

The Glenville Project:

Erin Riley, Jackson Family Director of the Engineering and Design Lab, and Nathan Kress, Upper School History Teacher



Innovation Grants enable enterprising faculty to bring original ideas to fruition for the GA community. Erin Riley and Nathan Kress proposed a simple mission: Facilitate access to the Glenville property for teachers and students who had not previously visited. Nathan shared,

"Every teacher understands the importance of scouting off-campus locations before visiting with a student group. Our goal was to eliminate the need for pre-visits, allowing teachers and students to step off the bus and immediately engage with the property. Without proper signage or prior knowledge, the large property could be difficult to navigate. By improving accessibility, we aimed to increase educator confidence and encourage more teachers to take advantage of this outdoor space."

This summer, we focused on marking trails and mapping the woods to create a clear, accessible outdoor experience. Our goal was to develop a safe, educational environment where students could explore nature, study ecosystems, and engage in outdoor activities. Existing trails were cleared, new trails were created, and all were carefully marked. Upper School students assisted in these efforts throughout the fall.

Using GA's Engineering & Design Lab, we developed and installed durable, weather-resistant signs along the trails. Each trail

varies in difficulty and length, ensuring ageappropriate options for all students. Trail markers were placed at regular intervals to enhance navigation and safety. A kiosk now marks the trailhead, providing maps and shelter from the rain while waiting for buses.

While the Glenville property's long-term use is still being planned, access and usability have already improved. Student groups from the Cowan Center to the Upper School now regularly explore the property. It has been a rewarding excuse to spend more time in the woods!

From the discovery and analysis phase this fall—where the entire GA community participated in a survey and/or listening and visioning sessions and goals and priorities were clarified, to the development of concept alternatives this winter where preferred programming options were defined, to the implementation and documentation phase this spring—where refinement of a draft plan with cost estimates and phasing options were outlined, Sasaki has been busy envisioning the boundless possibilities for GA's newest campus. GAINS Conference 2024

Empowering the Next Generation of Women in STEM

The **2024 GAINS (Girls Advancing in STEM) Conference** was a stimulating three-day event held in November at **Carnegie Mellon University**, in collaboration with the **University of Pittsburgh's Department of Sports Medicine and Nutrition**. This event welcomed over 100 high school girls from across the nation, offering them a unique opportunity to engage with accomplished female mentors in STEM, participate in immersive learning experiences, and explore groundbreaking research and technology. Founded by Greenwich Academy, GAINS brings together a network of students interested in STEM with women professionals working in the fields. This highly anticipated annual conference has previously been held at prestigious research institutions like MIT, Stanford, Harvard, and Duke to name a few.

This year's conference at CMU featured an enriching itinerary of **STEM-focused tours and technology talks**, providing attendees with a firsthand look into diverse scientific disciplines. Among the off-campus excursions, students visited the **Rooney Sports Complex** at the University of Pittsburgh, where they delved into the **Neuromuscular Research Laboratory**, gaining valuable insights into athletic training and the cutting-edge field of sports science. Another highlight included an excursion to the **Allegheny Observatory**, where participants explored the frontiers of modern astronomy and observed sunspots through advanced telescopic equipment. At Carnegie Mellon University, attendees engaged in hands-on exploration of pioneering technologies. The **AI Maker Space** provided an interactive environment where students experimented with **robotics and motion capture systems**, while the **CMU RoboClub** captivated participants with its **RobOrchestra**, an ingenious fusion of robotics and musical performance. Additionally, students toured the **Human-Computer Interaction Institute**, uncovering the transformative applications of technology in everyday life.

The conference also showcased a compelling lineup of **Tech Talks** by women experts in STEM fields, including "Computational Chemistry: How AI Helps Us Discover New Catalysts" and "Neural Dynamics of Trial-and-Error Learning," offering students a thoughtprovoking glimpse into the intersection of artificial intelligence and scientific discovery.

Beyond academic enrichment, the **GAINS Conference 2024** cultivated a profound sense of **community, mentorship, and inspiration** among aspiring young women in STEM. By bridging the gap between students and pioneering professionals, the conference continues to serve as a **catalyst for empowerment**, equipping the next generation of female scientists and engineers with the knowledge, confidence, and connections necessary to thrive in their fields.



GA Hosts Middle School Leadership Summit Inspiring Young Leaders

On November 20, thirty-two middle school leaders from several local schools gathered at Greenwich Academy, the host site for the annual Middle School Leadership Summit. The event provided a dynamic space for students to share ideas, discuss challenges, and collaborate on ways to make a meaningful impact within their schools.



The summit began with a warm welcome from GA School President Alice Grace '25, who shared her thoughts on what leadership means and how young leaders can shape their communities. Energized by her message, the students jumped into their first activityeach school shared a favorite aspect of their own community, celebrating the unique qualities that make their schools special.

From there, the participants split into breakout groups to tackle important leadership questions: How can they actively contribute to positive change? What creative initiatives could they organize? What challenges do young leaders face? And what are the most pressing topics among their peers? The discussions were lively and thoughtprovoking, with students exchanging perspectives and brainstorming solutions.

The summit concluded with each school's leadership group uniting around a goal to implement within their own community. Whether focusing on school spirit, inclusivity, or service projects, these young leaders left the event with a renewed sense of purpose and a plan for action.

The south field will now boast a field hockey-specific short turf with AstroTurf's new state-of-the-art sustainable Poligras Paris GT, which was showcased at the 2024 Paris Olympics and is being installed at top collegiate and professional level fields across the globe. A longer pile, multipurpose surface, AstroTurf RootZone 3D3 will be installed on the Tammaro Field for lacrosse, soccer, and PE classes. Improved spectator seating, scoreboards, and other enhancements will promote spirit and community. Go Gators!

Promoting Global Connectivity

Center for Public Purpose

GA's Center for Public Purpose, now in its eighth year, fosters collaboration among faculty and student leaders seeking to effect positive change by focusing on three core priorities: community [civic] engagement, global initiatives, and diversity, equity and inclusion.

Global Scholars

The Class of 2025 is the **fifteenth cohort** and includes 19 of the 259 Global Scholars to graduate from Greenwich Academy with this distinction.

Global Exchanges

GA partners with **nine different** semester schools to provide Upper School students the opportunity to study off-campus/abroad, as well as the Upper School International Exchange Program with schools in Argentina and France.

Academic and Co-Curricular Travel

This year students were offered **16 different schoolsponsored overnight trips** tied to academic coursework or co-curricular programs.

The Power of Mentorship

Greenwich Academy fosters a strong network of mentorship and career development, as evidenced by the dynamic collaboration between acclaimed writer and GA alumna Courtney Maum '97 and current senior Alessia Cutaia '25. Their partnership, facilitated by GA's Career Resource Center (CRC), highlights the power of mentorship in shaping creative aspirations and professional growth.

A Foundation for Creativity

Courtney Maum, a celebrated author and mentor, credits her formative years at Greenwich Academy with nurturing her love for storytelling. "I was a 'lifer' at GA, so from pre-K on, my love of reading (and eventually, writing) was nourished, cheered, and supported at each turn by my teachers." she reflects. With encouragement from educators like Mrs. Vicidomini. Mr. Schwartz, and Mrs. Vasu. Courtney gained confidence in her craft, which ultimately led to her success as a writer. She is the author of several novels. including Costalegre, Touch, and The Year of the Horses. Passionate about mentorship and creative storytelling, she continues to inspire emerging writers through her workshops and industry insights.

Alessia echoes Courtney's sentiment, "Similar to Courtney, the opportunities at GA such as Daedalus and Somerville Scholars have opened up numerous doors of mentorship and opportunities I didn't know were available." she shares. Entering GA in Group VIII expanded her passion for writing, offering mentorship and academic enrichment that fueled her aspirations.

Connecting Through the CRC

The GA Career Resource Center has played a pivotal role in bridging past and present students, creating valuable mentorship opportunities. Courtney, an advocate for guiding young writers, has been involved in the CRC's internship program for three years. "I run a popular newsletter about the business of publishing, teach online writing classes, and direct an annual writing workshop in New Mexico. So not only do I appreciate (and need!) assistance, but I have a lot to teach emerging writers about the craft of writing," she explains.

For **Alessia**, connecting with the CRC was seamless. "Reaching out to the CRC was much easier than I expected, and the team was incredibly helpful and so kind," she recalls. This connection led her to an invaluable summer internship with Courtney, where she gained handson experience in the literary world.

Lessons Learned and Shared

Mentorship is a two-way street. and both Courtney and Alessia found inspiration in each other. Courtney admired Alessia's enthusiasm, stating, "Even when a task was mundane (like spreadsheet

updating), she always found a way to make it an interesting learning experience." Alessia, in turn, gained a new perspective on the literary industry, particularly in crafting effective query letters. "To see how to build a story that people want to read, and how to promote and sell a story was fascinating," she notes.

Beyond technical skills, their collaboration reinforced essential professional values. "Mentoring has instilled a team player mentality into all I do," Courtney shares. For Alessia. witnessing Courtney's multifaceted career was eyeopening. "I was deeply impressed by how many buckets Courtney was able to place her hands into and with such expertise," she says.

Transformative Connections

Throughout their internship, both Courtney and Alessia experienced moments of growth and inspiration. "Frankly, every moment was memorable for me because Alessia's communication skills were just top-notch," Courtney remarks. In an era where delayed responses and disengagement are common. Alessia's reliability was refreshing.

For Alessia, the most transformative moment was witnessing Courtney's ability to

"Not only was she in the process of writing a book this past summer, but she was teaching classes, aiding in query letter edits, and planning the Turning Points Writers' Retreat in New Mexico. I found Courtney's drive particularly eye-opening," she says.

Alessia's experience with the CRC has broadened her career outlook. "As a high school student. I have often felt that the scope of jobs available for a writer is incredibly narrow. I attribute the CRC to widening my vision on what being a writer can look like," she reflects.

The connection between Courtney and Alessia is a testament to the enduring influence of GA's supportive community. Through the Career Resource Center, students, alumnae, and GA's vast network of professionals in our parent community continue to inspire, guide, and empower one another, proving that mentorship is a lifelong gift.

Taking Action for Our Environment

Middle School Sustainability Club Inspires All



Under the guidance of World Languages Teacher and Sustainability Club Advisor Lee Bruner, Middle School Sustainability Club members engage in hands-on activities throughout the year that are not only educational, but also help the entire GA community develop eco-friendly habits and become responsible stewards of our environment.

INITIATIVES

Food Waste Challenge: Group V enthusiastically participated in a challenge to minimize food waste during the first week of school that raised awareness to carry them through the whole school year.

Food Rescue Program: Club members learn about GA's partnership with Food Rescue USA. Volunteers deliver excess food from the Dining Commons to Kids in Crisis every Friday.

Compost: The girls identified a need for compost bins during outdoor snack time for Groups V and VI, as there were only garbage bins available. We installed a compost bin near the playground area, making composting a regular part of snack routines. LS students have started using it too. Sasaki Associates Visit: Club members learned about sustainability practices from a leading architect at Sasaki's firm, as well as a landscape architect/ecologist. They then created mockup designs for a nature center at Glenville complete with a treehouse, of course!

Earth Day: The MS Sustainability Club partnered with the Town of Greenwich's Sustainability Committee to host a screening of The Box Truck Film with a Q&A featuring the directors in April. The next day, GA hosted the Box Truck on campus. LS and MS students watched short clips during assemblies with the directors and toured the truck throughout the day. GA also sponsored the Box Truck's appearance at the 4th Annual ReThink Waste Fair (hosted by Waste Free Greenwich) at Christ Church the following day.
