# GLOVES ON THE GROUND

District schools help clean up Paterson's National Park

Students and staff from Schools No. 6, 7, 28, Alexander Hamilton Academy, John F. Kennedy High School, and Paterson P-TECH converged on the Paterson Great Falls National Historical Park to help clean up the jewel of the city. For over an hour, the volunteers walked pathways, parking lots, fields and forests looking for refuse that they could fit into black garbage bags. Students also took advantage of the opportunity to be surrounded by nature on a beautiful day. Phones were pocketed as the students inspected plants, conversed, crowded to look at a snake, and skipped stones along the river surface. Over two hundred students took part in the clean up and then enjoyed a science fair during the last part of the event.















The science fair took place in the area around the Alexander Hamilton statue, with display booths for N.A.S.A., ham radio, local fossils, topography, and more. District schools also took part in the science fair presentation with P-TECH's Planetarium Manager Carlos Miranda and JFK's Honor Society providing demonstrations and activities. Equipment gained from the recent Citizen CATE project was on display at the P-TECH booth. The JFK Honor Society had activities and puzzles available for young learners.









#### Recognizing Our Veterans

Student produced short films highlight veteran PPS teachers

District and William Paterson University officials, along with various school staff and students gathered at the university's 1600 Alps Rd. campus to attend the premiere of two student-created short films. The films focus on veteran teachers who answer questions about their longevity, talk about their experiences, and share what they plan on doing in the future. The films were produced by John F. Kennedy High School's and Rosa L. Parks School of Fine & Performing Arts' Communication students under the guidance of their respective teachers, Richard Solis and Nahmir Glass.





The films were funded through a grant provided by the Education Pioneers for Paterson (EP4P). William Paterson University and the District partnered to use the grant for a student-lead project that can be used as a recruitment tool to help close the District's teacher shortage gap. Sheilee Chocolatl, the District's HR Staff Recruiter and Certification Specialist, added that the films are also "a testament to the dedication and passion of our teachers, many of whom have been with us for years." She added, "We aimed to highlight the meaningful and fulfilling nature of a teaching career in Paterson, the supportive community we offer, and the unique opportunities available in our district."

One of the teachers highlighted was Bessie Ames, from School No. 10, who has been a teacher for elementary students for fifty years. Ms. Ames was present during the showing with many of the other featured teachers. Some of the teachers shed tears as they listened to themselves recount their memories on the screen.





The videos will soon be edited to shorter presentations for use on the District's social media platforms and for the District website.

Alexander Hamilton Academy was visited by Andrea Crespo, who spoke to the middle school students about real estate, the market, and the requirements to get into the field.






# "You Can Observe A Lot By Watching" ... And Doing





Students from Paterson STEAM High School and International High School visited the Yogi Berra Museum & Learning Center, located on the campus of Montclair State University, to take part in its BaseBuild May Days program. On three separate days, one for STEAM students and two for International students, the students full-day learning experience focused on basic concepts of engineering and the innovation design process. Groups of students rotated through a few activities that included drafting 3D objects using the Siemen Solid Edge's Computer-Aided Design (CAD) module, experiencing how designs are 3D printed in Montclair State University's state-of-the-art MIX Lab, taking a tour of the university campus, and exploring the museum itself. The trip was organized by the District's STEAM Education Department.







# **Special Olympians**

Dr. Hani Awadallah and John F. Kennedy join competition at PCTI

Student-athletes from the Dr. Hani Awadallah School (DHA) and John F. Kennedy High School (JFK) won medals at the Passaic County Special Olympics Track & Field competition held on May 4<sup>th</sup> at Passaic County Technical Institute. In total, 33 Gold Medals, 18 Silver Medals and 2 Bronze medals were won by student-athletes from DHA and JFK. The student-athletes will compete in the 2024 New Jersey Special Olympics State Summer Games at The College of New Jersey on June 7th through June 9th.

The team was led by coaches Jackie O'Connor, who teaches physical education at DHA, Hathil Hammad, a bilingual teacher at DHA and Marie Scott, a special education teacher at DHA. Students competed in shot put, long jump, javelin, 400-meter dash, 200-meter dash, 100-meter dash, 4x100 relay and the 4x400 meter relay.

"We are extremely proud of all of our student-athletes who competed in the Passaic County Special Olympics Track & Field competition," said Ms. O'Connor.

#### ADMINISTRATOR'S CORNER

Jenna Goodreau is the District's Director Of Full Service Community Schools (FSCS). In this capacity, she organizes the many events, logistics, and needs of the District's thirteen FSCS programs. She enjoys her position and sees how important it is to the educational communities of Paterson, but she did not expect to find herself in this position when she started.



Although born in Alabama, New Jersey has been Ms. Goodreau's home for most of her life. Her Dad being in the military, she moved around a lot during her youth, living in places like Hawaii, Florida, Massachusetts, and Virginia. Eventually her family settled in southern NJ when she was 15. Later, she would attend Rider University for her bachelors and then go on to Seton Hall for her masters. Paterson Public Schools would be her first career position, when she started as a grades 5-8 Social Studies teacher in 2005 at the Performing Arts Academy, then located on Smith Street.

Ms. Goodreau loved her job because she got to teach history and had the opportunity to assist with the drama and performing arts presentations that the school created. The only thing that she had any reservations about was the curriculum. At the time, the curriculum standard was not as developed as it is now, so she started to help with curriculum writing and

assisting the Social Studies department with summer programs. In three years, she was tapped to be the Social Studies coach at Central Office. Initially, she turned down the offer, feeling that she wanted to have more time as a teacher, to be with students, and gain more experience. It was her father that convinced her to take the position, saying that she could always go back to being a teacher if it didn't fit. Central Office accepted her reconsideration for the position, which turned out to fit very well. She did professional development with teachers, coaching, and organizing after-school programs. This work led to planning afterschool programs with Federal Programs under Director Of Federal Programs Marguarite Sullivan, which started her getting into grant writing and eventually. In 2016, she became part of FSCS.

Jenna Goodreau's favorite part of the day is helping people. Whether it is through assisting the schools, helping the FSCS coordinators, providing more PD for teachers and afterschool programs; knowing that these efforts are helping students and families. "I'm really thankful to be a support for other people," she said, "it's very fulfilling".

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#### KENNEDY HIGH SCHOOL AP SYMPOSIUM




John F. Kennedy High School held an AP Symposium that showcased the projects from both the Seminar and Research parts of the class. The class is an elective, but challenges students to think and work independently. Their teacher, Iyani Basima, is the only instructor in the District that is still providing the class. Students credit her for inspiring them to continue with the rigorous workload. The elective has slowly, but steadily increased its enrollment over the past few years. Ms. Paul stated that the class helped her focus her interest in politics. She is now considering political science as her future pathway.





#### FILM MAKERS SCREENING AT FESTIVALS

More than that, she listens.

Paterson has many stories, one of which is that it is a city of many refugees. People come to Paterson needing help and, "you have to sit and listen to them, to build their trust," she said. "I have heard stories that make me really appreciate America; I am grateful to be living in America. They really appreciate all the help."

Ms. Ortiz credits her mother with inspiring her to join the District. Also a Parent Coordinator, Theresa Claudio is stationed at Central Office. They meet often and compare notes. Ms. Claudio has been in the District for over twenty years and uses her experience to give Ms. Ortiz tips on how to increase workshop attendance.
