The Opening Chapters

Our story began with Encina School before the start of the 20th century. From the beginning, our aim was broader than helping children become capable students — our goal was to help them build a solid foundation in life. That meant that in addition to providing academic instruction at the schoolhouse, we also provided hot meals and showers to our 20 students, who came mostly from families employed by the cannery and local farms.

When the community got so big it outgrew our first — and then our second — school, the District created a plan to build three more schools. District leaders were intentional in designing the schools to welcome and accommodate guests from the community at large, in addition to students and their families.





True to Character

Community involvement remains a hallmark of our operations today, and community members rightly have a sense of ownership and pride in the accomplishments of their neighborhood schools.

Our community members, including parents, families, neighbors, and volunteers from corporations, service organizations, and other community groups, generously give their time to work with and for our children. On any given day, one or more of our 35+ partner organizations deliver learning activities for our students on our campuses as well as out in the community.

In tandem with our solid financial planning and management, this community support gives us stability despite economic fluctuations and other threats to school funding. That means consistent, quality learning for the students we serve, thanks to our caring community!

Plot Developments

Our values have remained constant, while the District itself has changed substantially! Now our student population numbers more than 6,600, and the biggest employers in the city are high-tech companies.

We have incorporated technology, new data-informed practices, and innovative curriculum into our proven instructional methods. For example, while our District has always aimed to meet the needs of the whole child, now we have integrated explicit social-emotional learning into everything we do. While earlier generations of students sat at desks arranged in neat rows facing the teacher, now children move around the classroom, collaborating on projects, discussing questions in small groups, and presenting their findings using multimedia tools. Today, our teachers include more hands-on and project-based learning in their curricula.

And with the growing awareness of the diverse ways children learn, for years our teachers have considered how each student learns best and differentiated instruction to meet every child's needs.





New Chapters, New Choices

In addition to providing caring instruction and rich, challenging curriculum at all SSD schools, several of our schools have created special initiatives that offer distinctive ways to meet the needs of children and families. These Programs of Choice focus on diverse interests — science, dual-language immersion, parent participation, leadership, technology with emotional intelligence, and innovative instructional strategies from Stanford University. These options and the interactive lessons offered by every neighborhood school spur children to connect deeply with their studies, uncover their passions, and transform before our eyes into 21st-century learners!
