Graduation Requirements

In order to graduate from Willard High School with a General Diploma, a student must have earned the minimum units of credit listed in the table below:

In addition to the program of study for graduation, a student must pass proficiency exams concerning American History and the Missouri and United States Constitutions to qualify for graduation from the district. The constitution requirements will be completed in the Government & Politics and class.

No student shall graduate without having successfully completed a course of instruction of at least one year in length on the institutions, branches, and functions of the government of the state of Missouri, including local governments; the United States government, and the electoral process.

WHS graduates will complete an exit test defined by the state of Missouri as one of the following: ACT, SAT, Workkeys, Accuplacer or ASVAB. *ACT and ASVAB can be taken on WHS campus.*

Schedule Changes

Due to the amount of planning and coordination that goes into making the master schedule based on student course requests, and staffing availability, schedule changes are not permitted. Students who have chosen to not turn in scheduling paperwork by the required date are automatically scheduled by their counselor and no schedule changes will be permitted. Certain changes will only be made on a case by case basis and only after consulting with the student's counselor then referred to an administrator before it is determined that the change is necessary. Appeal forms are available in the Counseling Office.

Honors Diploma

A diploma with the designation "Honors" will be awarded to students with outstanding high school records in their course of study. The Honors Diploma will be awarded to students meeting the following minimum standards:

- 3.5 GPA
- Recognition as a good citizen with no ISS or OSS (may be appealed to administration)
- Completion of 27 units of credit with 4th math and 4th science

Laude Program Honors

Students achieving the following academic status in final grade point average based on the four years in high school will be recognized as:

Summa Cum Laude – 4.1 and above

Magna Cum Laude – 3.95 – 4.09

Cum Laude – 3.75 – 3.94

College Preparatory Recommendations

Each college or university has their own entrance requirements. Students and parents should consult the website or an admissions counselor for specific details. In addition to the graduation requirements, WHS also recommends the following for students planning to attend a four year college or university after graduation:

- A fourth mathematics credit
- A fourth science credit
- Two additional credits from: foreign language, English, social studies, math or science
- A GPA of 3.5 or higher
- An ACT score of 24 or higher

Graduation with A+ Status

Graduation with A+ status may qualify students for state funds to attend a two-year community college or technical school. This funding opportunity remains available for four years following high school graduation. In addition, some four-year colleges offer competitive scholarships to A+ graduates. A+ qualification requires participation in and completion of the A+ program requirements by graduation. Please see the A+ agreement for a list of requirements. (This is a state supported and funded program and is subject to state budget appropriations.)

Classification by Credits

Students must have earned at least the following credits for grade level classification by the beginning of each school year. Credits will be reviewed in August for students who had been previously reclassified to determine if their grade level should change. **Activities that require a student to be a junior or senior will not be open to students not classified as such.**

Sophomore	6 credits
Junior	12 credits
Senior	17 credits

Academic Letter

Willard High School students who earn grades that calculate to an A- grade point average (unweighted 3.667 on a 4.0 scale) or above both semesters of any given year shall be awarded the Academic Letter.

ACT and SAT Information

Four year colleges and universities may require the ACT or SAT (college entrance exams) before students can be accepted to college. Many colleges use the results for placement in courses as well as for admission and scholarship purposes.

Test dates for the ACT are in September, October, December, February, April, and June (www.act.org). Stop by the counseling center for additional details. Juniors and seniors who qualify for free or reduced lunches may receive 4 fee waivers for the ACT or SAT.

MSHSAA Academic Activities Eligibility

To be eligible to participate in activities sanctioned by the Missouri State High School Activities Association, Willard students must be enrolled in and pass six courses (3.0 credits) each semester, of which at least 2.5 must be in seated classes.

NCAA and NAIA Academic Eligibility Requirement

The website for students to access information on how student-athletes can comply with NCAA bylaws in order to compete in intercollegiate athletics is www.eligibilitycenter.org. The website for NAIA information is www.playnaia.org. These websites include information on what high school students need to do to be eligible to compete their first year in college, as well as guidelines that coaches and prospects must follow during the recruiting process. While counselors and coaches can assist with the process, it is ultimately the responsibility of students and parents to ensure all requirements are met. In addition, the student/parent is responsible for the cost of registration (please see your counselor if you feel you may qualify for a fee waiver). Courses are notated with the ♦ symbol in the Course Description section of this planner. Changes to this list throughout the year are reflected on the NCAA site.

Xello

Xello is an engaging online program that re-imagines how students prepare for future successes. It provides resources for students to build self-knowledge, explore post graduation possibilities, create a plan and reassess plans for the future. Xello goes beyond just college and career planning to help transform student aspirations into personalized, actionable plans for academic and future success. Launch

Launch is a purpose-driven virtual course access program partnered with Springfield Public Schools. All Launch courses are built by Springfield Public Schools curriculum specialists, teachers and digital developers and are aligned to Missouri Learning Standards. Each Launch course is taught by a certified Missouri educator that lives and works at a Launch partner district. For Launch eligibility:

1. The student must be in full time seated classes for a minimum of one (1) semester prior to Launch enrollment.
2. The student and parent/guardian must meet with the counselor and Launch coordinator to discuss candidacy.
3. A Launch contract must be signed with the realization and knowledge that if the student fails, withdraws from the class, or does not complete a class, they *will not be permitted* to take a Launch class in the future.
4. Students wishing to enroll full-time with Launch will be required to withdraw from Willard Schools and enroll directly through Springfield Public Schools. Please contact the Counseling Department if you are interested in this option.

Dual Credit

Willard High School has agreements with Ozark Technical College and Missouri State University for students to earn college credit through their dual credit programs. The college determines fees yearly. Currently, the fee for MSU is \$70 per credit hour and OTC is \$57 per credit hour. All dual credit is subject to staffing and course availability from year to year. Transferability of credit is determined by each receiving institution. Students should contact the college or university they are considering attending to verify transfer of hours in these courses.

Willard High School strongly recommends that students have a 3.0 or higher cumulative GPA before signing up for the dual credit in a course. The grade earned will be on a college transcript and it is our desire that all students begin their college careers with a solid GPA. A 2.5 minimum GPA is an absolute requirement.

CORE 42 is a standard core transfer college curriculum. The core transfer curriculum, known as CORE 52, is a framework for general education that all Missouri public two and four year institutions of higher education use to facilitate the transfer of college credits. Individual courses that comprise the CORE 42 are to transfer one-to-one among all public (and

participating independent) colleges and universities in Missouri. For more information, please visit: www.dhewd.mo.gov/core42.php

AP (Advanced Placement) Courses

AP is a program of classes developed by the college board to give high school students an introduction to college-level classes and possibly college credit before graduating high school. These courses are more difficult than the usual high school class and also require passing an AP exam at the end of the year to gain college credit. AP exams are tests on

everything the student has learned in the AP class that year. They are scored on a scale from 1 to 5 with any score above 3 considered passing, though some schools will only accept 4's and 5's for credit. Students are responsible for the cost of this non-refundable test. For more information, please visit <http://apstudents.collegeboard.org>.

Correspondence Courses

According to Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education guidelines, students may earn credit through correspondence courses. Students must see their counselor to get specific board policy and for a correspondence course contract.

Seal of Biliteracy

The Seal of Biliteracy is an award given by a school, district, or state in recognition of students who have studied and attained proficiency in two or more languages by high school graduation. The rationale behind this award is based upon the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education's dedication to supporting Missouri schools in providing an education that fully prepares students for life in a global society and economy. These skills include the ability to communicate with clients, colleagues and associates who speak languages other than English, as well as, understand the socio-cultural intricacies that can further enhance the relationship. The Missouri Seal is intended to clarify, validate and revitalize the public perceptions associated with acquiring languages, raise awareness of the need and benefits of acquiring an additional language and promote cultural understanding.

Articulated Courses

Articulation is an opportunity for students who are enrolled in approved Career and Technical (CTE) courses to receive free college credit at Ozarks Technical Community College for skills learned during high school. To qualify for free credit, the student enrolled in CTE course(s) will need to do the following:

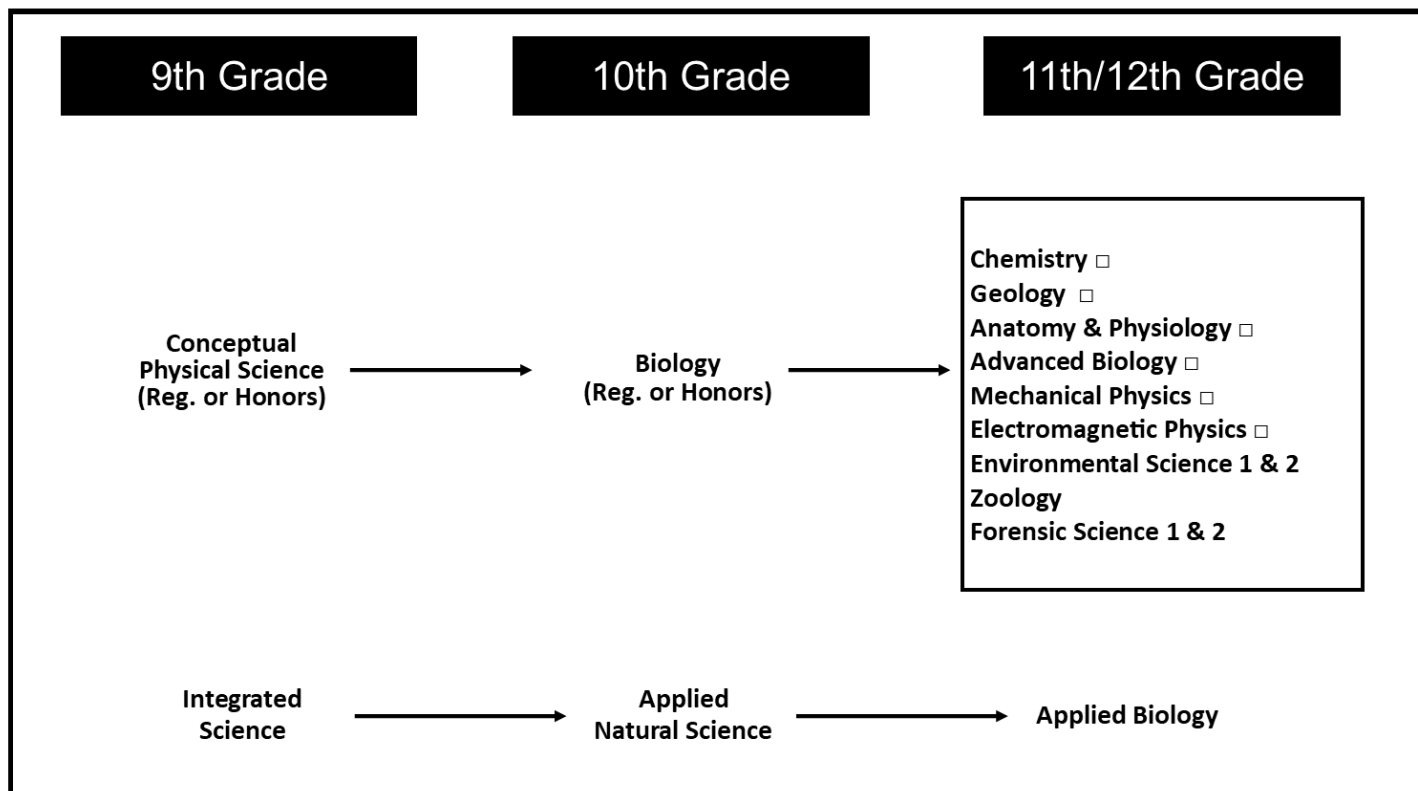
- A. Identify your interest as a CTE student by registering in CATEMA while in the class.
- B. Maintain an overall high school GPA of 2.0 or higher and a 3.0 or higher in classes you wish to articulate.
- C. Request an official high school transcript be sent to the OTC Admissions offices as soon as you graduate. This must be on file before you can receive your articulated credits.
- D. Enroll at OTC within twenty-four months of high school graduation.
- E. Students must submit an application for articulated credit during registration for classes at OTC.

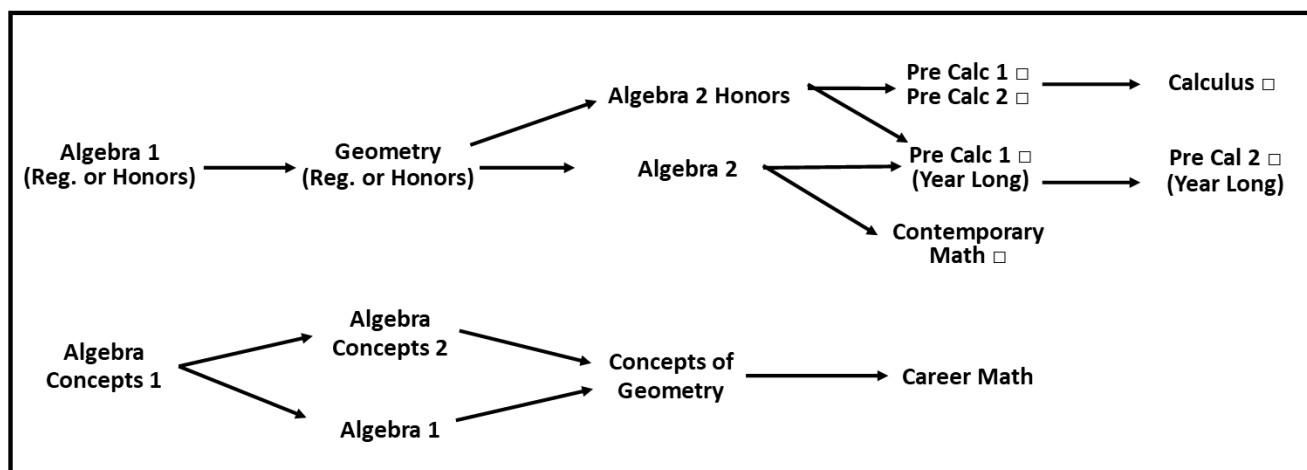
