His Eminence Timothy Cardinal Dolan VISITS STEPINAC

When Archbishop Stepinac High School first opened its doors in 1948, His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman was here. When the school celebrated 25 years in 1973, His Eminence Terrance Cardinal Cooke was here. In 1998, celebrating 50 years, His Eminence John Cardinal O'Connor was here. It was only fitting for Stepinac's 75th Anniversary, that we kick off the school year with His Eminence Timothy Cardinal Dolan.



The Archbishop of New York visited Stepinac on September 19th and presided over the Mass of the Holy Spirit, celebrated with the entire student body, faculty, and staff. Also in attendance were members of the school's Board of Trustees, Foundation Board, parents, and many others.

In his homily, Cardinal Dolan told the congregation the story of Cardinal Stepinac, a Croatian who maintained his Catholic faith in the face of the Nazi and Communist regimes. He stressed the importance of staying true to one's values. His Eminence concluded the Mass of the Holy Spirit by blessing the front doors of the school, just as Cardinal Spellman did 75 years ago to celebrate the opening.



The entire Stepinac community encouraged Cardinal Dolan to return to the school often. His visit was a marvelous way to kick off the schools 75th Anniversary.




GRADUATION CLASS OF 2022





Stepinac senior and resident of Yonkers, Jacob Rocque, was awarded the prestigious Enrico Fermi Education Fund of Yonkers Scholarship after his essay was chosen as one of the top entries. A Helping Hand Club Provides Nutritional Snacks for the Homeless

Stepinac's A Helping Hand Club, a social service club specifically focused on helping the homeless in White Plains, successfully led a campaign to provide snack bags, along with hand-written notes, for homeless men, women, and children who are served by Lifting Up Westchester.

Led by club moderator Mrs. Kilkelly, members of A Helping Hand Club were seeking a variety of snack items to fill 60 snack bags during the week-long drive. However, with the generosity of students, parents, faculty, and friends, were able to prepare and deliver 244 snack bags to Lifting Up Westchester to distribute to the homeless.

Also known as "blessing bags," the bags comprised of nutritional snacks – from crackers and health bars to chocolate and juice boxes. Members of Stepinac's A Helping Hand Club also cook food to feed the homeless at a local soup kitchen and collect nonperishable foods and clothing to be delivered to two homeless shelters in White Plains.

Stepinac Rising Senior Honors Memory of Revolutionary War Patriots

Based at Sacred Heart in Yonkers, Michael Del Vecchio organized members of Scout Troop 12 in honoring the memories of Revolutionary War Patriots.

A rising senior at Stepinac High School, **Del Vecchio**, who is an Eagle Scout for Troop 12, was discussing potential projects for his troop to take part in. After much thought, he learned about St. John's Cemetery, the first burial ground in Yonkers. When he later discovered that several Revolutionary War soldiers were buried there, he devised a plan to give these forgotten soldiers the recognition they deserved.

This wasn't an easy task. After working with St. John's Episcopal Church in researching church records, cemetery burial records, and grave locations, he was soon able to find the locations of all these Revolutionary War heroes in Yonkers.

Along with members of Troop 12, **Del Vecchio** presented the Roll Call of Honor, in which each scout gave a detailed description of each fallen soldier. They also placed a flag and a Revolutionary War medallion on each grave to mark what they had done for their country. After paying respect to the 17 soldiers and giving a detailed history of the cemetery, Del Vecchio closed the ceremony by thanking everyone who helped him on this journey.

STEPINAC HIGH SCHOOL HONORS ACADEMY STUDENTS ADDRESS “Space Exploration – Colonizing Mars” AT ANNUAL SYMPOSIUM

The academically top-performing students set their sights more than 100 million miles from Earth as the topic for their fourth annual Symposium, “Space Exploration—Colonizing Mars.” To help space flight crews undertake scientific missions on Mars, the Engineering Academy students constructed a model of a rover featuring omnidirectional movement and 360 pan-tilt grabbing capabilities for gathering soil samples and rocks. The rover was designed with the flexibility of being manually or autonomously controlled.

The students also created an artificial Martian environment (both the atmosphere with high levels of carbon dioxide and soil composition are toxic to humans) to conduct scientific experiments by constructing a Martian capsule. It comprises two compartments, one containing water and the second high concentrations of carbon dioxide and soil that is chemically close to one on Mars.

The Economics and Finance Academy investigators researched and analyzed economic, financial, and monetary systems throughout history and how it could operate on a Martian colony.

Law Academy students examined international laws and treaties to determine what effects they could have in governing the red planet. Their analysis includes the legal framework for the International Space Station which defines the rights and obligations of each of the countries and their jurisdiction and control of the space station.

Health Sciences Academy students tackled the daunting issues of keeping astronauts healthy while traveling nine months through space, settling, and living on Mars in an artificial environment.

» Adrian Griffin Jr. BECOMES FIRST STEPINAC ALUMNUS TO BE DRAFTED IN THE FIRST ROUND OF THE NBA DRAFT.

Archbishop Stepinac High School graduate **AJ Griffin**, class of 2021, was selected by the Atlanta Hawks with the 16th pick in the first round of the 2022 NBA Draft June 23, 2022.

Griffin, who is only 18 years old, averaged 10.4 points and 3.9 rebounds per game under Coach Mike Krzyzewski in his lone season at Duke. He shot 49.3% from the floor and 44.7% from beyond the arc in route to the 2022 NCAA Final Four.

The 6-foot-6 guard helped the Stepinac Crusaders win a state federation championship in 2018. He finished his career at Stepinac with over 1,000 points and over 400 rebounds. AJ then became the first Stepinac graduate to attend Duke from the basketball program. Members of the Stepinac basketball program attended the NBA Draft at the Barclays Center in Brooklyn last June.



Stepinac High School Lacrosse Wins 2022 NYCHSAA "AA" Championship

In what is known as one of the biggest Catholic School rivalries in all of Westchester, the Archbishop Stepinac Lacrosse team defeated the Iona Prep Lacrosse team to become the 2022 NYCHSAA "AA" Champions, 6 to 5. Goalie Denny Piekutowski finished the game with 15 saves and Andrew Girolamo knocked in five of the teams six goals. The win marked the Crusaders first ever "AA" Lacrosse Championship. The Stepinac Lacrosse team would go on to defeat Kellenberg Memorial in the CHSAA Intersectional Semifinals but would later fall to Iona Prep in the CHSAA Intersectional Final. Congratulations on a remarkable and unforgettable season!

obituaries



FRANCIS P. MCINTYRE '51

Francis Patrick McIntyre (Frank) passed away July 29, 2022. Born in Port Chester in 1933, Frank was a member of Stepinac's first graduating class in 1951. He received a BS degree in Electrical Engineering from Manhattan College and a MS degree in Electrical Engineering from Columbia University. Frank worked for Riverside Research and for 51 years and was

awarded the President's Award as a mentor to his fellow workers and for his dedication. In 2017, Frank established The Francis P. McIntyre Engineering Scholarship at Stepinac. The criteria for the scholarship were simple; the graduating senior(s) had to maintain a 90+ average and had to major in engineering in college. Later, it was amended to also include students who planned to major in Math. Currently McIntyre Scholars are studying at: Harvard, Columbia, MIT, RPI, and his beloved Manhattan College.



ARTHUR CIOCCA '55

Arthur Angelo Ciocca was born on December 5, 1937 in Tarrytown. He is survived by his wife of 40 years, Carlyse Franzia, and two sisters, Helene Hanson and Madalyn McCaleb. Art was a member of the class of 1955 and was inducted in Stepinac's Hall of Fame in 2016. Art graduated from the College of Holy Cross and was commissioned Ensign in the US Navy in 1959.

While in the Navy, Art attended night school and received an MBA from Roosevelt University. In 1975 Art was hired as President of Franzia Winery with the mandate to build a branded wine business from a struggling commodity portfolio. In 1981, he led a successful leveraged buyout and purchased the company with his five business partners. He renamed it The Wine Group. Under Art's leadership, Franzia and The Wine Group grew from a struggling commodity business into the second largest wine company in America. Art retired in 2014 and remained Founder and Chairman Emeritus. Art served on many for-profit and not-for-profit boards and has written two books. 
