Rhetorical Appeal

Ethos

Ethos is about credibility and trustworthiness. It involves establishing authority on a subject.

Example: A doctor giving a speech about the importance of vaccinations. The audience is likely to trust the doctor's advice because of their medical expertise.

Pathos

Logos involves using logical reasoning, facts, and statistics to persuade an audience.

Example: A campaign promoting recycling may include statistics like "Recycling one ton of paper saves 17 trees, 7,000 gallons of water, and 4,100 kilowatts of electricity." This logical approach aims to convince people to recycle based on facts.

Logos

Pathos appeals to the audience's emotions, aiming to elicit feelings to persuade.

Example: A commercial showing sad images of abandoned animals while encouraging viewers to adopt pets from shelters. This emotional approach tugs at the heartstrings to motivate people to act.
