Public School No. 8 Students Named State Finalists in Samsung STEM Contest




A team of students from Public School No. 8 has been selected as state finalists in Samsung's "Solve for Tomorrow" contest, a \$3 million national competition that encourages students in grades 6 to12 to creatively use science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) skills to solve a community challenge. There were more than 2,000 applications nationwide for this competition. Public School No. 8's team is led by three students: Karen Vargas, Ashely Martinez, and Lorena Cruz. Their creative proposal, inspired by the solar panels that generate energy from their school's roof, to use the photosynthesis process in plants to

conserve and recycle water, was submitted with the help of teachers Martha Cruz, Ivette Soto and Anibal Cintron. Public School No. 8 Principal Sham Bacchus noted that all three student leaders had immigrated to Paterson just a few years ago. They are all part of the bilingual magnet program, which is designed to ease the academic transition for students who are English language learners.

S.T.A.R.S. Academy Student Wins National Bus Safety Poster Contest





Bryan Torres Tavares, a junior at S.T.A.R.S. (Students Transitioning and Achieving Real Success) Academy, has won first place honors and a \$500 prize in a transportation poster contest held by the National Association for Pupil Transportation (NAPT). Officials on the state and national level believe this is the first time a student from New Jersey has been named the overall winner of the contest. NAPT holds the poster contest annually as part of its observance of National School Bus Safety Week, which is held during the third week of October. NAPT's National School Bus Safety Week poster contest has a different theme every year. The 2019 poster contest theme was, "Red Lights Mean STOP!"

Family Painting Night at School 15







School 21, WPU, and Dodge Foundation Team up For Mural Project



Public School No. 21 is the latest Paterson Public School to be added to the group of Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation Arts Integration Grant schools in Paterson. Recently, Principal Joanne Riviello met with Dr. Heejung An, William Paterson University (WPU) Art Professor Triada Samaras, and WPU Professor in Residence Darlene Rankin to discuss arts integration plans for the coming school year at this location. A collaborative, large scale mural for the school's entryway has been discussed. Many materials are being considered for this collaborative mural including ceramic tiles, Masonite, plywood, and paper. Much consideration is being given to the eventual permanent installation of all the artwork's pieces. Riviello has been an enthusiastic supporter of this project. Different names are being considered for this project including, "Many Cultures, One Heart." Art

teacher Raquel Ford has been working closely with Professor Samaras to make this vision of a large-scale student-generated mural a reality. Keeping with the Dodge Foundation's theme for the school year, diversity, this mural will be made of outlines of the school's students' hands. The smaller hands will comprise two larger hands that will come together in a heart shape to symbolize love. In the photo is Ford and Samaras' scale model of the project.

Students Get In Touch With Nature

On November 13th, the third grade class at Public School No. 27 was treated to a presentation by Gerald Zelenka from A Touch of Nature, a Clifton-based company that brings audiences a touch away from nature and seeks to develop within their audiences an appreciation for all living things. Zelenka brought in many animals such as a mourning dove, a turtle, an alligator, and chinchilla. The students' favorite animal seemed to be a boa constrictor, judging by their amazed reaction. Zelenka also discussed the importance of a clean environment, and how animals adapt to survive.



Spanky, the Bearded Dragon, Comes to Class



A pre-K class at the Dale Avenue School taught by Sheryl Genarelli and Carolina Olivero had a special visitor recently. Genarelli brought in her bearded dragon, Spanky, for the students to interact with and observe as part of the class' "pet study." Students were able to see what kind of food the lizard eats (meal worms) and see what special items she needs in her habitat (a heat lamp, rocks and pieces of wood for natural bedding). Students also learned that bearded dragons do not drink water like

other animals. They absorb it through their skin. Students touched the bearded dragon and described her skin as rough, soft, pointy, and dry.
