





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Caring for Our Communities and Education

Since the COVID-19 pandemic began, it has been an uncertain time for everyone. Although these past few months have been challenging, Riverside Unified School District (RUSD) has worked to meet the needs of our students, including pressing ahead with improvements to our schools through Measure O funding. Measure O was approved in 2016 by more than two-thirds of voters and it generates \$392 million to improve and build new facilities; this makes RUSD eligible for \$200 million in state funding. This Progress Report provides you with a snapshot of the strides we have made with Measure O funds over the last year.

RUSD's Capital Facilities Guiding Principles

- Maintain Operations: Modernization and renovation, such as replacing aging HVAC, upgrading electrical and plumbing infrastructure, site improvements and remodeling facilities
- Parity: Equivalence and similarity among facilities, such as providing adequate kitchen facilities and dedicated library and media centers, performing arts and physical education facilities
- **Evolution:** The process of formulation, growth, progressive change and development, such as personalized learning environments, STEM and STEAM facilities and career education
- Vision: Planning for the future with imagination and wisdom with examples like the School of the Arts, Career Technical School and facilities and equipment that meet the demands of 21st century learning

Putting Bond Funds to Excellent Use: Improvements and New Schools

Making needed improvements to existing schools through modernization, technology upgrades, renovation and classroom replacement is key to successfully utilizing Measure O funds. The bulk of our schools were constructed nearly 50 years ago with some of the oldest more than 100 years old. Measure O includes five bond issuances - the first in 2017 and the second in late 2019; future bond issuances are expected about every two to three years.

As Measure O was approved in 2016, improvements at 46 schools were categorized into Groups A through H and an Expanded School Projects group to plan for phased implementation. With the first and second bonds, 17 schools, plus three new neighborhood schools, are now in planning phases. Their status is:

Existing Schools

- Ten Schools in Construction or Complete: Highgrove, Harrison, Jefferson, Madison, Magnolia, Jackson and Adams elementary schools; Sierra Middle School; Poly High School Quad; and Sunshine Early Childhood Center (Please note all of these schools are highlighted to the right and on the back.)
- Seven Schools in Planning or Design: Alcott, Monroe, Fremont and Longfellow elementary schools; University Heights Middle School; and Arlington and John W. North high schools

New Neighborhood Schools

• Three Schools in Planning or Design: Casa Blanca and Spring Mt. Ranch and Eastside

This elementary school, which was constructed in 1956, just finished improvements including a state-of-the-art, two-story kinder building with 12 classrooms. Other upgrades were a new HVAC system, playground equipment,

Playground

Jefferson Elementary

Built in 1948, Jefferson Elementary's Measure O improvements will be complete this fall. Enhancements include a one-story kinder building and modernization of existing buildings. The investment here was \$16.5 million.

Harrison Elementary

The improvements to this 1964-built school include a new classroom building, new parking lot and drop-off area; completion of improvements is expected this fall. The investment here was \$12.3 million.

Madison Elementary

Originally built in 1952, the improvements to this school are anticipated to be finalized in spring 2021 including a new classroom building, new kinder play area and new parking lot. The investment here was \$18.8 million.

Sierra Middle

This school, built in 1957, includes classroom upgrades, ADA improvements, fire alarm upgrades, HVAC and parking lot expansion. The investment here was \$8.5 million.
