Pre-K Essential Literature What Do You Do With a Tail Like This? Steve Jenkins and Robin Page

- Talk about gestures you can do with your eyes, tails, head, and mouth
- Talk about how the animals would feel if you could touch them.
- Make a list of things you can do with your arms and legs
- Act out other ways we can use our feet
- Match the animals' feet and beak to the correct animal.
- Pretend you are an elephant; what are some different ways to use your "nose " or trunk?
- Research the animals in the book. Compare how humans and these animals are the same in their movements and how are they different.
- Ask your child to describe how animals move? Why do their tails give away their movements and feelings?

Tails in Action

 Invite your child to tie a strip around their waist to make a "tail". Have them to hide, only showing a portion of the tail for you to guess their animal. After this is done use a tape measure or yardstick to measure how long their tail is. Next let them measure their tail with their shoes.

Animal Play

- Take pictures of animals and cut them into puzzle pieces. Allow the children to put the
 pieces to together to make an animal. Mix the pieces again and allow them to make
 the animal again.
- Use some of your child's animal toys and pretend that you are in a jungle. Use the animals in various ways for pretend. Where do the animals live? What sound do they make?

Do Animals Have Feelings?

- We all have feelings and respond to each in a different way. How do animals respond
 to emotions and feelings? Talk about the different ways animals express their feelings. Compare them to the way your child expresses theirs.
- What Do You Do With a Tail Like This?, the author talks about the elephants' expression with its nose. Talk about different emotions that the elephant has and how they express their feelings.

What Does This Do? (Science)

Animals use their body parts differently than humans. Name body parts and discuss what they do. Compare our uses of our parts with animals and the way they use each part.
