CCHS GRADUATES 192; SENIOR CLASS RECEIVES MORE THAN \$3.1 MILLION IN SCHOLARSHIPS

The projected inclement weather held off.

When the wind gusts began to blow their mortarboards, the senior class held on.

And by the end of Friday night's graduation ceremony, Crockett County High School had 192 new alumni.

Festivities originally scheduled for 7 p.m. were moved ahead one hour by a day-long threat of storms, but nothing more than occasional bursts of wind hampered a ceremony which featured addresses by valedictorian Ashley Boone and salutatorian Ella Cate Haynes; songs from Rachel Coleman's choir, including a lively version of "I've Had the Time of My Life"; the presentation of graduates by Dawn Byrum, Crockett's 6-12 Supervisor of Instruction; and the presentation of diplomas and a short challenge by Director of Schools P. A. Pratt.

Not to be forgotten on the muggy evening was the announcement by Principal Jerrod Shelton that the CCHS class of 2025 had accumulated more than \$3.1 million in scholarships, including more than \$1 million from TN Ready and \$660,000 from the Hope Lottery funding.


Shelton saluted graduates who were Cavalier Scholars; Academic Excellence achievers; Star Students; Beta Club members; National Technical Honor Society members; Graduates with Distinction; Honors students; Military Dependents; Ready graduates; and students who would be entering military service.

Crockett's band, directed by Trevor Mayhall, performed "Pomp and Circumstance," the National Anthem, and the Alma Mater during the course of the ceremony. George Goldsby offered the senior class prayer, and class vice-president Maddie Moore initiated the closing tossing of the caps.




