Providing an overview of preschool programs Community Preschool Coordinator Jill Singh shared that there are 42 students in the Encanto, Longview and Solano programs with 6 students in the developmental preschools and 20 students in the Montessori program for 3-5 year olds. She shared that Solano preschool has received a 4-star rating from Quality First elevating it's rating to Quality Plus. Longview expects to have results of their recent assessment soon and the program at Encanto will receive their second assessment next year. Mrs. Singh shared that they are also exploring curriculum options that offer more social emotional learning and hope to have a decision by the end of the year.

Introducing recipients Natalie Wierman, Itzel Garcia and Marina Wright (not present). Mrs. Singh congratulated and presented them with a certificate and pin.

Discussion took place about scholarships and taking steps to ensure the program is both affordable for families and sustainable for the district. Mrs. Singh shared that the Montessori class for 4-5 years olds for next year is full and has a wait list, along with 5 first and 5 second graders.

Recommendation to Approve 2022/23 Employee Fringe Benefit Plans

Dr. Woodland explained that rates for employee insurance plans in the upcoming year will increase. Rates for the Base and High Deductible plans will increase 3% with rates for the Core plan increasing 8%. Vision premiums will decrease by 5%. The district will be adding a new PPO option to its offerings that would be a 1.8% savings to the district. Cost of the 3% rate increase will be \$50,000.

Dr. Robert clarified that the rate increase for employee only plans will be at no cost to the employee. A short discussion took place about how plan offerings are determined and that the plans will be available to any employee working at least 30 hours per week.

Information

FY21 School District Spending Report

Mrs. Toscano reviewed data shown on the report from the Auditor General's website showing a breakdown of district spending. Providing an overview of operational spending she said the percentage of classroom dollars that goes in the classroom is just under 70 percent. A review of other information listed on the website showed a higher percentage of teachers, 29%, within their first three years. Average teaching experience in the district is 9.4 years.

COVID Update

Rodi Vehr read a prepared statement regarding the impact wearing masks is having on students learning to read. Ms. Vehr asked that members reconsider their decision mandating masks for staff and students. Expressing her appreciation for the caution the district has used through the pandemic, she said the masks create barriers not only for teachers, but the students who are learning to read.

Dr. Robert shared that 13 of 15 Arizona counties are in the green and that the Maricopa County website shows Maricopa County level is low. He shared that area superintendents continue to meet weekly and as a group are in favor of making masks optional for both staff and students.

Expressing appreciation for community support Dr. Robert said he wants to maintain the same level of confidence moving forward; adding that the district will continue to rely on public health officials to help steer the district into the next phase.

Discussion continued and an overall consensus reached to continue to proceed at the discretion of Dr. Robert.

Board Development

Conversation about Conscious Discipline Video on Noticing

Dr. Robert lead members in a conversation about a video they had previously viewed and a discussion about differences between noticing and judging. Members shared how they may work differently with children and as Board members how interactions with the community and supporting this work may change.

Reflections

Mr. Peralta stated his appreciation that the district focuses on the students and the community as a whole.

Ms. Aguilar enjoyed hearing about the preschools and partnerships. She noted that her children have benefitted from what they saw modeled and the education derived from that modeling while attending Osborn.

Ms. Corbin said she understood the concern of teachers and the challenges of teaching reading with a mask, but has concerns about lifting the mask mandate too soon.

Mr. Hermes enjoyed the meeting noting that three of his favorite subjects, preschools, safety and trees were discussed and would like to increase involvement in those areas.

President Flamand said he is constantly amazed at the ethos of the group, the respect for each other and the commitment to doing the right thing.

Dr. Robert stated his appreciation of the support shown by members and thanked members for approval of the employee fringe benefits.
