Art and Science at Don Bosco Technical Academy



Don Bosco Technical Academy science teacher Jennifer Post used pendulum painting to teach Isaac Newton's Laws of Motion to her sixth grade science students. She used an arts integration lesson that she had learned last summer at the William Paterson University (WPU) Annual Summer Arts Integration Institute.

Students were interested in the fact that pendulum painting is both an artistic act of creation and a scientific reality. They were amazed by the potential of creating dazzling artworks and doing relevant science experiments at the same time.


After the pendulum painting part of this lesson was over, Post asked the students to write about what they observed
