Library class has gotten off to a great start for all our young readers this year. All students reviewed how to take care of their library books and keep them neat and clean. Please remind your students to keep their books out of the reach of food/drink, pets, and younger siblings. Please also help to remind them to return books on time!

For our learners in Grades 1-3, we have begun to read this year's nominees for the Ladybug Picture Book Award. This award is voted on by the children of the state of New Hampshire, who vote for their favorite of 9 picture books we will share. Once the New Hampshire State Library tabulates all the votes, the author of the winning book is given a plaque. It is a great program, and we always have a lot of interesting conversations around the books.

For our older learners, fourth grade is about to embark on a research project about unusual animals. They will learn about citing sources, copyright and plagiarism laws, how to organize notes, and how to create an interesting slideshow to share with the class.

Fifth graders have begun writing their own superhero stories. Each student has created a superhero, following all of the conventions of the genre, as well as an arch-nemesis. Over the next few weeks they will work on developing their character into a comic strip or a narrative story. There is a lot of creativity happening!
