


The season of Easter is officially over! Today, we return to celebrating Ordinary Time, which would be green... But as you can see, the Liturgical colour for today is, in fact, white.

The reason for this is that today is the Feast of Mary, Mother of the Church, a recent feast day, decreed by Pope Francis in 2008. Today we are called to remember that, not only was Mary present at the foot of the cross on Good Friday, she was also in the upper room on Pentecost Sunday (which we celebrated yesterday, and which marks the end of the season of Easter).

And so, we turn to Mary our mother, who encouraged Jesus at the Wedding Feast of Cana, and who encouraged the Apostles to go forth from the Upper Room, filled with the Holy Spirit, to bring the Good News to all nations, as we pray a simple, 3rd Century prayer:

We fly to your patronage,
O holy mother of God;
despise not our prayers in our necessities,
but deliver us always from all dangers,
O glorious and blessed virgin.

Happy Feast of St Barnabas!

St. Barnabas was a Levite from Cyprus who, with St. Paul, was an apostle to the Gentiles.

Originally named Joseph, the other apostles gave him the name Barnabas, which means "son of encouragement." All possessions were held in common, so Barnabas sold a field he owned, brought the money, and laid it at the apostles' feet. He became a leader of the Church in Jerusalem.

When Paul, who had been a persecutor of Christians, was converted and wanted to join Jesus' followers, the disciples were understandably skeptical about Paul. It was Barnabas who advocated for him and encouraged others to forgive him. Barnabas is, therefore, the patron saint of second chances. The Acts of the Apostles also recounts his central role in sending aid to those impacted by a severe famine.

Instead of beginning with a prayer this morning, maybe we could simply spend a moment in silence:

Who in your life could do with a second chance?
Who is in need of your compassion and generosity at this moment?
