P-TECH Scores With 60 Students Ready to Enroll



Sixty eighth grade students committed to the upcoming P-TECH (Pathways in Technology and Early College High School) at PANTHER Academy at a special "Signing Day" ceremony Thursday evening at Passaic County Community College. The new high school – which will graduate students with a high school diploma, an associate's degree, and practical experience in the tech sector – is scheduled to launch in September. Paterson's own Victor Cruz, Super Bowl XLVI champion wide receiver for the New York Giants, was among the dignitaries

who came to celebrate the first incoming class of P-TECH at PANTHER Academy. "I'm excited about the addition of P-TECH high school to my hometown of Paterson, N.J. This city was birthed from the minds of engineers, inventors and creators," said Cruz. "As a philanthropist, I'm dedicated to promoting positive change in the lives of youth today through innovative educational programs and P-TECH will help educate a new wave of future engineers, inventors and creators from Paterson." N.J. Senator Nellie Pou, Assemblyman Benjie Wimberly, Mayor Andre Sayegh and IBM's Martin Laird were among the dignitaries present for the event.

PPS, Parents and Courts Successfully Launch New Mock Trial Competition

In a first-time event hosted by the Paterson Public Schools and the Passaic County Vicinage of the State Superior Court, students from six district high schools faced off against each other in the city's inaugural Spring Intermural Mock Trial Competition. Patersonians Go to Trenton to Urge for School Funding

Nearly 200 educators, administrators and parents from Paterson traveled to Trenton on March 27th to voice their concerns over the devastating proposed budget cuts made necessary by the reduction in state aid and urge legislators to restore state aid to the district. Wearing stickers emblazoned with the words "Cuts hurt kids" and "Paterson students deserve better," these stakeholders descended upon the Assembly Budget Committee hearing in a show of unity to advocate for their schools. "The proposed budget cuts do not allow the Paterson Public School District to provide a thorough and efficient education for our 28,000 students," said Schools Superintendent Eileen Shafer. "We firmly believe that any cost reductions must not be made on the backs of the people who dedicate their lives to educate the children of this city," declared Paterson Education Association President John McEntee. Board of Education President Oshin Castillo and Paterson Education Fund Executive Director Rosie Grant were among those who testified before the State Assembly Budget Committee that day.

RPHS, PS 24 Receive National Honors for Music Education

Two Paterson Public Schools were awarded the Support Music Spirit Award by the NAMM Foundation for their outstanding commitments to music education. The Rosa L. Parks School of Fine and Performing Arts and Public School No. 24/Fine and Performing Arts Academy received the honor that recognizes individual schools that demonstrate outstanding achievement in efforts to provide music access and education to all students. The Support Music Merit Award is the second arts-related honor garnered by Paterson Public Schools educators in recent weeks. On March 20, Arts Ed NJ honored Paterson Public Schools as a "Renaissance District" for revitalizing arts education in the elementary grades. To qualify for the Support Music Merit Award, both schools answered



detailed questions about funding, graduation requirements, music class participation, instruction time, facilities, support for the music-making programs. Responses were verified with school officials and reviewed by The Music Research Institute at the University of Kansas.
