Police Pilot Programs Set To Launch



New Roberto Clemente School Principal Hector Montes hosted Superintendent Eileen F. Shafer, Mayor Andre Sayegh, and Police Chief Troy Oswald who announced pilot programs of two new initiatives aimed at keeping young people off drugs and inspiring them to consider careers in police work.

"These programs offer excellent drug prevention education, and expose our young people to police work, but what I like are the ancillary benefits," Shafer said. "They open young peoples' eyes to

look beyond the present and see the possibilities of their own futures."

The Law Enforcement Against Drugs (LEAD) program is a kindergarten to 12th grade drug prevention education curriculum taught by specially-trained police officers in public schools that will soon be launched at The New Roberto Clemente School, the Roberto Clemente School, Public School 12, the Urban Leadership Academy, and the Great Falls Academy. The Paterson Police Explorers program will provide to students ages 14 to 18 the opportunity to explore a career in police work by working alongside Paterson police officers. The Paterson Police Explorers pilot program will soon be launched at schools to be named later.

Learning To Never Forget



Public School 7 students marked the 17th anniversary of 9-11 with their own written reflections on the tragic day. After listening to Principal Rebecca Cecala briefly summarize the heartbreaking details of that day, students were asked by Stephanie King, a language arts and literacy teacher, and other teachers, to write their own thoughts about what they had learned in response to the phrase, "Always remember, never forget."

Art teacher Sara Ciccone used the students' responses to create a poster of a metropolis skyline similar to New York City's out of construction paper and paint. The students' responses comprised the skyline's foundation and formed the shape of the World Trade Center's twin towers that collapsed after they were attacked on 9-11. The artwork is currently on display at the school's auditorium.

Here are a couple of the students' reflections:

"We should always remember 9/11 because people lost their lives and they made a lot of sacrifices for their family and friends in 9/11 17 years ago." - Grade 7 Student

"For me, in general, I do tend to forgive but never forget. The phrase 'always remember, but never forget' in this situation is important because we can improve what our security is like everywhere. We shouldn't forget events/disasters like these because we can improve on our alertness to make sure these events never happen again." - Grade 8 Student
