Professional Development (Most Recent Three Years)

2014-2015

All teachers will attend two days of training as we transition to Common Core State Standards. Our entire Kindergarten, First and Second grade teams will attend a week long training on Multi-sensory instruction to provide more effective intervention to struggling students. Additional trainings will be offered during staff meetings based on needs identified through ongoing assessments.

2015-2016

Teachers will participate in 6 professional development days throughout the year to facilitate implementation of Innovate ED; professional development that builds site capacity to ensure all students become college and career ready. Other professional development opportunities include: Illuminate Training, Math/ELA training, and Technology.

2016-2017

Teachers will continue professional development with Innovate ED via Instructional Design days and Learning Rounds. Magnolia's Leadership Team will also work closely with the other Elementary Leadership Teams throughout the district at 2 professional development days. Focus is on sound instruction and student engagement. Staff will have a common language, focus and rubric identifying sound instruction, student learning, and student engagement. In addition, staff will receive training in math, ELA, writing, DIBELS, technology, and intervention during staff, team, and leadership meetings. Workshops are provided throughout the school year through the district for teachers to attend. Principal will provide teachers additional time to plan with Teachers on Special Assignment and their grade level teams for further professional growth.
