


Dear Families,

Your child was recently assessed in reading to determine his/her reading levels. The independent level is the level at which your son/daughter can read (easily with understanding) without help. Books at the independent level are those that come before the instructional level. Based on the assessment your child is at **Guided Reading/Instructional Level E**. The instructional reading level is the level that your son/daughter can read with support. While reading at this level, you should observe your child using the reading behaviors listed below.

- Reads the text softly.
- Tracks print with eyes, using finger only at points of difficulty.
- Talks about ideas in the text.
- Recognizes many words quickly and automatically.
- Solves some new words independently.
- Rereads to search for meaning and accuracy.





- 1. Open to any page in the middle of the book.
- 2. Have your child read that page.
- 3. As they read raise a finger each time they get to a word that they don't know. If they read the page without any errors or just one error, the book is too easy (independent level). If they make 2-3 mistakes the book is just right (instructional level). If they make more than 3 errors, the book is too difficult to read independently (frustration level) and should be read aloud to your child.

You can also visit Scholasticbookwizard.com and enter the book title and you will be provided with the guided reading/instructional level. Yes, there is an app for this!

Parent Tip: Readers notice punctuation marks. They pause when they come to a period or comma.
