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Playgrounds: We are excited to complete the final touches on the playgrounds that were updated last summer! As we move into this summer, we are eager to begin Phase Two of our playground improvements. Schools receiving updates in this phase include Costello, Hamilton, Leonard, Schroeder, Wass, and Wattles. Hamilton and Schroeder Elementary Schools are scheduled to receive the first playground improvements.

Furniture: Phase Two of our furniture upgrades will also begin this summer at Barnard, Bemis, Hill, Martell, Morse, and Troy Union. Additionally, Troy High and the new Smith Middle School will receive new furniture. By the conclusion of Summer 2025, every elementary school in our district will have an updated playground and brand-new furniture—an exciting milestone for our students and school communities!

Smith Middle School: Construction on the new Smith Middle School remains on schedule, thanks to the hard work of our crews who continued progress throughout the winter months, even wrapping parts of the building to allow for work in severe temperatures. Over the next few months, several houses along Livernois will be razed to make way for the school's new entrance. We aim to open the new building in the 2026-2027 school year.

Troy/Athens High School Fields: This spring, we were thrilled to unveil the new athletic fields, including new baseball and softball fields at Troy High School, which have been a hit for students and staff. In addition, construction of the new concessions area and tennis courts at Troy High has already begun and is expected to be completed in the fall. At Athens, upon completion of the spring sports construction will begin baseball, softball and the stadium fields.



ATTENDANCE AREA REVIEW

TROY SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Troy School District Nears Decision in Attendance Area Review Process. The Troy School District is approaching an important milestone in its Attendance Area Review Process, with the Board of Education set to determine next steps in May 2025. Depending on the timing of this publication's arrival in your home, a final decision may have already been made.

The AARC was launched to evaluate current enrollment patterns, building capacities, and shifts in student population throughout the district. Over the past several months, the AAR committee (composed of parents, community members, and district staff) carefully gathered data and developed several options to address the district's evolving needs.

The review process was guided by several core principles, including balancing the student enrollment across middle school buildings, resolving double splits, and ensuring that high school boundaries remain unchanged. A focus that emerged through the process was to minimize the number of families impacted.

After reviewing the options developed by the AARC, the Board of Education

construction of the new concessions area and tennis courts at Troy High has already begun and is expected to be completed in the fall. At Athens, upon completion of spring sports, construction will begin on new baseball, softball, and stadium fields.

Athens High School: Our Bond Team, in collaboration with school administrators, has been working diligently on the design of the new academic wing at Athens High School. The new wing will be constructed as an extension of the current building, allowing learning to continue uninterrupted during construction. Construction for the new academic wing is scheduled to begin in 2026. ♦

selected Option C and variations of Option C to present to the community for feedback. Option C proposes two primary changes: all Troy Union Elementary students would attend Smith Middle School, and students living in Somerset Apartments (approximately 319 students) would continue to follow their currently assigned elementary school to that school's designated middle school. HOSA STUDENT AWARDS



This year has been remarkable for TSD students participating in **Health Occupations Students of America (HOSA)** clubs! In April, more than 380 middle and high school students from Boulan Park MS, Larson MS, Athens HS, IA East, and Troy High traveled to Traverse City to attend the HOSA Michigan State Leadership Conference, where TSD students truly shined. Competing in areas such as Math for Health Careers, Foundations of Medical Terminology, and Life-Threatening Situations, 149 TSD students earned medals, and at least 95 students qualified to participate in the HOSA International Competition, taking place this June in Nashville, TN.


Perhaps most importantly, the Troy School District taught Tony grit. "Learning how to push through and persevere — that came from school," he says. "That mindset made all the difference."

Turtle Woods

Oakland County Parks' First Nature Preserve



Oakland County Parks purchased the property known as Turtle Woods from the Troy School District (TSD) to establish its first nature preserve. The 70-acre site, located on the north side of Square Lake Road between John Rand Dequindre roads in Troy, features wetlands and a lakeplain prairie ecosystem along with being home to several threatened plant species.

Originally acquired by the district in 1967 for a future high school site, the property remained undeveloped and has been used for student educational visits. Plans for the new preserve include updating trails to protect sensitive habitats, constructing boardwalks, and adding restroom facilities near a new parking lot. Troy School District will continue using the site for environmental education.

The acquisition was made possible through a partnership between TSD, Oakland County Parks, and Six Rivers Land Conservancy. After an initial funding application was denied in 2023, the TSD Board of Education approved a 50% discount on the land's sale price to strengthen a new application to the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund, leading to a successful grant award. The district will receive \$1.8 million from the sale. ♦

How OK2SAY Works



Once all relevant information is obtained, **OK2SAY** forwards it to the appropriate responding agency, such as a school or law enforcement. The responding agency investigates the tip and provides necessary interventions. After the investigation, the responding agency submits an outcome report to **OK2SAY**. Tipster information is protected by law and can only be released by the tipster, the tipster's parents (if the tipster is a minor), or a court order. ♦

T&L Credit Union surprised Mrs. Vought with a check for \$2,000.





While many of our FIRST Robotics teams had successful seasons this year, three stood out from the pack!


The Hammerheads (FRC 226) from Troy High ranked 16th in the state this year. They earned the league's highest honor - the Impact Award - were finalists in their division at the State Championship, and qualified for the World Championship, where they finished as semi-finalists.

Just Add Logic (FTC 20332) from Boulan Park also had an impressive season, winning the Control Award three times and the Impact Award. At the State Championship, they placed third for the Inspire Award, which qualified them for the World Championship. At Worlds, they ranked in the 87th percentile of all teams.

At the elementary level, the Electro Eels (FLL 66746) from Wass Elementary won the Michigan State Championship and were one of only two teams to represent Michigan in their division at the World Championship! The Electro Eels placed 21st out of 160 teams at Worlds.

The world-wide podcast industry continues to see exponential growth with billions of dollars in annual revenue. To acknowledge the relevancy of this medium, the **Creative Guild** has made audio equipment available for many students to utilize in producing their own podcasts!

From dream jobs to athletics updates, there's always something exciting to talk about in the Troy School District. **One series, Life Unfiltered with Athens seniors Vanessa Luu and Gabrielle Robinson**, focuses on personal growth, advice, and reflection with topics including motivation, balance, practicing gratitude, friendship, and more. Their guests have ranged from fellow high school students to their building principal. With 15 episodes produced and more on the way, this series has been a great opportunity to have and share discussions of many important topics within the school community.

Within just a few years, student podcast work from the TSD now regularly receives recognition from large student competitions including the Michigan Association of Broadcasters and the Michigan Interscholastic Press Association. This is very exciting for our students, but even more exciting is the future potential for our younger students as the program continues to grow. Some of our elementary schools have even repurposed space in the media centers for their very own podcast studio.

CAP | The Career Accelerator Program Doubles in Size

The Troy School District is proud to announce the significant growth of its Career Accelerator Program (CAP), which has more than doubled in size this year. CAP is a dynamic pre-internship program designed to bridge the gap between classroom learning and real-world professional experience. This initiative provides students with valuable mentorship and firsthand exposure to a wide range of career pathways right here in our vibrant community.

Launched as a pilot in 2024, CAP placed 28 students with 17 local businesses. This year, the program has expanded to place 72 students across 36 businesses—demonstrating both the strong interest from students and the incredible support from local partners.

As part of the program, students participate in four CAP classes and complete 20 hours of real-world, pre-internship experience. The feedback from both students and families has been overwhelmingly positive.

"We've learned so much about aspects of business we didn't even know existed. Understanding how to conduct ourselves professionally is crucial, and this experience helped us recognize our strengths."


