William Plunkett '58, Stepinac Hall of Fame '95 and the inaugural Chairman of Stepinac's Board of Trustees, passed peacefully at the age of 82. He was predeceased by his wife, Caryl, in 2015. They had six children together.

While a student at Stepinac he was an outstanding athlete and involved in a variety of other school activities. After graduating he attended the College of the Holy Cross and New York University Law School. Bill was an attorney and founding partner and president of Plunkett & Jaffe PC. Through his life, Bill was honored by many organizations including the National Conference of Christians and Jews and was a recipient of the Ellis Island Medal of Honor.

On Friday, May 5th, Stepinac commemorated its 75th Anniversary with a Gala Celebration. The event was held at the Westchester Country Club and saw the inaugural Board of Trustees being honored.

It was fitting that we recognize the significant transformational contributions the inaugural Board of Trustees made in laying the foundation for Stepinac as a highly successful self-governing school at the time of independence in 2009.



The night started with cocktails, hors d'oeuvres, and a performance from Stepinac's Jersey Boys. Dinner followed and remarks were given by Rev. Thomas Collins '79, Kevin Plunkett '67, and Kevin Keane '74. The night concluded with a Text to Donate segment that saw the Stepinac community raise over \$100,000 to name a new Active Learning Center in recognition of our honorees.

Stepinac High School Honors Academy Students Address Staggering Opioid Crisis at Fifth Annual Symposium

Once again, the academically top-performing students of Stepinac High School's groundbreaking Susan and Daniel P. Mahoney Honors Academy addressed a daunting, real-world issue at its recent Fifth Annual Symposium. This year, it was the staggering Opioid Crisis which in the U.S. is claiming more than 110,000 lives a year, shattering the lives of millions of people and exacting an economic toll estimated at more than \$1.3 trillion.

During the 90-minute session held at Stepinac's gymnasium, a gathering of members from the community, parents, and members of the administration learned the disturbing facts the Academy students had uncovered regarding one of the most devastating public health disasters. They also learned some of the strategies the young investigators are proposing including opioid drugs buyback programs, mitigation centers, safe usage booths, alternative treatments, and drugs, among a host of practical approaches to help resolve the crisis.

They reviewed the three main classes of opioids which include naturally occurring opioids, semi-synthetic opioids, and fully-synthetic; what makes them so addictive; how addiction begins in the body; its effects on breathing and heart rate; long-term effects on health; the three medications that the FDA has approved to treat chronic opioid use disorder-- Methadone, Buprenorphine and Naloxone-- and how opioid deaths have shortened life expectancy across the U.S. population since 2015.

They presented alternative and preventable solutions that they estimate will save the state \$26 billion while saving lives. Among their proposals is a buyback program of prescription pills via the placement of five buyback stations in Westchester hospitals that serve large populations.

Stepinac High School Finishes in Top Tier of 2022 Bloomberg Global Trading Challenge

In a field dominated by colleges and universities, Stepinac High School's team comprises five members of the Susan and Daniel P. Mahoney Economics and Finance Honors Academy impressively ranked 99 out of 946 teams that vied for the top honors in the 2022 Bloomberg Global Trading Challenge. The financially savvy investors from Stepinac also placed 31 among the 327 teams in the final North America rankings. Teams were each given \$1 million in virtual U.S. dollars to invest in stocks.

The objective of the challenge was to outperform the Bloomberg WLS Index. To put the Stepinac team's performance in perspective, it was pitted against the likes of teams from Bucknell, Columbia, CUNY Baruch College, Chinese University of Hong Kong, Copenhagen Business School, Villanova, University of Liverpool, Mercy College, among others. This year's first place winner was a team from the University of Southampton, Great Britain.

TIMMY CLEARY '24 FINISHES IN THE TOP 20 IN THE NEW YORK STATE FEDERATION GOLF TOURNAMENT

Rising Senior Timmy Cleary had a very busy summer on the greens throughout New York State. Before the season even started, Cleary was named by Lohud as one of the golfers to watch during this past season.

After an impressive season for the Crusaders, Cleary placed fourth in the CHSAA State Championship and qualified to play in the New York State Federation High School Championship on Bethpage Black in the beginning of June. He would go on to place 16th.

Cleary then went on to qualify and participate in the New York State Boys Amateur Championship at the Lake Placid Club in upstate New York. After 36 holes, Cleary made the cut of 40 out of 120 golfers. He played in the final round on July 28th and finished in the top 20 after three consecutive rounds of 74-74-74.

Timmy was the only golfer from Westchester County, Brooklyn, Queens, and The Bronx, from the CHSAA, to qualify for States.

STEPINAC'S PRODUCTION OF JERSEY BOYS EARNS SEVEN METRO AWARD NOMINATIONS

Stepinac Theatre's National High School Premiere of *Jersey Boys* garnered the All-Boys Catholic High School with seven Metro Award nominations. The Metro Awards shine a spotlight on the exceptional musical theater productions, talented actors and actresses, and devoted creative teams who take to the stage every spring in high schools in Rockland, Westchester, Putnam, and Bergen counties.



Calvin Lindo '24, who played Frankie Valli, won the Best Leading Actor Award for the role at the 13th Annual Roger Rees Awards for Outstanding Lead Actor in a Musical for Greater New York. Lindo received the award from Rick Elice, the man who wrote the book for the smash-hit musical about the famous rock 'n' roll band, The Four Seasons.

The award earned Lindo the opportunity to vie for a top honor in The Broadway League Foundation's The Jimmy Awards, also known as the National High School Musical Theatre Awards. Lindo represented the Greater New York area as the best actor in the country for the 2023 school year. Lindo also received nominations for outstanding vocal performance by a male-identifying performer and outstanding performance of a duet, which he shared with Ava Pursel of Pelham Memorial High School.

STEPINAC UNDERTAKES SINGLE LARGEST EXPANSION TO DATE

This past summer, Stepinac undertook the single largest expansion in the school's history. The project included transforming five classrooms on the first floor into cutting-edge Active Learning Centers, modeled after Columbia University's non-traditional, 21st century classrooms, and a 5,000 square-foot STEAM Center Wing.

In addition, the STEAM Center Wing represents more than double the space of the original, 2,200 square foot STEAM Center, one of several advanced real-world learning technologies Stepinac established two years ago. The new Wing will be completely dedicated to the STEAM real-world learning curriculum to meet the students' increased interest in taking their specialized academic studies to the next level.

The project includes the conversion of an unused locker area into breakout spaces for flexible and small-scale instruction. In addition, 1,000 square feet of new space was created to house a 3-D Printing Design Center; an Interactive Anatomy Lab where health sciences students can explore the complexities of the human body in



When the new spaces are completed, Stepinac will have a total of nine Active Learning Centers comprising of about 5,4000 square feet of space that "create a singular, one-of-a-kind learning experience for all students, unlike anything in the region."





MONSIGNOR ANTHONY MARCHITELLI

Monsignor Anthony Marchitelli entered eternal life on October 28, 2022. Born in New York City, Msgr. Marchitelli was the President of Stepinac High School from 2003 to 2011. Under his leadership in 2009, Stepinac became an independent high school in the Archdiocese

of New York. He served the Catholic Church and the Archdiocese of New York for more than 46 years, becoming ordained as a Roman Catholic Priest on December 11, 1976. Msgr. Marchitelli was inducted into Stepinac's Hall of Fame in 2018.



RAY BRODERICK

Ray Broderick passed away peacefully on October 19, 2022, at the age of 92. After graduating from White Plains High School in 1947, Ray served in the United States Army for three and a half years. He was called to active duty in 1953 and was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant. Ray sent all three of

his sons (Edward '78, Donald '82, and Russell '87) to Stepinac and then established, with his wife, Fran, the Donald R. Broderick Scholarship after Donald's death in 1986.



CARMELO SANTORO '59

Carmelo Santoro passed away on May 1, 2023, in Rancho Santa Fe, California at the age of 82. Born in 1941 in Port Chester, Santoro received his Bachelor of Science degree from Manhattan College in 1963 and his Doctor of Physics degree from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in 1967. While at Stepinac, Santoro excelled in

dramatics and science, and was noted for his exactness.
