LGBTQ+ Pride Month

Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer (LGBTQ) Pride Month is currently celebrated each year in the month of June to honor the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in Manhattan. The Stonewall Uprising was a tipping point for the Gay Liberation Movement in the United States. In the United States, the last Sunday in June was initially celebrated as "Gay Pride Day," but the actual day was flexible. In major cities across the nation, the "day" soon grew to encompass a month-long series of events. Today, celebrations include pride parades, picnics, parties, workshops, symposia and concerts, and LGBTQ Pride Month events that attract millions of participants around the world. Memorials are held during this month for those members of the community who have been lost to hate crimes or HIV/AIDS. The purpose of the commemorative month is to recognize the impact that lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender individuals have had on history locally, nationally, and internationally.

NATIONAL CARIBBEAN-AMERICAN MONTH

Every June, we celebrate Caribbean-American Heritage Month, recognizing the great historical contributions of various peoples whose roots can be traced to the countries that make up the Caribbean subregion of the Americas. After the success of an advocacy campaign launched in 2004, Caribbean-American Heritage Month was recognized for the first time on a federal level on June 5, 2006, when then-President George W. Bush issued a presidential proclamation to establish the month of June as a time to “celebrate the great contributions of Caribbean-Americans to the fabric of our Nation, and to pay tribute to the common culture and bonds of friendship that unite the United States and the Caribbean countries.”

Tourette's Awareness Month

Tourette's syndrome is an inherited neurological illness characterized by many physical tics and at least one phonic tic that manifests in infancy or adolescence. Jean-Martin Charcot was awarded the term on behalf of his intern, Georges Albert Édouard Brutus Gilles de la Tourette, a French physician and neurologist who published a report on nine patients with Tourette's in 1885. Tourette's was first identified as a neurological illness in 1972, but since the 1990s, a more neutral perspective of the disorder has emerged in which biological vulnerability and bad environmental experiences combine.

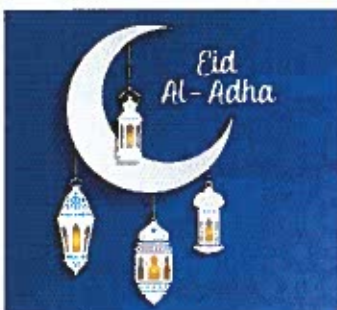

SHAVUOT

June 1-3 – Shavuot

Shavuot (also pronounced Shavuot) is a two-day Jewish holiday that commemorates the date when God gave the Torah to the Jewish people at Mount Sinai over 3,000 years ago. Preceded by 49 days of counting in eager anticipation, Shavuot is celebrated through desisting from work, candle-lit dinners, staying up all night to study the Torah, listening to the reading of the Ten Commandments in the synagogue, enjoying dairy foods and other festivities.

In July 2021, the UN General Assembly highlighted global concerns over "the exponential spread and proliferation of hate speech" around the world and adopted a [resolution](#) on "promoting inter-religious and intercultural dialogue and tolerance in countering hate speech". The resolution recognizes the need to counter discrimination, xenophobia and hate speech and calls on all relevant actors, including States, to increase their efforts to address this phenomenon, in line with international human rights law.

June 26 – Islamic New Year

The Islamic New Year, also known as the Arabic New Year or Hijri New Year, is the first day of Muharram, the first month in the Islamic calendar. The first year of this calendar began in Gregorian CE 622 when the Prophet Muhammad emigrated from Mecca to Medina with his companions. In the Islamic calendar, days begin at sunset. The event falls on a different day every year because the Islamic year is 11 to 12 days shorter. As rituals and prayers mark the occasion, Muharram is known as the month of remembrance and is sacred to Muslims across the world.
