Budget

For the 25-26 school year (SY), we budgeted \$585,559 dollars for the life skills portion of special education and \$405,411 dollars for cyber school. These two items alone are more than our deficit budget of \$990,970 dollars. Over the past 12 years, Harrisburg has chosen to provide negligible if any increases to school districts for special education costs even though this cost has risen significantly. The same is true with cyber school funding. There are simple solutions to fix the financial issue with cyber schools, but again, Harrisburg has not addressed the issue. Although school superintendents and school boards have continually raised concern over the cost of special education and cyber school, it has not been enough to effect change. It must come from each constituent communicating with their legislators. The House of Representatives recently voted on legislation setting the price for cyber school at \$8,000 dollars. Unfortunately, our representative voted against this cost saving measure to you the taxpayer. Fortunately, the bill ultimately passed in the House. goes to the Senate. This is your opportunity to save local tax dollars. Contact Jesse Topper (State Representative) and Pat Stefano (State Senator) and let them know your position on the topic.

With our deficit projected to be at \$943,500 dollars, the state budget not approved, and cyber financial reform unlikely, it is vital to support an increase in taxes. Fortunately, the farmstead/homestead reimbursement was increased and will help to offset the increase in tax for those that applied. NBC has the highest median income and the lowest school tax rate in Bedford County.

Each year during the budget process, we budget conservatively on our revenues and more liberally on expenditures. There are many unknowns when preparing the budget. For example, we don't know what special education costs, cyber costs, and employee attrition may be for the following year. We typically do not know what the Basic Education Funding (BEF) from the state will be because they are not required to approve the state budget prior to June 30th. We apply previous years' results to the budget while still understanding that it could fluctuate greatly.

In the meantime, it is vital that you continue to voice your opinions to our state legislature concerning the unfunded mandates placed on local school districts by our politicians and the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE).

NBC nutrition department takes pride in what we do, supporting parents in their efforts to create happier, healthier kids. With each year, we learn more and more about what students need to stay full and focused throughout the day. Looking ahead, we want to continue the good work of always striving to be better. During the summer break, here are a few ways you can help keep your kids stay active in body and mind and eating smart!

Kid-friendly Smoothie Recipes

Smoothies are a delicious, healthy way to add more fruits and vegetables to your day. All you need is a blender and some measuring cups/spoons. Have your child pick out what to put in their smoothie and let them help with cutting up the fruits and vegetables.

To make your smoothie:

Select your fruits and/or veggies and add your ingredients into a blender. Blend for 30-60 seconds or until smooth. Pour into a travel mug or cup and enjoy!

Blueberry Banana Spinach
Makes 1-2 servings
1 cup blueberries (fresh or frozen)
1 banana, sliced (preferably frozen)
11/4 milk or nondairy milk
1 cup fresh baby spinach
1/4 cup granola or rolled oats
2 tsp. maple syrup or honey
2-3 ice cubes – If not using frozen fruits and veggies

Green Pineapple
Makes 4 servings
2 bananas, sliced (preferably frozen)
2 cups pineapple chunks (fresh, frozen or canned)
1 cup milk or nondairy milk
1 cup fresh kale or spinach
1 tbsp. lemon juice
2-3 ice cubes – if not using frozen fruit

Strawberry Avocado
Makes – 1-2 servings
1 cup strawberries (fresh or frozen)
1 banana, sliced (preferably frozen)
11/4 milk or nondairy milk
½ of a ripe avocado
2-3 ice cubes – if not using frozen fruit

Get that Garden Started

Tick Bite Prevention

T.I.C.K.

Treat clothes and shoes with permethrin

Apply permethrin insecticide to clothes, shoes, and gear before engaging in outdoor activities.

Insect repellent

Āpply an EPA-approved insect repellent to your skin and over your clothes before engaging in outdoor activities.

Check for ticks

Check for ticks regularly while you are outside and conduct a thorough tick check when you come inside. Shower shortly after coming inside and place clothes in the dryer.

Keep watch for signs and symptoms of tickborne illnesses

Watch for the signs and symptoms described for each disease, especially in the summer when ticks are most active. Seek medical care if you develop symptoms related to tickborne diseases.

Tick Bite: Now What?

Remove the tick as soon as possible

Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible.

Pull upward with steady, even pressure.

After removing the tick, clean the bite area with soap and water.

Dispose of the tick by flushing it down the toilet. If you would like to send it to the Tick Research Lab of Pennsylvania for testing, visit www.ticklab.org

Consider Calling your Healthcare Provider

In general, CDC does not recommend taking antibiotics after tick bites to prevent tickborne diseases. However, in certain circumstances, a single dose of doxycycline after a tick bite may lower your risk of Lyme disease. Consider talking to your healthcare provider if you live in an area where Lyme disease is common.

Monitor Symptoms for 30 Days

Call your healthcare provider if you get any of the following: rash, headache, fever, muscle pain, fatigue, or joint swelling and pain.

Treatment for tickborne diseases should be based on symptoms, history of exposure to ticks, and in some cases, blood test results. Most tickborne diseases can be treated with a short course of antibiotics.

ÙPDATE:

Act 120 of 2024 requires a school nurse, school physician, or designated employee to remove a tick from a student in accordance with guidelines issued by the Secretary of Health.

After removal, preservation of the tick for the parent or guardian of the student to send to the Tick Research Lab of Pennsylvania for testing if desired. For information on how to send the tick to the Tick Research Lab of Pennsylvania, visit www.ticklab.org

The parent or guardian of the student will receive notification in writing of the tick removal and additional information regarding ticks and tickborne diseases, as issued by the Secretary of Health.

Homeless Initiative Information

The Homeless Children's initiative ensures homeless children and youth a free and appropriate public education on an equal basis with all other children of Pennsylvania. Program objectives and activities are intended to remove barriers to enrollment and educational success, and to ensure that education is as uninterrupted as possible while students are homeless.

Definitions of Homelessness

A child is considered homeless if he or she is living with or without a parent:

- In a homeless or domestic violence shelter
- In a public or private place not designated as regular sleeping accommodation, such as a vehicle, park, hotel or campground
- With relatives or friends due to lack of housing ("doubled up")
- Outside of his or her home as a runaway or because he/she has been forced out of the home
- In a house for unwed mothers with no other options for living accommodations
- In any of the situations listed above as a child of a migrant family
- Homéless children reside in situations that are not fixed, regular or adequate.

Barriers Facing Homeless Children

Homeless children face a variety of legal, social and emotional barriers that may interrupt their education. They include:

- Lack of school supplies and clothing
- Residency and guardianship requirements
- Lapses in program continuity
- Delays in educational evaluations
- Lack of transportation to school
- Missing academic and health records
- Lack of awareness regarding the extent and effects of homelessness
- Inadequate parental resources
- Social stigma attached to homelessness

How Homeless Children's Initiative Coordinators Can Help

- Assisting with school enrollment and placement
- Providing referrals for clothing, food, shelter, rent, medical services, preschool, housing, advocacy, counseling, etc.
- Coordinating transportation to and from school
- Implementing tutoring and enrichment services in shelters and other settings
- Coordinating support services
- Distributing literature regarding homeless children
- Providing training and in-service related to the McKinney-Vento Act
- Increasing public awareness of homelessness
- Assisting with obtaining school clothing, shoes and supplies for homeless students

How School Personnel Can Help

- School administrators can help by knowing the rights of the homeless and encouraging sensitivity
- Identified Homeless Liaisons can identify and track homeless students, train district staff on Federal and State policies, and contact HCI staff with questions and requests for technical assistance
- Principals can create a welcoming environment for homeless families
- School secretaries can discreetly assist parents with forms and paperwork
- Counselors can refer for needed services
- School Nurses can expedite immunization and health record transfers
- Transportation staff can arrange for children to attend their school of origin
