

# eAOP PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Early Academic Outreach Program (EAOP) was established at **IN 1976...** every University of California campus. EAOP serves as the UCs oldest and largest college preparatory program.

**OUR MISSION...** Prepare first-generation and underrepresented students for higher education.

**IMPACT...** UC Riverside's EAOP staff works with over 20 high schools across the Riverside and San Bernardino areas and each year helps hundreds of high school graduates with admission into **UCs, Cal States, and other top colleges** across the state and country.



# ACADEMIC ADVISING

EAOP staff visit school sites weekly and provide: In-person, one-on-one or group advising via EAOP coordinators.

- Students receive a pass during their elective period.
- Meet with EAOP staff at least once per semester.

During advising sessions:

- Review your transcript and make an academic plan.
- Discuss your career and educational goals.
- Learn about different majors, academic programs, college systems, admission requirements, and financial aid information.



# EAOP EVENTS

Planned throughout the academic year and summer.

Offered virtually or in-person and in Spanish upon request!

Participants attend at least one (1) event per academic year.

# FAMILY ENGAGEMENT ROLE

I am here to...

- Provide support, education, and outreach services to parents and families of high school students.
- Provide resources, tools, and support as you and your child navigate the higher education system.
- Advise parents and families on the options available within higher education.
- Encourage parents and families to promote a college going culture at home.
- Work closely with EAOP regional coordinators, school districts, school sites, and their staff to provide the support needed to promote and maintain a college going culture on their campuses.



# COLLEGE PREPARATION TIMELINE BY GRADE LEVEL

## 9<sup>th</sup> Grade Family College Prep Timeline

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Meet the high school counselor to learn which classes meet "a-g" college entrance requirements and ensure enrollment in these courses. Ask about honors and/or AP/IB courses that may be available at the school.</li> <li>Some high schools have educational outreach or college readiness programs such as EAOP, Cal-SOAP, or Upward Bound. Please visit your district or school website to see which programs serve your child's school.</li> <li>Attend Back to School Night and/or visit the school to meet with your child's teachers and counselors. Ask how to best communicate with them (in person, on the phone/text, parent portal/app, or email), and let them know how you expect your child to be ready for college. Determine when report cards come out and ask for updates on grades.</li> <li>Help your child create a four-year class schedule that meets both high school graduation and a-g college entrance requirements. See the EAOP Academic Planner available to all students online at <a href="https://eaop.universityofcalifornia.edu/resources/">https://eaop.universityofcalifornia.edu/resources/</a></li> <li>Check the school website for event information, testing dates, attendance reports, and obtain access to your child's grades.</li> <li>Remind your child to meet with their EAOP Coordinator and to register for upcoming EAOP events.</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Talk to your student about their academic strengths and weaknesses. Consider tutoring at the school or in your community to strengthen weaknesses.</li> <li>Check in with teachers and counselor; find out how your student is doing academically and socially.</li> <li>Encourage your student to take honors courses in strong subjects the following year.</li> <li>Help your student start a college information folder for materials on college related topics.</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Explore summer academic enrichment opportunities for your student. Many application deadlines are in March or earlier.</li> <li>Encourage and help your student look for summer jobs or internships early. Consider those that develop leadership skills or explore an academic interest.</li> <li>Check in with teachers and counselors; find out how your student is doing academically and socially.</li> <li>Prepare and plan for your student's sophomore year of high school. Review a-g course list and enroll in classes accordingly. Ask about honors and/or AP/IB courses that may be available at the school.</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Finalize summer plans for you and your student.</li> <li>Encourage and help your student create a summer reading list. Teachers, counselors, and the local library will have recommendations.</li> <li>Prepare and plan for the fall.</li> </ul>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Remind your student to sign up to take the PSAT in October at their high school or at another high school in the community. For more about PSAT, visit the website at <a href="http://www.collegeboard.com/student/testing/psat/req.html">http://www.collegeboard.com/student/testing/psat/req.html</a></li> <li>Meet your student's teachers, reintroduce yourself to the counselor and discuss your student's preparation for college.</li> <li>Take a tour of a local college or university while classes are in session to get a feel for the campus with your student.</li> <li>Remind your student to meet with their EAOP Coordinator and to register for upcoming EAOP events. To stay up to date, please visit our website at <a href="https://eaop.ucr.edu">https://eaop.ucr.edu</a></li> <li>Have your student make a list of "target" colleges he or she is considering. Consider location, size, campus resources, and student demographics.</li> <li>Ensure that your student is familiar with the entrance requirements for target schools.</li> <li>Attend a College Fair or College Night with your student.</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Encourage your student to talk to friends who are home for college winter break about their college experience. Consider talking with their parents to get a parent perspective.</li> <li>Your student's PSAT score report will arrive in December; this will help identify challenge areas for the SAT Reasoning Exam.</li> <li>Have your student ask the school counselor about the fee waivers for the SAT exams. Eligible students can receive up to two waivers.</li> <li>With your student carefully review the spring SAT Reasoning and SAT Subject Exam schedule and register online. Subject Exams should be taken as soon as possible after completing the appropriate coursework. Testing schedules and practice exams are available at <a href="http://www.collegeboard.com">www.collegeboard.com</a>. Register 6-8 weeks before each exam to ensure preferred testing date and location.</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Continue college visits with your student while classes are in session.</li> <li>Encourage your student to take at least one full length practice exam before the SAT Reasoning Exam.</li> <li>Your student should review their senior year class schedule with their counselor, including selection of possible AP or community college courses.</li> <li>Begin actively searching for scholarships and financial aid with your student.</li> <li>Use tools such as the online FAFSA Forecaster (<a href="https://studentaid.gov/aid-estimator">https://studentaid.gov/aid-estimator</a>) to help calculate how much financial aid your student will receive and to estimate your Expected Family Contribution (EFC).</li> <li>Help your student explore summer jobs, academic enrichment, and volunteer opportunities. Be aware of application requirements and deadlines.</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Finalize summer plans with your student.</li> <li>If taking a summer vacation, include a college tour!</li> <li>Encourage your student to create a summer reading list. Teachers, counselors, and the local library will have recommendations.</li> <li>Encourage your student to complete a draft of the personal statement. Help your student look into workshops offered by college preparation programs at local colleges, as they can provide the information and structure your student may need to get started.</li> <li>Assist your student in narrowing the list of schools to which he or she plans to apply. The list should include "safe", "realistic" and "reach" schools. Ensure that your student makes a checklist of admissions requirements (transcripts, application fees, test scores, recommendation letters, essays, financial aid applications, etc.).</li> <li>Together, mark a calendar with important application and financial dates and deadlines for senior year.</li> <li>Have your student create their FSA (Federal Student Aid) ID or CADAA (California Dream Act Account) Account. Visit <a href="https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa">https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa</a> or <a href="https://dream.csac.ca.gov">https://dream.csac.ca.gov</a></li> <li>If your student plans to take the ACT, SAT Reasoning or SAT Subject Exams in the fall, he or she should register now to ensure a top choice date and test location. Remember that the December test date is the last time to take the exam to meet college application deadlines.</li> </ul>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Review the four-year academic plan with your student. Your student should talk with his or her counselor about fulfilling college requirements and to ensure enrollment in challenging elective courses. Ask about honors and/or AP/IB courses that may be available at the school.</li> <li>Remind your student to meet with their EAOP Coordinator and to register for upcoming EAOP events. To stay up to date, please visit our website at <a href="https://eaop.ucr.edu/">https://eaop.ucr.edu/</a></li> <li>Recommend your student to register early for the October PSAT. Find out dates and more information about the PSAT from the school guidance office and EAOP website.</li> <li>Meet your student's teachers and counselor.</li> <li>Participate with your student in a College Fair, and attend a college financial aid workshop, if offered.</li> <li>Advise your student to seek help to improve in challenging subjects. Inquire about resources available to assist your student, resources are also available on the EAOP website <a href="https://eaop.ucr.edu/resources-parents-family-members">https://eaop.ucr.edu/resources-parents-family-members</a></li> <li>Help your student identify extracurricular activities compatible with interest and your family schedule. If your student is already involved with extracurricular activities, encourage him or her to consider leadership positions.</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>If your student took the PSAT in October, review the score report and identify challenge areas with him or her. This will help your student prepare for the SAT Reasoning Exam the following year.</li> <li>Encourage your student to research colleges and costs of attendance.</li> <li>Discuss careers with your student; encourage your student to start a dialogue with people whose careers are of interest to him or her.</li> <li>Talk with your student about progress in school. Encourage enrollment in Honors and AP courses in strong subjects.</li> <li>With your student, take a tour of a local college or university while classes are in session to get a feel for what the campus is like.</li> <li>Have your student set up a separate email account to receive all college-related correspondence. Tip: ensure that the email address is appropriate and professional.</li> <li>Talk to your student about setting up free online accounts with <a href="http://www.collegeboard.com">www.collegeboard.com</a> *, <a href="http://www.csumentor.edu">www.csumentor.edu</a> **, and the individual UC campus websites***.</li> <li>*The College Board account allows students to research colleges nationally, and even helps students prepare for the SAT Reasoning Exam through an email "Question of the Day." Parents can opt to have these emails sent to them as well. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>**CSU Mentor will help your student learn about the CSU system, research CSU campuses, and in the senior year, apply for admission.</li> <li>***If a student is interested in UC Riverside, create a free account at <a href="http://my.ucr.edu/">http://my.ucr.edu/</a> and the University will keep the student posted on the admission process, deadlines, and cool events.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Encourage your student to explore summer jobs, academic enrichment, and volunteer opportunities. Make sure the student is aware of application requirements and deadlines. Counselors may have information about summer programs offered at local college campuses.</li> <li>Your student should meet with the counselor to discuss junior year course selection, including AP/Honors courses.</li> <li>As academic enrichment, have your student attend a summer course at a community college. High school students take courses for free and can potentially earn Honors or college credit on approved courses.</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Finalize summer plans with your student.</li> <li>Make sure your child has a summer reading list and a summer reading goal. Teachers, counselors, and the local library will have recommendations.</li> </ul>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Together, review admission requirements and deadlines for all schools to which your student will apply. Meet with the counselor to review details.</li> <li>If your student plans to apply to the UC system, have them review, choose, and start writing their Personal Insight Questions (PIQ's) early.</li> <li>Remind your student to meet with their EAOP Coordinator and to register for upcoming EAOP events. To stay up to date, please visit our website at <a href="https://eaop.ucr.edu">https://eaop.ucr.edu</a></li> <li>If your student plans to take the ACT, SAT Reasoning or SAT Subject Exams this fall, he or she should register now.</li> <li>If needed, your student can apply for college application fee waivers directly through the colleges. All students who receive an SAT fee waiver are eligible for four application fee waivers from the College Board.</li> <li>Attend a College Fair or College Open House with your student.</li> <li>Help your student identify 3 or 4 trusted individuals to review application materials. Provide reviewers with materials early so they have ample time to strengthen the application.</li> <li>Ensure that your student asks for any required recommendation letters at least three weeks before the due date(s). Give each recommender required forms, resume and a stamped, addressed envelope.</li> <li>Help your student ensure that the school guidance office sends transcripts to colleges (only if required by college).</li> <li>Have your student create their FSA (Federal Student Aid) ID or CADAA (California Dream Act Account) Account and apply for financial aid. The application opens October 1. Visit <a href="https://studentaid.gov">https://studentaid.gov</a> or <a href="https://dream.csac.ca.gov">https://dream.csac.ca.gov</a></li> <li>The time to apply to CSU's and UC's is between October 1 and November 30.</li> <li>Your student should send his or her SAT scores to the colleges where he or she has applied.</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Encourage your student to talk to college friends on winter break about how to prepare for the first semester/quarter of college.</li> <li>Many scholarship applications are due in December.</li> <li>File your taxes as early as possible.</li> <li>Have your student create a Federal Student Aid (FSA ID) and create your own or CADAA (California Dream Act) account. Visit <a href="https://studentaid.gov">https://studentaid.gov</a> or <a href="https://dream.csac.ca.gov">https://dream.csac.ca.gov</a></li> <li>Attend a Financial Aid night at your student's high school and/or in your community, such as a "Cash for College" event (<a href="http://www.californiacashforcollege.org">www.californiacashforcollege.org</a>). Remember, the priority deadline for FAFSA is March 2.</li> <li>Approximately four weeks after completing the FAFSA, your family will receive the Student Aid Report (SAR), a summary of the information provided on the FAFSA. Make any necessary changes and return.</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>If your student plans to attend community college in the fall, apply now.</li> <li>Encourage your student to look for a summer job, internship or volunteer opportunity early.</li> <li>Your student should prepare early for AP exams held the first 2 weeks in May. A qualifying grade can earn college credit at many colleges. Have your student send scores to the college he or she will attend in the fall.</li> <li>Most admissions decisions and financial aid award letters will arrive in April.</li> <li>Compare aid award letters. Talk to financial aid officers if you have any questions. If your student has not received enough aid, ask if other options are available.</li> <li>If your student has been waitlisted, he or she should contact the admissions director and express continued interest in the school.</li> <li>Your student should notify all colleges of his or her acceptance or rejection of admissions or financial aid offers by May 1st and send a deposit to the chosen college.</li> <li>Find out about test dates for placement exams your student's college may require.</li> <li>Encourage your student to maintain good grades and attendance. Universities want to see continued growth!</li> <li>Together, explore summer preparatory programs at the college your student will attend. These programs offer opportunities to take courses for credit and provide skills and information for a successful start to college.</li> <li>If your student is not admitted to any of the colleges to which he or she applied, see the counselor right away to discuss options.</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Your student's final transcript should be sent to the college he or she will attend in the fall</li> <li>Finalize summer plans.</li> <li>Help your student prepare for the following school year.</li> <li>Celebrate your family's hard work and accomplishments!</li> </ul>

## 10th Grade

### **Recommended Courses:**

- 10th Grade English
- Geometry or higher-level
- Laboratory Science

### ***And at least two:***

- History
- Language other than English
- Visual and Performing Arts
- AP/IB/Honors Elective(s)

### **Minimum Requirements:**

- 9th & 10th Grade English
- Algebra 1
- Geometry
- Four A-G classes

### **Recommended Tests:**

- PSAT and/or ACT EXPLORE exams, if available.

# SENIOR SUMMIT

- Experience campus life in the residence and dining halls through this summer residential program for "rising" seniors at UC Riverside.
- Hear presentations from university admission counselors.
- Get a head start on UC, Cal State, and other college admission and financial aid applications.
- Receive feedback on their Personal Insight Questions, and other college essays.



# EAOP is for you if...

- 1) You have an **interest or goal** to go to college and would like help planning.
- 2) You **strive** to maintain a 3.0 or better grade point average (GPA) in UC-approved 'A-G' courses.


