Crossing the Bar



Special thanks to the **Kiwanis Club** for making these moments possible. Your generosity helps spark a love of reading that will last a lifetime.












8th-grade STEAM Studio students at St. Helens Middle School put their creativity and critical thinking skills to the test as they showcased toy and game designs they developed in class.


