Dear Friends,



Bishop 2.0: New Den for Bishop Bobcats

Construction of Bishop Elementary School's new campus — the largest capital facility project ever undertaken by the Sunnyvale School District — has begun! We have completed demolition and relocated programs and classes in preparation for the next phase of the project, which is scheduled to begin in late April. In the next phase, we will construct new classrooms, including the district's first two-story classroom building, as well as a new media center and a new multi-use building.

Bishop's new and improved learning environment is just one example of how our community is supporting student success. Through the passage of local bond measures, we have been able to make technology improvements at every one of our schools and increase energy efficiency district-wide, as well.



San Miguel's Winning Approach

One-hundred percent of San Miguel students know that school leaders believe in them, according to recent survey results. That sentiment is embodied in the school's Community School Model, which was recently honored with a 2017 Glenn W. Hoffmann Award.

To create its award-winning Community School Model, San Miguel has partnered with more than 35 organizations who deliver programs and services on-site. All are designed to improve student and family access to the kind of opportunities that lead to increased wellness, social-emotional development, and academic growth.

For 33 years, the Santa Clara County School Boards Association has awarded the Hoffmann to school programs that significantly impact student success. Previous awardees in the District include Cherry Chase's Stretchers Art program, Columbia Middle School's FLEX program, Cumberland's project-based learning program, and Fairwood's parent participation program.

Literacy Soars for Ellis Eagles

In addition to teaching students essential skills and strategies for reading, Ellis Elementary School has adopted the Reader's Workshop, an approach to reading instruction that is designed to foster a love of reading, leading to a love of learning. The Common Core-aligned curriculum utilizes daily reading and guided interactions and conferences with peers and classroom teachers. The curriculum is being used in all of Ellis School's K-5 classrooms this year and has been showing inspiring results!

Reader's Workshop engages students and stimulates high levels of thinking about texts by encouraging students to select their own "just right" books, write daily about their reading, collaborate with peers, and reflect on themselves as readers. Reader's Workshop also provides materials for parents and teachers to help them learn the best way to develop young readers.





Our Kids Our Community

Children can't learn when they are hungry, and children whose families struggle to provide adequate nutrition lose academic ground over the summer. That's why, five years ago, the Sunnyvale School District, Sunnyvale Rotary Club, and Sunnyvale Community Services established the annual Our Kids Our Community fundraiser, which fights childhood hunger by providing thousands of meals each summer.

Our Kids Our Community also supports a program that provides food to more than 140 low-income families on weekends when school meal programs are unavailable, as well as Sunnyvale Community Services' back-to-school program that provides new shoes, backpacks, and school supplies to children in need.

Girls Design Bright Futures

In the Sunnyvale Library's Make-HER program, Columbia Middle School girls are using their hands and their creativity to build their STEM skills.

Students in the Make-HER program invent and design projects such as personal charms, magic wands and stop-motion animation videos, and use high-tech equipment like 3D printers to create their inventions. The girls document each step of their designs in their maker journals, and learn about engineering, circuit design, wearable technology, electrical systems and animation along the way.

A group of women who work with technology — dubbed #LadyMakers — formulate the Make-HER program workshops.

Make-HER was recently awarded a Microsoft/KCI Innovation Award, which honors innovative teacher-student collaboratives that fully integrate technology and benefit the Silicon Valley educational community.
