She views debate as an educational endeavor, guiding her students to grow academically while also advocating fiercely for their success. She provides a safe space for students to take intellectual risks and develop as individuals."

Rachel Baumann is the Head Coach for Debate at Farmington High School, where she also teaches English and serves as an assistant Speech coach. She is the school's NSDA Chapter Representative, as well as Treasurer of the Minnesota Debate Teachers Association (MDTA) and a member of the Southern Minnesota NSDA District Committee.

Baumann's journey in debate began at age 14 when she joined Rosemount High School Debate. As a high school competitor, she was among the first in the nation to receive the Donus D. Roberts Award for earning over 10,000 NSDA competition points. She started her coaching career at Mankato East High School in 1993 and later served as head debate coach at Forest Lake High School and assistant debate and speech coach at Rosemount High School. In 2018, she revived the debate program at Farmington High School, leading her teams to the Minnesota State Debate Tournament six times. Under her leadership, Farmington has earned:

- State quarterfinalist finishes (4 times)
- State semifinalist finish (1 time)
- State runner-up (1 time)

Two NSDA National Tournament appearances

Baumann has received her second NSDA Diamond Award for Excellence in Coaching and has been recognized with 39 NSDA Service Citations. In 2021, her peers honored her as MDTA Coach of the Year.

Beyond coaching, Baumann plays an integral role in Minnesota debate. She works with the Minnesota State High School League to tabulate section and state debate tournaments, contributes to the Minnesota novice debate packet, and has been a Senior Staff member at the Minnesota Debate and Advocacy Workshop at Augsburg



College. At the national level, she has attended the National Topic Selection Conference twice, presenting proposals for future national debate topics and resolutions. She has also shared her expertise at the Communication and Theater Arts of Minnesota Annual Conference through numerous panels and presentations.

A native of Apple Valley, MN, Baumann earned a bachelor's degree in English and Communication from Concordia College in Moorhead, MN, and an M.A. in Teaching from Minnesota State University, Mankato. Her master's thesis, "Using Debate as a Methodology to Teach Literature in the Secondary English Classroom," was among the first scholarly works to explore the intersection of academic debate and literature instruction in secondary education.

Baumann's commitment to education, advocacy, and student growth makes her a deserving recipient of the 2024 Greg Dawson Excellence in Coaching Award.

Olson Makes History for the FHS Mock Trial Team!






