the privacy rights of our students with the responsibility to provide students, faculty, staff, and authorized visitors with a safe, hygienic, and alcohol/drug-free learning environment.

Searches of students shall be permitted:

1. On school grounds immediately before or during school hours, immediately after school hours, or at any other time when a school group is using the school;
2. Off school grounds at a school activity, function, or event; or
3. Traveling to or from school or a school activity, function, or event.

Security & Visitors

A safe and secure learning environment is the responsibility of both the students and the staff. For safety purposes, all exterior doors will remain locked during the school day except for the main entrance doors, which is where all guests should enter. BCSC schools utilize the SafeVisitor management software. Visitors must provide a valid driver's license or photo ID to be vetted in the SafeVisitor system. Visitor badges must be worn at all times.

- Parents/guardians/visitors wishing to visit the school should make arrangements in advance with the child's teacher.
- Children not enrolled in the school will not be permitted to spend any portion of the school day in the building unless the principal and teacher have approved it.
- All visitors are expected to dress appropriately (follow the student dress code) when visiting the school and/or accompanying a class on a field trip.
- BCSC welcomes parents and guardians for lunch. After completing the check-in process, visitors will be directed to follow the school's lunch visitor expectations and procedures.
- Only students enrolled in each school may play on the playground during school hours. Parents/Guardians and visitors are not to go to recess with their children for the safety and security of all.

Emergency Drills

Drills are held regularly to help ensure the safety of the students. These drills include fire, tornado, earthquake, and "Run, Hide, Fight."

Volunteers/Field Trip Chaperones

All volunteers at BCSC must obtain a criminal history check. This includes volunteers in the classroom and for field trip chaperones. Forms are available in the office at no cost to the volunteer and on the BCSC website. The completed background check is valid for the entire school year and must be renewed annually.

Criminal Organizations and Criminal Organization Activity

School Board Policy po5840

BCSC prohibits criminal organization activity and similar destructive or illegal group behavior on school corporation property, school buses, and at school-sponsored functions.

SERVICES

Food Services

Meal Assistance

Meal assistance (breakfast and lunch) is available to all BCSC students who meet income qualifications. An application for meal assistance is given to each student at the start of each school year. Students are considered 'paid students' and will be charged full-price meals until the meal assistance applications have been processed and approved. Due to the large number of students attending BCSC schools, it may be a few weeks before all applications are processed.

It is recommended each student **start the school year with two (2) weeks of lunch money in their account** to avoid charges and to allow time for applications to be processed and approved. Meal assistance forms are effective for one school year. Families must reapply each school year for meal assistance. **Please fill out one application per household**.

Payment Options

Debit System

All BCSC cafeterias utilize a pre-pay/debit system designed to process student purchases in an efficient, confidential manner and to reduce the amount of cash on hand at each location. The system operates on a pre-pay basis, so students can deposit funds in advance of use. BCSC may charge a processing fee to recoup costs from a third-party processing company. At the end of each school year, the account balance is transferred to the student's account for the following year. Deposits can be made at the school cafeteria by cash, online at MySchoolBucks.com, or a personal check made payable to the school cafeteria. Please indicate your child's name and or student identification number on the check.

Charges

Due to the nature of this pre-payment/debit program, charging school meals is discouraged. Students may not carry a significant negative lunch balance (more than \$20.00). Elementary students will be sent home written notices of any outstanding negative balances in the meal account at a minimum weekly until the balance is paid in full. Students with a negative balance will not be permitted to purchase à la carte items. If food service staff suspect that a student may be abusing this policy, a written notice will be provided to the parent/guardian. If a student repeatedly comes to school with no lunch and no money, the food service staff must report this to the principal. All accounts must be settled prior to the end of the school year. Negative

balances of more than \$25.00 not paid in full in the 15 days prior to the end of the school year will force the Corporation to take action to collect unpaid funds by means of collection agencies, small claims courts, or any legal method deemed necessary. Students who graduate or withdraw from the corporation and have \$5.00 or more left in their lunch/meal food service account will be notified by food services by the last day of school and given the option to transfer the funds to another student or to receive a refund. If no response is received within 90 days, the student's lunch /meal account will close, and the funds will no longer be available.

Vegetarian Options

BCSC Food Service has a variety of vegetarian options for students. Vegetarian options are marked with a "V" on the menu. Please contact your cafeteria manager for additional options.

Treats at School

For the safety and welfare of all children, treats for birthdays brought to school must be store-purchased and individually wrapped. Please contact your child's teacher before sending any treats to school.

The Food Services Department has birthday party and pizza party packages available should you want to use them. You may call the school cafeteria for details.

Health & Wellness

School Board Policy C525

A nurse is available to all students during the school day for first aid and emergency care and to assist in managing care for chronic health conditions. Please update the school nurse during the school year if your child has any health changes. If your child is diagnosed with a communicable disease such as chicken pox, please notify the school nurse as soon as possible.

Illness

Students experiencing illnesses at school notify the teacher. The nurse then assesses the student. If the student is too ill to remain in the classroom, the parents/guardians are called and expected to arrange for the child's care.

Criteria for sending a student home or when to keep the student at home:

- Temperature of 100 degrees or more
- Vomiting and/or diarrhea
- Inflamed eye with drainage
- Severe pain
- Persistent cough
- Head Lice (Live bugs)
- Open, draining sores

Students can return to school when fever-free for 24 hours without medication or when vomiting/diarrhea has stopped. A student who develops reddened eyes with thick, yellow drainage may return after being seen by a physician and when eyes are clear after 24 hours, with a note from the physician.

Immunizations

Indiana law and BCSC policy require written documentation of immunizations from a physician or the Health Department for all students. A complete list of all school immunization requirements can be found on the BCSC website under Health Services. Religious or medical exemptions must be renewed every year.

Lice

Parents/Guardians will be notified if a student is found to have live lice. The student will be sent home for treatment. Bus transportation is not available in this situation. Head lice are not a sign of poor hygiene and do not transmit disease.

Medication

To protect the health and welfare of children, Indiana law requires that schools observe certain safeguards when administering medication to pupils. All medication must be registered and stored in the nurse's office. If the nurse is to administer medicine to a student, the following procedures will be observed:

1. Written permission from parents/guardians is required for any over-the-counter medication to be given at school.
2. Prescription or non-prescription medications must be renewed each school year.
3. Medication should be in the original and properly labeled container.
4. All medications must be registered and stored in the nurse's office. Any medications not picked up at the end of the school year will be destroyed.
5. Medications cannot be transported on the bus. Please drop them off at the nurse's office.
6. A physician order is required for a student to self-carry medication.

Cough drops are not permitted in elementary school due to the potential risk of choking.

Screenings

The state-required health screenings are listed below. Parents/Guardians are notified by letter of the hearing and vision failures for the student to receive further medical assistance. If you do not wish to have your student screened, written notification must be provided to the school nurse.

Required Screenings:

Hearing Screening (Grades 1, 4)
Vision Screening (Grades 1, 3, 5)

Administered by:

School Nurse/Speech/Hearing Therapist
School Nurse/Optometrists

Recommended Screening: (for which a form will be sent home for parent/guardian(s) permission)

Dental Screening (Grades 2, 5) Administered by a Dental Hygienist from the Health Department

Special Medical Conditions

Students with chronic health conditions such as asthma, allergies, diabetes, seizures, etc. should notify the nurse each year at the beginning of school. The nurse, parents/guardians, and student should meet to create an individualized health plan for the school year.

Nutrition

School Board Policy po8510

The Child Nutrition & WIC Reauthorization Act of 2004 mandates that all school corporations with a Federally Funded Meal Program develop and implement wellness policies that address nutrition and physical activity. Good nutrition and regular physical activity affect the health and well-being of students. Furthermore, research suggests that there is a positive correlation between a student's health and well-being and his/her ability to learn. Moreover, schools can play an important role in the development process by which students establish their health

and nutrition habits by providing nutritious meals and snacks through the schools' meal programs, by supporting the development of good eating habits, and by promoting increased physical activity both in and out of school.

Physical Activity and Physical Education

School Board Policy po8510

BCSC supports the health and well-being of students by promoting physical activity through physical education, recess and other physical activity breaks; before- and after-school activities; and walking and bicycling to school.

School Counselor

All BCSC schools have a counselor to help students achieve their highest mental, emotional, and social growth. A student may participate in individual, small group, or classroom activities. The school counselor collaborates with students, parents/guardians, staff members, and community agencies to assist students in achieving personal and school goals. Students and parents/guardians are encouraged to contact the school counselor to discuss issues affecting student performance. A parent/guardian will be notified if a staff member identifies the need for ongoing counseling services for a student.

Student Rights, Privacy, & Equal Access

McKinney-Vento Act

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act is a federal law that provides important educational rights and services to PreK-12 children and youth experiencing homelessness. Please contact the principal for assistance with housing needs. (*refer to federal law 42 U.S.C. § 11431 et seq*).

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents/guardians and students certain rights to the student's education records. These rights can be found on the U.S. Department of Education website, including the right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the school district to comply with the requirements of FERPA. Student Records

School Board Administrative Guideline ag8330

The student record is the legal record for each student who is or has attended schools within BCSC. BCSC shall collect, maintain, and use only information necessary for legally mandated school corporation functions.

Parent and Family Engagement (ESSA)

School Board Policy po2281

BCSC recognizes that each student's education is a responsibility shared by the school and the family. Meaningful family support is critical if a student is to achieve his/her potential. Parent/Guardian communication is important and should start with the teacher, with conferences encouraged as a means to facilitate this dialogue. The Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), as updated by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) of 2015, defines "parent" to include a legal guardian or any individual acting in loco parentis (such as a grandparent, stepparent, or other person with legal responsibility for the child's well-being).

Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment (PPRA)

The Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment (PPRA) applies to the programs and activities of a state education agency (SEA), local education agency (LEA), or other recipient of funds under any program funded by the U.S. Department of Education. It governs the administration to students of a survey, analysis, or evaluation that concerns one or more of the following eight (8) protected areas:

1. political affiliations or beliefs of the student or the student's parents/guardians;
2. mental or psychological problems of the student or the student's family;
3. sex behavior or attitudes;
4. illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior;
5. critical appraisals of other individuals with whom respondents have close family relationships;
6. legally recognized privileged or analogous relationships, such as those of lawyers, physicians, and ministers;
7. religious practices, affiliations, or beliefs of the student or student's parents/guardians; or
8. income (other than that required by law to determine eligibility for participation in a program or for receiving financial assistance under such program).
9. PPRA also concerns marketing surveys and other areas of student privacy, parental access to information, and the administration of certain physical examinations to minors. The rights under PPRA transfer from the parents/guardians to a student who is eighteen (18) years old or an emancipated minor under state law.

Section 504/ADA Prohibition Against Discrimination Based on Disability

School Board Policy po2260.01

No discrimination will be knowingly permitted against any individual with a disability solely based on that disability in any of BCSC's programs, activities, policies, and/or practices.

Non-Discrimination and Access to Equal Educational Opportunity

School Board Policy po2260

BCSC does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, age (except as authorized by law), religion, military status, ancestry, or genetic information (collectively, "Protected Classes") in its educational programs or activities.

TRANSPORTATION

Bus Schedules

Check the BCSC website for the latest bus information: www.bcscschools.org. Inclement weather, such as snow, icy roads, or other Local Weather Alerts, may delay all buses. When this is the case, you can expect delays on most routes. *Should your bus run later than its regularly scheduled time, please view the Transportation link for delay information on the BCSC website: www.bcscschools.org.* If the reason for the delay is due to a serious problem while your child is on the bus, you will receive a notification.

Bus Riding Policy

Children may be required to walk a reasonable distance to a bus stop. Please note, parents/guardians are responsible for the safety of your child while going to or from the bus stop and while waiting for the school bus. Stops will be chosen with concern for safety and numbers. Bus drivers will pick up/drop off only at scheduled assigned stops. Students will ride only on assigned buses unless prior authorization has been granted.

Bus Expectations

Boarding the Bus:

- Arrive at the bus stop five (5) minutes before the bus arrives.
- For your child's safety, refrain from chasing a moving bus.
- Wait for the bus to come to a complete stop.
- Hands to self when boarding the bus.
- Backpack on back or carry on.
- Enter one (1) student at a time.
- If seats are assigned, go to the assigned seat.
- Fasten the seat belt if one is provided and remain in seat when the bus is in motion.

Riding the Bus:

- Back to back, seat to seat,
- Feet to floor, and out of the aisle.
- Backpack in your lap or in front of you in your space.
- Hands to self and away from equipment on the bus.

When riding the bus please remember:

- Use a reasonable conversation voice.
- Hands to self.
- Toys, pencils/pens, or other items, should stay in your backpack.
- Treat each other with respect.

Unloading the Bus:

- Be prepared for your stop: backpack/items ready to go.
- Wait until the bus stops completely and the door opens.
- Exit single file.
- Walk away from the bus.
- Wait for the bus driver's point in motion to cross in front of the bus, staying ten (10) feet away from the bus in the "danger zone".

Safety when riding the bus:

- Tell the bus driver of any danger or emergency.
- Ask to open or close a window.
- Language should be clean and free of profanity.
- Head, arms, or any object must stay inside the bus.
- Place any trash in the bus trash can before unloading.
- Avoid bringing food, drinks, and/or gum on the bus. Eating, drinking, or chewing gum is not permitted for the safety of all students.
- Be kind and courteous to other riders and the bus driver.
- Refrain from using scents such as perfumes and hand sanitizers due to existing health conditions (allergies, asthma) of students and transportation staff.
- The bus driver is trained to take care of emergency situations. Students need to stay seated and remain calm.
- Forbidden to be transported on a school bus: pets, alcoholic beverages, drugs, tobacco, electronic cigarettes, flammable items, ammunition, explosives, firearms, knives, or any other dangerous materials or objects.

Misbehavior on the Bus

School bus transportation is a privilege and not a right. The bus driver is the sole authority on the bus while students are being transported. In the event a disciplinary action needs to be taken due to misbehavior on the bus, please note the following:

- The severity of the offense may overrule the following disciplinary action.
- Documentation will be sent home with the student for parents'/guardians' signature. This allows transportation and schools to have up-to-date information in a timely manner. The sheet with the parent/guardian signature is the student's pass to get back on the bus. If the student fails to return his discipline form, the driver will assess the situation and may elect to transport the student to school noting there will be future consequences.
- Anytime there is direct physical contact such as fighting or a serious threat to safety, we may need to deviate from the norm. If there is reason for deviating from the normal procedure, the principal or designee will need to be notified. If they are unavailable, then please notify the Transportation Manager.
- Parents/Guardians should note that any damage by their child to the school bus, personal or public property is the parent's/guardian's responsibility per BCSC School Board Policy *po8600*.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Corporation-Sponsored Clubs & Activities School Board Policy po2430

The purpose of curricular-related activities shall be to enable students to explore a wider range of individual interests that may be available in BCSC's courses of study. Such activities, as well as extra-curricular or activities not directly related to courses of study, may be conducted on or off school premises by clubs, associations, and organizations of students sponsored by the board, and directed by a staff advisor.

Students shall be fully informed of the curricular-related and extra-curricular activities available to them and of the eligibility standards established for participation in these activities. Corporation-sponsored activities shall be available to all students who elect to participate, receive consent from a parent/guardian, and meet eligibility standards.

COMMUNICATION

Emergency School Closings

Parents/Guardians will receive a message via ParentSquare if there is an early release, school delay, or school closing. Check the BCSC website at <https://www.bcscschools.org/> for information.

For the safety of students during inclement weather, schools may be closed, dismissed early, or have a two-hour delay in starting. Families should be prepared for any of these situations. Students and staff must know the alternative plan for students in case of an emergency school closing. Inclement weather such as snow, icy roads, or other Local Weather Alerts may delay buses. When this is the case, you can expect delays on most routes. If the delay is due to a serious problem while students are on the bus, parents/guardians will receive a notification.

Parent Square

ParentSquare is the one central tool for communication, including newsletters, eAlerts, and messages to BCSC families. It provides quick translation for families on content and messages. ParentSquare lets users set notification preferences (app, phone, email, etc.) so that families and staff can receive messages how they prefer. ParentSquare supports safety for everyone by archiving messages to and from users. Families, teachers, and administrators can access ParentSquare via www.parentsquare.com, or the phone app.

Parent Portal

All BCSC parents/guardians can access student grades and progress reports by registering with Parent Portal. Utilize the information at the following link to register: [Parent Portal Registration Information](#).

Canvas

Canvas is BCSC's web-based Learning Management System. Each student and teacher has access to this resource. Students can log in to their accounts with any internet connection and device inside and outside school. Canvas will allow students to access and interact with learning resources. To access the site, students must sign into their BCSC Google accounts.

FACILITIES

Animals on School Corporation Property

School Board Policy po8390

Animals, unless authorized service animals, are only permitted on school grounds with permission from the principal.

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)

In accordance with the US EPA's AHERA Standard (*ref: 40 CFR 763.80*), all information concerning asbestos-containing materials in the schools is available for review and copying by students, staff, and guardians during regular business hours.

Indoor Air Quality

School Board Policy po8450

Pest Control and Use of Pesticides

School Board Policy po8432

Prior to the application of pesticides within any building or on school grounds, the parents/guardians who have registered for prior notice shall receive notification to be received no later than two (2) school days before the application unless an emergency is declared.

No Tobacco

School Board Policy A250

BCSC prohibits the use of tobacco, e-cigarettes or “vaping,” in any building owned or leased by the school corporation, on corporation property, or in corporation-owned or operated vehicles.

Vehicles Idling

School Board Policy po8615, G225, and Administrative Guideline ag8615

Drivers of vehicles are to turn off the engine if the vehicle is to be stopped for more than five (5) minutes unless under the exceptions portion of this policy.

TECHNOLOGY USE

Purpose

BCSC teachers and students use technology and internet-based tools in their classrooms on a regular basis to support the student universally designed learning environment and prepare students to engage in the rapidly changing world. These

technologies improve student communication and collaboration skills, provide an authentic audience, and extend learning beyond the classroom walls while building digital citizenship skills. Student access to technology requires responsible, courteous, efficient, and legal use. Our goal in providing access to these resources is to enhance learning experiences and to educate students in responsible and appropriate use. It is important that students and parents recognize that the information posted on the internet is public, permanent, and needs to be appropriate.

BCSC Student Technology

BCSC Students will receive the following:

- Chromebook
 - Every 1st, 5th, and 9th-grade student will receive a new device that will be issued to them for four (4) years
 - All students will be issued a compatible charger
 - All Chromebooks will have a protective shell
- Google Accounts
 - All students have access to the Google Workspace
 - Students in 7th-12th grade will receive Gmail accounts

Using Technology

- I will only use my device when my teacher instructs me or when appropriate.
- I will put my device away when instructed.
- I will take care of my device and keep it charged.
- I will only install apps that are approved by my teacher.

Digital Responsibility

- I will be a good cyber-friend by being honest, kind, and respectful when I communicate using my device.
- I will not take or post pictures or videos of someone without their permission.
- I will only share appropriate content with others.
- I will keep personal information private (either my own or another student's), including references to where I live, details about my family or friends (including names), my age, birthday, home address, or telephone number when I am using technology.
- I will only personate myself when writing, recording, etc. while using technology.
- I will tell my teacher or a trusted adult if I am contacted online by someone I do not know.
- I will follow teachers'/building/district PBIS expectations and instructions when using technology.
- I will report and/or help prevent any bullying, abuse, or harm to others.
- I will tell an adult if I read, see, or access something inappropriate, or if I witness inappropriate use of technology.
- I will follow all filters and security measures.
- I will keep my passwords private, except with my teacher or parents/guardians (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act or FERPA).
- I will follow copyright laws.

Technology Concerns

- When using technology, I will strive to be a responsible digital citizen. If I make a choice that is not in line with being a responsible digital citizen, I will talk to a teacher or trusted adult who will help me figure out how to make it right.

- I will immediately stop and tell a teacher or trusted adult at school if anything happens on my device or on the internet that does not seem right or that makes me feel uncomfortable.
- If something on my device breaks or does not work correctly, I will tell my teacher or a trusted adult right away.

I understand that using any school technology or network is a privilege I must earn through consistent responsible use identified in this agreement. I also understand that privileges may be removed or revoked for any length of time and that I may face additional consequences for irresponsible use.

Suggested Device Care Guidance

- Charge your device every night with the charger that was issued with the Chromebook
- Clean the screen with a microfiber cloth
- If you use a cleaning spray, spray it on the cleaning cloth and not the device
- Keep the device away from food or drinks
- Make sure nothing is stacked on top of or placed in between the device
- Store the device in climate-controlled spaces
- Remove headphones carefully when you finish using them

COMPLAINTS AND CONCERNS

Resolving Concerns and Complaints

School Board Policy po9130

Students and parents/guardians are encouraged to resolve concerns, questions, or complaints by addressing them at the lowest appropriate level. The following steps should be followed **in order**, unless the situation requires immediate escalation:

1. Speak directly with the person most closely involved.
2. If the issue is not resolved, contact the Building Principal.
3. If additional support is needed, submit a written concern to the Superintendent.
4. If the matter remains unresolved, submit a written request for a hearing to the School Board.

Special Situations

- **Serious concerns**, such as safety-related issues, may be taken directly to the Principal or Superintendent.
- **Concerns regarding library or instructional materials** follow a separate, formal review process.
- **Concerns about the Superintendent** should be directed to the School Board.

SIGNATURES

All required signature pages for student releases and acknowledgments will be included in their school's annual welcome packet, including a statement that students and families have received and reviewed this student handbook. All required signature pages should be reviewed, signed, and returned by the designated deadline.
