GOING GREEN

Recycling Club

Stepinac has partnered with We Future Cycle, a 501(c)3 charitable organization that helps schools: comply with New York State recycling laws, reduce lunchroom garbage by 90% by sorting out recyclables, reduce refuse costs significantly, reduce pollution, provide opportunity for green school recognition, create a generation of children that are actively involved in recycling and take responsibility for their daily actions.

Every day at Stepinac, a large amount of recyclable material is thrown out. Half of all garbage in schools is generated during two hours - lunchtime. However, it really isn't "garbage" until you throw it away....

Streaming materials into recycling avenues, even materials previously considered non-recyclable such as food left overs, Styrofoam, juice pouches, chip bags, etc. can reduce waste from school lunch by 90%!

Stepinac established The Recycling Club - The club aims to create awareness of pollution issues and promote widespread recycling in the building. Most trash we produce is sent to landfills to be burned--a practice that releases harmful toxins into the air we breathe and contributes to climate change. If we properly composted/recycled our daily trash output at Stepinac, we could reduce our waste by 90% and make our community a safer place to live.

Solar Panels installed on Roof

Stepinac will now use solar energy in an effort to help fight global warming. The Energy Department at the Archdiocese of New York launched its pilot solar program in 2018 at five Catholic schools in New York State, "Stepinac is thrilled to become a host for clean, renewable energy by taking part in the Archdiocese's solar program," said Rev. Thomas Collins, president of Stepinac.

"In addition to supporting sustainable energy while cutting energy costs and creating a physical demonstration of our commitment to preserving the environment for future generations, we will leverage the program as an educational aid by teaching our students about the latest clean energy technologies." Stepinac is partnering with Con Edison Solutions to install rooftop solar arrays -- which are several combined solar panels. The solar systems are being installed to serve the electrical needs at Stepinac.



“No Student Left Behind” Provides Pandemic Relief

Stepinac’s No Student Left Behind campaign raised over \$300,000 and made possible the continued education of 24 students this fall, with more to be invested in the coming months.

Launched last May, in the early, worst months of the Covid-19 pandemic, school leadership envisioned No Student Left Behind, as a summer effort to build a reserve of funds to help the families most economically impacted continue their son’s Stepinac education.

Despite very uncertain times, the generosity of the Stepinac family comprising alumni (both longstanding and young alumni still in college), parents, faculty, staff, and numerous friends of the school again exceeded expectations: More than 500 donors responded to mail appeals and participated in three special virtual events held in July and August.

During the procession, the students— dressed in their caps and gowns— stepped out of their cars and had photos taken with their parents/guardians. 

Two Stepinac High School Students Are Finalists In Prestigious 2020 GENIUS Olympiad's International High School Competition for Unique Engineering Project

Julian Mueller of Tarrytown and Devlin Hose of Garrison recently joined the prestigious finalist ranks in the 2020 GENIUS Olympiad's international high school competition focused on environmental issues. Their collaborative engineering project, a vertical axis wind turbine (VAWT) that operates more efficiently during powerful storms, was presented at the 10th annual GENIUS Olympiad, to be hosted later this year by the Rochester Institute of Technology. The Stepinac juniors will be among 2,000 students from 78 countries whose creativity in eight categories—from science and robotics to music composition and short film—will be showcased. Mr. Stefan Busheski, Stepinac computer science and engineering instructor, said: "From the turbine fin to the axel joints, Julian and Devlin turned their visionary engineering concepts into a reality," adding: "We congratulate them on the college-level research and engineering talents they applied over the course of five months. In working so seamlessly together, they also epitomized Stepinac's collaborative model that underpins our students' solutions-based drive."



Kyle Shepherd, Stepinac Senior, Completes Town of Greenburgh Annual Summer Intern Program with Distinction

Kyle Shepherd recently completed with distinction the Town of Greenburgh's 12th Annual Summer Intern Program. Because of the pandemic, the six-week internship was conducted totally virtually. Shepherd was among a group of 30 interns who participated in the program designed to prepare Greenburgh's youth for success by fostering communication, teamwork, problem solving and leadership skills. Among the prominent individuals

Shepherd and the other interns conducted Zoom interviews with were Hillary Clinton, David Kaplan, author of The New York Times Best Seller: "The Most Dangerous Branch: Inside the Supreme Court's Assault on the Constitution;" and Barrett Seaman, former TIME Magazine Correspondent and White House Correspondent, Shepherd was given the honor of introducing Clinton to the Zoom participants, a highlight of the summer program. An academically top performing student and member of Stepinac High School's Health Sciences Honors Academy, Shepherd discussed his collaboration with other interns to produce a series of video public service announcements that were aired over the Town of Greenburgh's public access TV stations.

Concern that Teens at Other Area High Schools Lacked Learning Resources in Crisis Led Academically Top Performing Student to Volunteer His Time as Remote Tutor

When traditional face-to-face classes ended on March 16, Nicholas DeSanctis of Ossining, a junior at Stepinac, was concerned that other high school students in the area who were suddenly thrust into a challenging learning environment might be in need of guidance in subjects he knew best as an academically top-performing student—math and science. And because DeSanctis had also been actively engaged in Stepinac's Campus Ministry program donating his time to worthwhile community causes including the school's massive SOUPer Bowl food drive and helping the homeless, he would provide the tutoring service free of charge from his home-based study via Facetime sessions. "I felt that the pandemic would probably create a need for other students who might lack the resources or having a hard time adjusting to distance learning," said DeSanctis, adding: "I would be happy to help them continue their education during this crisis."

Ryan Garceau '21 (pictured) prepared food for the staff working at the Javits Center through World Central Kitchen.


Julian Mueller '21 collected items to serve families at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Food Pantry in Elmsford.

Mychal Riccio '20 Boys State Attendee and Cadet at The United States Coast Guard Academy

Mychal Riccio '20, who entered the Coast Guard Academy this summer, attended the 2019 session of Boys State. Boys State is among the most respected and selective educational programs of government instruction for high school students. A program in which students become part of the operation of local, county and state government begin in 1935. At Boys State, participants learn the rights, privileges and responsibilities of franchised citizens. American Legion posts select high school juniors to attend the program. » R.J. Davis named NYS Mr. Basketball

The North Carolina signee was named New York's Mr. Basketball by the Basketball Coaches Association of New York last March. In doing so, the All-American guard became the first player in Stepinac history ever awarded the title. It was a season of firsts for R.J. Davis. "Coming into my senior year, I wanted to complete some of my goals and for me to achieve one of the big ones, Mr. Basketball, is something special," Davis said. "I'm very fortunate and grateful and now there is more work to be done and more accomplishments to tackle." As a senior, Davis averaged 26.5 points, 8.0 rebounds, 5.3 assists and 2.1 steals per game for the Crusaders, who were 18-9 and had just won the CHSAA's Archdiocesan title over St. Raymond. Stepinac was preparing for the CHSAA 'AA' quarterfinals before the season was suspended. The Crusaders finished Top 15 Nationally for the second time in three seasons. Davis also broke Danya Abrams' Westchester County scoring record last season, which had stood for 27 years. He finished his decorated career at Stepinac with 2,446 points, which is the fifth-most in CHSAA history and just 175 behind record-holder Kenny Anderson, a former Mr. Basketball who played at Archbishop Molloy and later became a star at Georgia Tech and with the New Jersey Nets.

Davis's other awards include: he became the first Stepinac player ever to be named a McDonald's All-American, Jordan Brand All-American, Gatorade New York State Player of the Year and Iverson Classic invitee. He was named The Journal News Player of the Decade for the 2010's and was tabbed as the CHSAA's league Most Valuable Player after being named first-team all-league as a Sophomore and Junior.



» Crusaders fall to Hayes in CHSFL Finals

It was the dream start that Stepinac wanted. On the first play of the CHSFL 'AAA' title game against Cardinal Hayes at Mitchell Field, the Crusaders forced a turnover. On their first offensive play, Kyle Benjamin burst down the middle for a 66-yard touchdown to put Stepinac up 7-0.

But the dream would turn into a nightmare of sorts. Hayes would tie the game later in the quarter, and eventually railed off 25 unanswered points to score a 25-7 win, avenging an earlier loss to Stepinac in the regular season to claim the title. "We had a great year, the kids played their hearts out."

Stepinac head coach Michael O'Donnell said. "We met up with a very, very talented team. We had our chances, and we just didn't capitalize." It was the fourth time in the past five years that the two teams have played each other in this title game. Last year, Hayes came out on top by a 29-18 score. "They are a really fast, athletic team and they always come to play," Hayes senior linebacker Kevin McKenna said. "Their mentality is similar to ours; all they want to do is win, and today they got it done." Hayes senior running back Jalen Smith, who didn't play in the regular season matchup between the two teams, showed off his athleticism late in the second quarter. With Hayes up 13-7, Smith found room down the left sideline, juke a couple tacklers and scampered down 70 yards to put the Cardinals up 19-7 with 1:25 left in the first half, stunning Stepinac. "He's a dynamic player," O'Donnell said. "He is probably the best back in the league. Having him back in the lineup, they can beat anybody they play."


