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Assistant Superintendent Gary Molenaar Retires After 15 Years of Service

After his 15 years of dedicated service, ESCNJ is bidding farewell to Assistant Superintendent Gary Molenaar, who is retiring in June.

Mr. Molenaar began with the Commission in 2010 as the Assistant Superintendent. Prior to coming to ESCNJ, he was a school social worker, special services director, and a former United States Air Force officer.

In 2018, he received the the NJASA/NJAPSA state Special Education Administrator of the year award. He was recognized for his outstanding leadership in providing services to students with special needs. His work at ESCNJ over the years reflects the highest professional and ethical standards.

Mr. Molenaar was instrumental in developing numerous ESCNJ initiatives, including the Pathways to Adult Living (PAL) program, a collaboration with the New Brunswick Public Schools and partnership programs with the Middlesex College Students Dental Hygiene Program. In addition, he assisted in the COVID programming and implementation of new educational strategies for students and staff, and working collaboratively with the ESCNJ Behavioral Supports Team, he assisted in the implementation

of Compassionate Care initiatives and professional development for ESCNJ faculty and staff, therapeutic programs and interventions for all ESCNJ students.

These results – and many others – make him a champion for students with special needs.

Mr. Molenaar was presented with an ESCNJ plaque of appreciation at the May 1 Board meeting, where he received strong and well-deserved applause for his "remarkable" work.

"On behalf of the Board of Directors, administration, and staff, we wish Gary all the best and thank him for all his years of outstanding service to the students and staff at ESCNJ," said ESCNJ Schools Superintendent Nadia Romano. "Gary's leadership and contributions to the educational programs have been remarkable; his dedication and support to the students, teachers, staff, and principals have impacted the lives of so many. The Co-op Continues to Offset Tuition Costs

ESCNJ is the New Jersey representative for The Association of Educational Purchasing Agencies (AEPA), a multi-state non-profit organization comprising educational service agencies and subdivisions.

AEPA consists of 31 member states that competitively bid contracts that are tailored to meet each state's specific legal requirements. ESCNJ is New Jersey's cooperative member agency and contract administrator, which gives the members additional purchasing contracts and benefits through this major network. By soliciting and awarding contracts on a national scale, AEPA allows local districts to benefit from streamlined purchasing processes and significant cost savings.

There are more than 800 vendors that provide

quality services to ESCNJ members through New Jersey, Connecticut, Maryland, New York, Pennsylvania, and Virginia.

ESCNJ is continuously evolving to keep up with the needs of its members.

With the increase in membership, some revisions being made to the bidding and RFP process may result in an increased number of bids for each category. As in the past, all awarded vendors will be vetted and follow the bid specifications and the mission of the Commission.

The revenue generated from the Co-op is used to offset tuition costs for sending school districts. Through this additional revenue, ESCNJ is proud to announce no increase in the tuition for the 2025-26 school year.

Paul DeAngelo Appointed as Assistant Business Administrator for Cooperative Purchasing

Paul DeAngelo is the first Assistant Business Administrator for Cooperative Purchasing, a newly-created position to maximize revenue possibilities. Mr. DeAngelo has more than 20 years of experience in both education and business. He will oversee the daily operations of the ESCNJ Co-op and the yearly Vendor EXPO.

He will be working closely with ESCNJ Business Administrator Timothy Havlusch to view bids and RFPs, secure new contracts, and follow the protocols and guidelines set forth by the ESCNJ Co-op.

"Paul is an outstanding addition to the business department and brings a wealth of knowledge and experience is a valuable addition to our administrative staff. His experience and skillsets are essential as the Commission continues to grow and evolve," Mr. Havlusch said. "His skillsets are critical as we continue to develop and establish our presence beyond New Jersey."

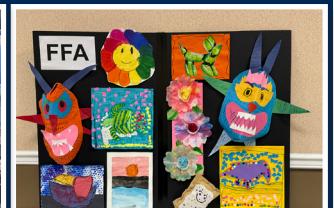

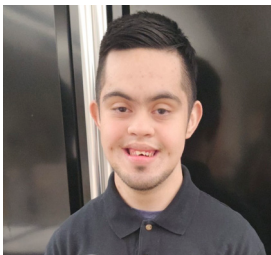


Jasmine Juarez-Vasquez, NuView Academy

Christopher Samayoa, Piscataway Regional Day School

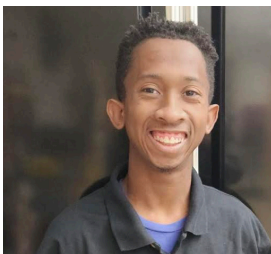

For Earth Day, students from the PAL program helped save the planet one act at a time, doing their part to keep Sayreville clean.

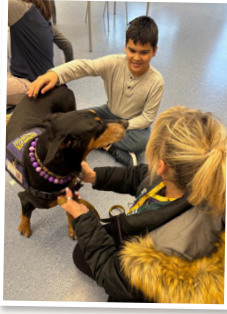
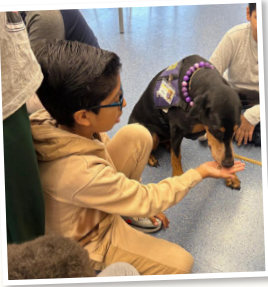

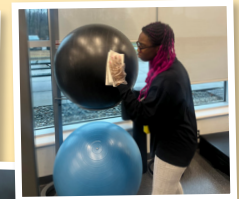
The PRDS winter carnival was full of creative indoor winter activities.

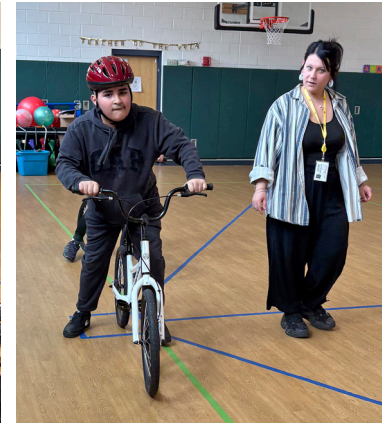
Students from FFA Participated in Learn to Ride Bike Camp

Collaborating with Keep Middlesex Moving, through its partnership with Strider Educational Foundation's All Abilities Bike Camp, eight students from Future Foundations Academy (FFA) participated in a two-week bike camp pilot program. Students learned the fundamentals of bike-riding as part of the first of its kind program to teach bicycle use to students with autism. The students learned the importance of wearing helmets and how to stay active and healthy.

State Sen. Patrick Diegnan, Piscataway Township Mayor Brian Wahler and the Piscataway Police Department all attended the camp, which was held in the FFA gym.

At the end of the program, each student received a helmet and a 20-inch balance bike with a pedal kit that was donated by Strider, a South Dakota-based bike manufacturer.

The students had so much fun, and ESCNJ is thankful to Middlesex County and its funding partners for providing such an amazing program!



ESCNJ Provides Grant Funding for Teacher Certifications

ESCNJ is partnering with its member districts to provide \$4 million in teacher grants for dual certification in challenging areas such as Teacher of the Deaf, English as a Second Language Certification, Teacher of Students with Disabilities, and to fund registered nurses seeking school nurse certification.

The grant will help fund current teachers in Member Districts in obtaining additional certification that will enhance instructional skills and better serve the

diverse student needs. The grant will reimburse the district for tuition costs and out-of-pocket tuition expenses.

Teachers will enroll in an accredited program, ensuring coursework aligns with State and District requirements. The program will be implemented from July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2027, allowing teachers to balance professional development with their instructional responsibilities.

Collaboration of Education and Art is the Basis for Creativity at TPA

Turning Point Academy students recently participated in a joint project focused on social injustice and how it impacts their lives. Jade Barnett, a Special Education Teacher at TPA, led this project. Our History Teacher, George Samra, delivered lessons on various social

justice topics, while Art Teacher Srinath Vadapalli guided students in creating posters that visually represented the themes discussed in their history lessons. The art was displayed at the 2025 Vendor EXPO in May.

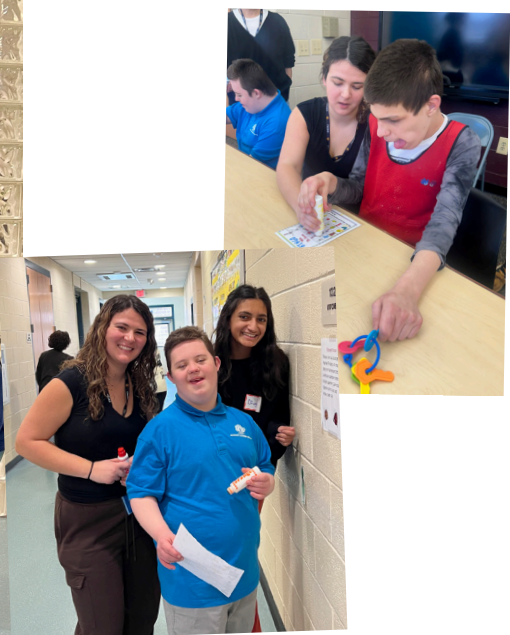
Community Garden Collaboration Continues to Grow at Turning Point Academy

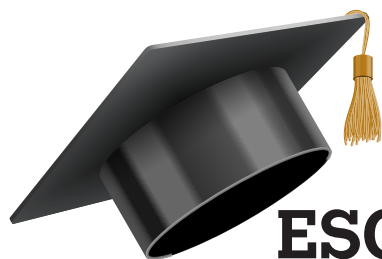
