Bessie Aimes retires after 50 years of service

Bessie Aimes, grade 3 science teacher at School No. 10, was celebrated by the District and recognized by the City of Paterson for her fifty-year service to our children. At an assembly on June 10, Ms. Aimes received a proclamation citing her dedication to education.



Ms. Aimes started working for the District in 1974 at School No. 6. and taught 4th and 5th graders there for 36 years. She wanted to do anything to make a difference in young people's lives, so when Principal Joseph Fulmore asked if she would be willing to take on a group of boys that no other teacher wanted to have, she said yes. In time, through patience and persistence, she was able to get the boys to not only learn. but to also tap into their curiosity and desire to improve. As the story goes, because of their efforts, the students were promised a trip to Africa. During the assembly, Ms. Aimes received from Dr. Fulmore a framed photo of the boys when they were on their trip to Gorèe Island in Senegal.

In 2010, Ms. Aimes moved to School No. 10 where she teaches 3rd graders Science. In 2023, Meteorologist John Elliot from CBS News 2 visited her class in early June. Normally, his presentations are short, about ten minutes, before he gives a tour of the station's Mobile Weather Lab and then leaves. He was so impressed with her class, with their engagement and knowledge, that he stayed for almost an hour. Ms. Aimes was unfortunately out sick that day, but she would have been proud of them.

Although Ms. Aimes is looking forward to new challenges, the opportunity to travel, and possibly write a book, she will still miss her students and school. "Enjoy education, that's the most important thing," she said.

SHOUT OUT!



When Tiffony Kidd-Schindler joined Paterson Public Schools in 2022 as John F. Kennedy High School's Nurse, she felt that could be the place in the District where she could make the greatest difference. She was connecting with the students, getting to know the staff, it was quickly becoming a second home for her, but there was one thing that she couldn't get used to and that was the hand-written health records for each student. Always willing to speak up, she made her case to Supervisor of Nursing Services Kimler Williamson. By the end of the school year, she was brought to Central Office and tasked as a newly minted School Nurse Coordinator to spearhead the District's effort to create a digital health record database. She believes that to ensure effective continuity of care, from the time the child is in kindergarten to when they graduate, consistency of data is crucial. It is a challenge that Ms. Kidd-Schindler is excited to undertake and one of many jobs on her long circuitous road to working in the District.

Work has been a steady theme in Ms. Kidd-Schindler's life. At the age of ten, she emigrated with her family to Brooklyn from Jamaica. Only a few years later she started her first job as a sophomore at Brooklyn Tech high school. Her school employment counselor suggested working at the New York City Police Department headquarters doing data entry for accident reports for the Summer. In 1995 she enrolled in Brooklyn College and sort of settled into a career as she studied, working for a few companies in the advertising field throughout those years. She wanted to become an obstetrician, but figured that Pre-med Calculus was too hard at the time, so she chose to study Psychology instead. Later, she changed her major to

Comparative Literature since she loved English, and so transferred to Hunter College in Manhattan. As her education proceeded, so did life. She met her first husband and had the first of her two children. She eventually earned her degree in 2006 and found herself as a client account manager. Operations had begun to slow down after a few years and she saw the writing on the wall, knowing that the company was bound to close. This made her reflect on her career and how this path didn't make her feel fulfilled. "In advertising, the way you see your worth is measured in how many views your commercial gets, how much money you made for your client. It's so removed from people; I needed something that provided connection," she said. "I wanted to impact someone's life positively every day."

In 2010 she enrolled at Bergen Community College to attend their nursing program and received her RN in 2014, but life would take a hard turn for her family. It was around that time that she noticed changes in her husband, and on her advice went for an exam that revealed that he had cancer. The diagnosis was terminal. Throughout his illness she was his nurse. When he passed in 2016, she knew that she was done with hospitals; that she didn't want to work with sick people. "I want to be with kids," said Ms. Kidd-Schindler, "I want to get to know them, see them every day and know what their family life is like and know how they are."

The Best Part of My Day

When I feel like I've helped a nurse do something, especially knowing what they're experiencing in that position. Whether it is a question about infinite campus, or if they want to just bounce ideas off someone; they need someone to listen to them. A school nurse's office is a safe haven. Nurses sometimes need to be counselors, sometimes they need to mother. So, they need support in order to keep doing those things effectively.

During that hardship, she was able to find work in her children's school district as the school nurse for the middle school while completing her School Nurse Certification. Although she enjoyed being there for years, she felt that she could do more, even if it had to be somewhere else. Her search introduced her to Supervisor of Nursing Services Kimler Williamson, who offered her the position at JFK.


Appreciation Well Earned
