KEY TO SUCCESS

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS EILEEN SHAFER RECEIVES PATERSON'S KEY TO THE CITY FOR A STERLING CAREER IN EDUCATION

In a ceremony held in the City Council Chambers at Paterson's City Hall, Superintendent of Schools Eileen Shafer received the Key to the City from Mayor Andre Sayegh. The ceremony was attended by City Council members, school district officials and guests. The award was given in recognition of Superintendent Shafer's decades of service to the students of Paterson and for the leadership that she provided in the six years

that she held the top position of the school district.

Ms. Shafer's career spans forty-two years, the first ten was in another school district. She came to Paterson in 1992 as a supervisor. She would spend the rest of her career climbing the ladder, with notable positions such as the Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources. She became the Deputy Superintendent in 2012. After the resignation of her predecessor, Ms. Shafer became the Acting Superintendent of Schools in 2017 and eventually the Superintendent of Schools. For the last six years she led the Paterson school district through teacher union contract negotiations, a pandemic, the resultant year of remotelearning, and the reopening of schools. Highlights to her tenure as Superintendent of Schools include improvements in graduation rates, facility upgrades, providing students with modern laptops to close the "digital divide", establishing two fiveyear contracts with the Paterson Education Association teachers' union, the reopening of Hinchliffe Stadium, and meeting all New Jersey Department of Education standards to regain local control of the Paterson school district which allows the Paterson Board of Education to make all of the final decisions in the school district's operation. Superintendent Shafer will retire on July 1.





Superintendent Shafer said, "The greatest key any of us can be bestowed with is knowledge. It unlocks hidden potential and opens pathways to new possibilities. In a city like Paterson, with its wide-ranging socio-economic and cultural diversity, effective public education is the best chance for our youth to attain a level playing field with our surrounding districts." Referring to June 20th being International Refugee Day she said, "I want to point out that families who have fled from dangerous conditions in their countries of origin and came right here to Paterson to enjoy safety and a stable education for their children."

Speakers at the event besides Superintendent Shafer included Mayor Andre Sayegh, Councilman Louis Velez, Board of Education President Nakima Redmon, and Sheriff's Department Deputy Coordinator Robert Scott.

"The true testament to a leader's legacy is the foundation in what you leave behind to the next leader to assure his or her success," Mayor Sayegh said. He continues, "You're fond of using the phrase, 'Together we can', and together we did. We did a lot." Finishing with, "So today we solute you for being a champion for our children."

"You will be missed. You will be missed," said Councilman Velez. "Despite what anyone else says, we had a relationship," he added in referring to the close working relationship city had with Superintendent Shafer's administration.

Nakima Redmon, Board of Education President said, "You are leaving this district in the better," continuing, "When I say the better, you forced us to think outside of the box."

"As a parent, as someone working for the public, I just want to thank you for everything that you have done, especially with bridging the gap between our kids," said Deputy Coordinator Robert Scott, continuing, "working together and pushing forward for a good working relationship."






TWO NEW DOCTORS IN THE HOUSE!

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THIRD GRADERS AT SCHOOL NO. 27 WILL RECEIVE ACTIVITY BOOK DONATION FROM PARTNERSHIP FOR A DRUG-FREE NEW JERSEY (PDFNJ) AND THE PSEG FOUNDATION

Representatives from The Partnership for a Drug-Free New Jersey (PDFNJ) and the PSEG Foundation visited Public School No. 27 to donate Third Grade Life Choices Coloring and Activity Book, a booklet aimed at educating young students on how to make safe and healthy living choices. It is part of drive by the collaboration to reach 35,000 young New Jersey students across the state. Speaking to the students were Superintendent of Schools Eileen Shafer, Executive Director of PDFNJ Angelo Valente, and PSEG Foundation Program Manager Maria Spina.

The activity book contains prevention education activities and a

contract for students, teachers, and parents to sign, committing to a healthy lifestyle. Students taking part in the assembly that was held in the auditorium were enthusiastic about receiving the activity book and keen on asking plenty of questions related to the effects of illegal drugs. Mr. Valente was happy to answer each student's question, echoing statements from the other speakers on how to avoid illegal drug use.

Superintendent Shafer said, "I want you, the students to know, as your Superintendent, not too long ago I was a teacher. I was also in charge of the drug program here, in the Paterson school district. One of the most important lessons about avoiding bad drugs is to make good decisions and not be afraid to say no and report it to an adult." Of the activity books, she told the assembly, "It can't be stressed enough that we need to teach our students how to make good decisions and those are the kinds of lessons that are going to be in your activity book." Then to the students, "I want to say to each one of you, I couldn't be prouder of the students here at School No. 27. I know you're going to listen. I know that you're going to complete these activities."

"The Third Grade Life Choices and Activity Book provides students information and encouragement to make healthy decisions," said PDFNJ Executive Director Valente. "The prevention efforts of family members and the educational system are as vital to the mission of this program as the students' commitment to live drug-

free," Valente added. "Parents and caregivers provide the guidance and emotional support to steer their children toward healthier life choices, while schools educate students on the positives of healthy living and the consequences of substance use." "PSEG is committed to supporting the communities we serve — including the young people in those communities. We believe strongly in the good work of the Partnership for a Drug-Free New Jersey and are proud to partner with them to help communicate the importance of making smart decisions at any age," said Ms. Spina, of the PSEG Foundation.

Students and faculty from five schools gathered at Rosa L. Parks High School to wrap up a two-year program aimed at addressing equity in school communities. Funded through ESSER II, the Youth Equity Stewardship (Y.E.S.) program was initiated at Eastside High School, Kennedy High School, The Rosa L. Parks School of the Fine and Performing Arts, the Dr. Frank Napier, Jr. School of Science & Technology, and the Charles J. Riley School in October of 2021 to bring young people's perspective, vision, creativity, and passion to the forefront of policymaking for schools in the 21st century. The day was a reflection on the students' two-year journey towards this goal.



The Y.E.S. program, as implemented for Paterson Public Schools (PPS), consisted of five meetings per year, called Y.E.S. Days, in which students and their advisors would meet with program founders Wade Antonio Colwell and Benjie Howard of Corwin Press, a division of Sage Publications, to explore culture, creative expression, community awareness, and social justice. There were 100 students in the program in grades six through twelve, divided into five cohorts, one from each school. The PPS iteration of the Y.E.S. program differed from other school districts in that it culminated in two students developed and lead initiatives: Professional Development (PD) sessions for teachers and peer

equity projects for students. Some PD sessions included suggestions and constructive strategies from students to teachers to build empathy and effective communication. The sessions consisted of conversations, surveys, a short film and other informational exchanges. Peer equity projects included improving school culture through the creation of Social Emotional Learning spaces and anti-bullying workshops. For this tenth and final Y.E.S.

Day, the cohorts presented their school's initiatives to each other. Speaking the students, Superintendent Eileen Shafer said, "I just have to say, as your Superintendent, just how proud I am of each one of you. I always knew that the students in Paterson were the best, today, you're going to see the proof of that." She would add later, "You're going to see your peers from across the city that did great work over the two years. I only ask that you to take this into your school and spread the word." She then thanked Assistant Superintendents Cicely Warren and David Cozart for setting up the program, the advisors for helping the students with the projects, and the participating students for being leaders in the program.



Assistant Superintendent Cicely Warren would praise the students' projects, relaying some of the positive feedback that the school faculties have shared with her about the student-created PDs. Addressing the students, she told them, "You are in our schools every day, you experience our schools every day; so you should have the most to say about it, and the most to teach about what it's like being a student in this district." Adding that, "You have done something incredibly powerful."

Assistant Superintendent David Cozart said to the students, "This whole vision was about giving you an opportunity to stake your claim in your district and your future. Advocacy coming from the grassroots, from the kids in the community has always been a way to make change happen." He continued, "Now you have taken your place in making Paterson great. You are part of Paterson's new renaissance. Take that with you wherever you go." Mindful Schools, which already provides mindfulness programs for District staff, will help faculty process feedback received from students. Cigna Healthcare will fund the expanded program, pending Board of Education approval.

In January of last year, a Paterson STEAM High School honor student who had earned a full scholarship to Montclair State University was killed in a crossfire while bringing groceries to his grandmother. Robert Cuadra was remembered during STEAM High School's Wear Orange Gun Violence Awareness Walk, which was held on school grounds. Last year's event raised over \$7,000. All proceeds were given as scholarships to graduating seniors and a donation was made to Everytown for Gun Safety. Recent fundraising for The Robert Cuadra Fund includes the selling of t-shirts and local food trucks that have agreed to donate a portion of their proceeds to The Robert Cuadra Fund.

Present at the event was Paterson City Mayor Andre Sayegh, who spoke of the continuing effort to end gun violence in the city.

Superintendent Shafer, who wasn't able to attend, stated, "Each time we lose someone to gun violence it is a hard hit to the community and the city. Especially if it is a young person, like Robert was, whose life was just beginning, it just strikes deeper. We are losing so much potential to gun violence and we all must find a way to help end it. My team, those being the District's administrators and school principals, and I, with the help of teachers, staff and parents, work together to make Paterson Public School buildings as safe as possible. It's not enough to make our schools safe though, we need to work as a community to make the streets safe as well."
