'YES' TO BETTER SCHOOLS

Program brings students into discussions about equity, inclusion

Students from five district schools gathered at the Eastside High School auditorium to begin a day of personal sharing and understanding of one another in an effort to develop ideas on how to

make education more inclusive and equitable. The students, along with administrators and faculty members,

were involved in the launch of the Youth Equity Stewardship, or "YES," program – an initiative to bring young

people's perspective, vision, creativity, and passion to the forefront of policymaking for schools in the 21st century.

"The point is not to merely make sure that young people are represented, but to

make sure that young people are understood, as well as all of the participants in the YES program," said Schools Superintendent Eileen Shafer, in her remarks to the students. "Too often, discussions about what education should be in 21st century America do not include all of the people who should be a part of those discussions. More often than not, it's the students who are left on the sidelines of those discussions. Or, if students are included, it is often those students for whom the status quo is working, those who are succeeding with the way things are while many others are left behind."

"You should have influence on the environments where you learn, and your advisors have invited you because they believe you have something to say about how we can make our schools more inclusive and equitable. That's why you are here," Assistant Superintendent Cicely Warren told the students.

Core groups of 20 students from five district schools were chosen by principals and faculty to Please see, "YES Program" on page 2.

participate in the YES program. The five participating schools are Eastside High School, Kennedy High School, The Rosa L. Parks School of the Fine and Performing Arts, the Dr. Frank Napier School of Technology, and the

Charles J. Riley School. The schools were selected on their previous use of restorative justice practices, the principal's interest in the YES program, and the availability of teachers and other staff to participate as advisors.

The YES program was co-founded by Benjie Howard and Wade Colwell, who led the session at Eastside. Both Howard and Colwell are consultants with Corwin Press, a division of Sage Publications that focuses on publications that help educators' professional development. Howard and Colwell are also artists whose resumes include backgrounds in education, songwriting, poetry, and performance art.

BTMF ACHIEVES GOLD STANDARD

Nonprofit bestows its highest honor to BTMF for requiring financial literacy education

Next Gen Personal Finance (NGPF), a non-profit with a mission to ensure every high school student in America takes a personal finance course by the year 2030, has awarded John F. Kennedy High School's School of Business, Technology, Marketing, and Finance (BTMF) its Gold Standard School award. The award is given in recognition of JFK-BTMF's ensuring that all of its students take at least one standalone semester course in personal finance before they graduate.

"Our BMTF students graduate high school with a solid knowledge of personal finance. They have the keys to financial success, and we greatly appreciate Next Gen Personal Finance's recognition," said Superintendent of Schools Eileen Shafer.



"The BTMF curriculum requires students to know how to keep their personal finances in order, which is knowledge they will benefit from for the rest of their lives," said Kennedy High School Principal of Instruction Jorge Osoria. "The reality is that every high school graduate should have this knowledge. That is why we applaud Next Gen Personal Finance's mission to promote financial literacy among high school students and thank them for bestowing the Gold Standard School award on BTMF."

NGPF teamed up with researchers at Montana State University to identify 1,591 Gold Standard Schools, including BTMF. These schools were in addition to high schools in six states – AL, MO, UT, MS, TN and VA – where all students are guaranteed to take a personal finance course before graduation.

STUDENT: SCHOOL 12 GARDEN IS "BEST PLACE EVER"



On another day, the third-graders applied the scientific method by creating and testing their hypotheses to discover what happens to gummy bears soaked in various substances such as vinegar, salt water, and water with baking soda. SCHOOL 9 RAISES \$1400 FOR LEUKEMIA RESEARCH...IN A WEEK

Staff and students at the Charles J. Riley School/Public School No. 9 had only been in school a few days when they joined together to raised money for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. A week later, they had raised \$1,400 through a fundraiser led by Seventh Grade Science and Health Teacher Jeanne Albanese.

Albanese started "Team JDF," the fundraising effort named after her father, John, a family friend, David, and her father's cousin, Felix. All three men died from blood cancer complications. Staff and students joined "Team JDF" by making donations starting on Sept. 29. By Oct. 15, staff and students had donated more than \$1,400.

The homeroom that had donated the most, \$133, was given an ice cream party, courtesy of Albanese.

The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society is a nonprofit organization founded in 1949 and it funds research for every type of blood cancer, including leukemia, lymphoma, myeloma, and other rare types of blood cancers.

TWO IB SENIORS NAMED **QUESTBRIDGE FINALISTS**

First-generation college-bound hopefuls vying for scholarships

Stefany Morales and Louis Varela, two International Baccalaureate (IB) seniors at International High School, have been named finalists qualifying for four-year college scholarships and early decision

acceptance to college through QuestBridge, a nonprofit organization that provides higher education opportunities to high-achieving students from low-income families who would be the first in their families to go to college.

Morales and Varela were among 16,500 applicants to QuestBridge's National College Match scholarship program, and now stand as two of the 6.312 finalists for the scholarship from throughout the United States.

In addition to qualifying financially. applicants must exhibit outstanding academic achievement. Previous National College Match scholarship have traditionally been in the top five to 10 percent of their graduating class, with a combined SAT score of 1260 or higher or ACT score of 27 or higher. Their transcripts have had grades of mostly A's in challenging courses such as honors level. Advanced Placement, or IB courses. Finalists are notified

of National College Match scholarship results on December 1st.

National College Match scholarship recipients are granted early admission to one of QuestBridge's 45 college partners with a full four-year scholarship.

The two seniors are both aiming high when it comes to their college plans. "My number-one school is UPENN!" said Morales. "I want to possibly major in either earth science or ecology. After college, I plan on going to dental school or possibly doing something in the environmental

"The program's facilitators come from a variety of professions, which is a tremendous asset in exposing our young people to the many opportunities that lie ahead after they graduate high school," said Assistant Superintendent Cicely Warren. "The sessions that are planned throughout the rest of the year will help the students develop the skills they'll need to make those opportunities attainable and succeed when they attain them."


