John M. Bailey Community School takes on Poster Power: 8th Graders Get Creative with NJSLA Multiple Choice Tips!







Mrs. Constantine's eighth grade students, at John M. Bailey Community School, are taking an innovative approach in preparing for the fast approaching New Jersey Student Learning Assessment. Students are working in groups to research and design posters dedicated to multiple-choice test taking strategies.

For this project, each group is assigned a different strategy and tasked with creating a visually engaging and informative poster that explains how the specific technique can help with tackling tricky multiple choice questions. The methods included are: Elimination Method, First Answer Strategy, Identifying Key Words in the Question, Educated Guessing, Time Management Strategy, and Avoiding Overthinking. The posters incorporate various teachable items such as, definitions, real-life examples, step-by-step instructions, visuals, and the benefits of each strategy.

Once the posters are completed, students will partake in a gallery walk, taking notes from their peers' work. The students will provide knowledge to one another while promoting success in NJSLA—the idea is, students sometimes learn more from one another. The goal of this project is to gain valuable knowledge on the variety of approaches to staying calm, managing time, and improving accuracy when approaching multiple choice questions. This collaborative process encourages student-led lessons, and makes a practical way of preparing for NJSLA fun!



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BHS Honors Women's History Month

Women's History Month at Bayonne High School was not only a time to reflect on the past—it was a celebration of present-day voices and a call to action for the future. Under the guidance of history teacher and Women's Empowerment Club advisor Mrs. Jennifer Thomas, students in her U.S. II, Women's U.S. History & Politics, and Women's History: A Global Perspective classes, engaged in a month-long series of events and initiatives designed to educate, inspire, and uplift.

Guest Speaker Series Brings Real Stories to Life

Throughout March, the Women's History Month Guest Speaker Series welcomed a lineup of dynamic and diverse women who brought their lived experiences into the classroom. Students had the rare

opportunity to hear first-hand accounts of resilience, identity, and professional journeys. The series aimed to expose students to the real-world challenges and triumphs of women from different backgrounds and industries.

- March 7 Stephanie Lopez: A proud Latina, LGBTQ+ advocate, and woman living with a disability, Stephanie works in higher education and spoke powerfully about inclusivity, overcoming barriers, and advocating for marginalized communities. She shared tools of her trade, accessibility devices, and personal anecdotes that deeply resonated with students.
- March 12 Dana Stephens: Dana, a Black woman working in the field of social work with elderly populations, shared insights on the importance of compassion and cultural competence in caregiving. She discussed systemic challenges in healthcare and how empathy can be a transformative tool.
- March 26 Stephanie Zaldivar: A Latina woman working in a neonatal intensive care unit (NICU), Stephanie gave students a glimpse into the emotional and technical complexities of working with newborns. She brought in equipment and shared stories of both heartbreaking and heartwarming moments from the NICU.





• March 31 – Staff Sergeant Maya McNair: As a Black woman in the U.S. Air Force, Staff Sergeant McNair spoke about leadership, discipline, and what it means to serve. She emphasized perseverance, shared her experiences navigating a male-dominated field, and answered thoughtful student questions about gender and equity in the military.

After each presentation, students participated in open Q&A sessions and hands-on activities with materials brought in by each speaker—transforming the traditional classroom experience into a space of meaningful dialogue and discovery.

At Lincoln Community School, 6th Grade Language Arts teacher Katie Ryan came up with a way for students to get "what they need" while still having a choice as to what they work on.

At the beginning of each W.I.N. period, students open up the Padlet application on their Chromebooks. Students are grouped based on their iReady scores and common areas of need. Groups are color coded, which allows for students to see what their options are on the W.I.N. padlet.







While iReady MyPath or assigned lessons are a choice for any group, there are specific options based on student need. Gifted and Talented students have a set of activities that require critical thinking skills and get them ready for various gifted activities, such as "Battle of the Books." There are Al graded writing sites, where students can answer a prompt and get live feedback as they type. Other options include CommonLit articles with questions, Document Based Questions on DBQ Online, and books on Epic! Students are encouraged to choose a different activity each week.

Each W.I.N. period, a small group of students is given the opportunity to meet with Ms. Ryan and work on a specific skill. Recently, students have been working on prefixes and suffixes to enhance understanding of tricky vocabulary words.

What do the students think about this period that has been added to reinforce skills? Sophia G., from Ms. Ryan's homeroom class, remarks, "W.I.N. period has given me time to work on skills that I am having trouble with and also gives me time for test preparation."



One of the challenges has been to figure out how one teacher keeps track of all that is going on during W.I.N. In this 6th grade class, students spend the last five minutes of the period filling out a Google Document for accountability. Students write about what they chose to do during the period and evaluate their focus and use of time.

W.I.N. period has been a success and students look forward to the time they get to review skills. Angela M. says that her favorite day of the week is Tuesday and she waits "all week for W.I.N. period."

Time Machine at Dr. Walter F. Robinson Community School

Dr. Walter F. Robinson Community School Grade 7 & 8 students in Mrs. Fanous' and Mrs. Adamyan's classes are delighted to share the success of their innovative Time Machine Project, where students combined Math and Science skills to bring imagination to life! Their ability to embrace creativity, collaboration, and hands-on learning throughout the mathematical and scientific journey made the project significant! Mohamed, Gr. 7, indicated, "This project showed me that science and math work together. I now understand how to use formulas and measurements to solve real-world problems."

The lesson began with an exploration of time travel as portrayed in science fiction, followed by a scientific discussion on Earth's history, technological changes, and future possibilities. Students were challenged to choose a historical or future era, calculate the time distance, and visually represent scientific and technological progress over time. Integrating their English, Math, and Science skills in a meaningful, interdisciplinary way, students have collaborated in small teams, measured dimensions, drafted blueprints, and taken a fantastic and breathtaking journey through the calculation of length, width, and height as if they were real engineers and scientists.


Following step-by-step guidance, students embraced the challenge and exceeded expectations. They explored the speed of light, time calculations, and scientific theories, making the learning experience both engaging and intellectually stimulating.

As part of the project, students expressed a desire to travel back in time to meet historical figures such as Leonardo da Vinci and uncover the mystery behind the Mona Lisa, visit the era of Mary, Queen of Scots, witness Newton's discoveries, or even warn Hedy Lamarr about the impact of the WiFi technology. 

The entire process made them revise their previous knowledge and learn a lot about scientific discoveries of the past. Mrs. Fanous' and Mrs. Adamyan's goal was to spark a genuine interest in exploring complex topics, and the Time Machine Project proved to be an excellent choice. It strengthened their academic, social, and emotional learning (SEL) skills, such as self-awareness, teamwork, decision-making, and respect for diverse perspectives, and sparked excitement and curiosity about the world around them—and beyond. Throughout the week, students in Pre-K through 2nd grade watched the videos of these "Masked Readers" and voted each day on who they thought the readers were.







Week of the Young Child at William Shemin Midtown Community




Kismet of Kings—Empowering Young Men for a Greater Purpose

Through a comprehensive curriculum —including character-building workshops, emotional intelligence training, personal goal setting, and service projects—participants learn to embrace their full potential. With access to mentors and positive role models, students explore what it means to lead with integrity, build resilience, and make thoughtful, ethical decisions.

The program encourages every participant to discover their unique purpose and use their talents to create positive change.







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eSports on the Move at Bayonne High School

High school esports has rapidly emerged as a transformative extracurricular activity, blending the excitement of competitive gaming with the structure of traditional sports. Students across the U.S. and beyond are engaging in organized video game competitions under the guidance of their schools, fostering teamwork, communication, and strategic thinking. Esports programs are increasingly integrated into school systems, offering students a structured platform to compete while also developing valuable life skills like leadership and resilience. With dedicated facilities, coaches, and even team jerseys, esports has become a mainstream part of school culture, attracting diverse participants who may not have engaged in traditional athletics.

Schools with esports programs report improved student engagement and attendance, as these activities align with students' passions and provide a sense of belonging. Beyond competition, esports opens doors to academic opportunities in STEM fields like coding and game design, as well as scholarships for higher education. In 2024 alone, over \$16 million in scholarships were awarded to esports athletes by colleges across the U.S., demonstrating the growing recognition of this field as a legitimate pathway to academic and professional success.

High school esports not only provides students with opportunities for teamwork and competition but also fosters skills that can translate into professional fields, including medicine. A study conducted at Beth Israel Medical Center in New York found that surgeons who played video games for at least three hours per week made 37% fewer errors, performed 27% faster, and scored 42% better on a surgical skills test. This correlation highlights how gaming can enhance hand-eye coordination, reaction times,



and precision skills vital for laparoscopic surgery. By integrating esports into education, schools can help students develop transferable skills while engaging in an activity they enjoy.

The future of high school esports looks bright as it continues to reshape student life and education. Schools are increasingly incorporating esports into their curriculums through subjects like game theory and digital media while leveraging its popularity to foster 21st-century skills such as problem-solving and digital literacy.
