ADMINISTRATOR'S CORNER

Lisa Vainieri is the District's Executive Director of Central Registration, and Transportation and has worked in the District for 20 years. Ms. Vainieri comes from Hudson County, raised close to Jersey City, and attended Jersey City University. She's a city person by nature, so after her first teaching assignment, a short one-year stay teaching Special Education in a Multiple-Disabled classroom in Wanaque, she sought to get back to working in an urban setting. Her desire to work in an inner-city school setting is fueled by a need for the kind of diversity she experienced while growing up.

When she came to the District, she started her career here as a special education teacher at Eastside High School. She held that position for six years as she took classes to earn her master's in educational leadership. Her interest in pursuing an administration position led her to be the Testing Coordinator at Eastside. Not long afterwards though, she was offered the Supervisor of Assessment for

The Best Part of My Day

"The best part of my day, which doesn't happen every day, is when I get to interact with a family because they're in need or crisis. I'll have a family in my office when I'm either talking to the parent about what help I can get them or talking to a student about getting back on track. I try to advocate for the parents or have them advocate for themselves to empower the students and families. I just got a master's from MSU in Child Advocacy two years ago, my second masters. That is what I really love to do; advocate for families.

high schools' position at Central Office. Yet, taking the position meant that she wouldn't have regular interactions with children, so she took a part-time night position in Central



Registration. When the position of Supervisor of Central Registration opened, she took it, but her responsibilities would grow in unexpected ways. After two years, Superintendent Evans wanted Transportation management back in-house. Ms. Vainieri was tapped to create the department despite having no experience in transportation management or logistics. She created her team, one of whom was a former student of hers, and through the last ten years has been working with them to transport Paterson's students. This year alone, Transportation serves over 7,000 students on 370 busses, while Central Registration handles 5,000 registrants annually ranging from public to non-public education. Her position gives her a great sense of fulfillment, but she misses teaching. "I miss teaching, I miss it a lot," she said. "When I retire, I probably will be pursuing an instructional assistant position again. Yeah, full circle, I feel like I can make more of an impact that way. The closer you are to the kids the bigger impact that you have.

She found herself back at Eastside in 2019 when she was invited by then-principal Gerald Glisson, who asked her to revamp the program. The Pandemic slowed, but couldn't stop, her program as she met with her cheerleaders virtually until the team could start performing while wearing masks as restrictions began to lift. She has since left Eastside and runs the Storm cheerleading program for Paterson Recreation. Ms. Smart is looking forward to someday having her own gym.
