



Dear Families.

Your child was recently assessed in reading to determine his/her reading levels. The independent level is the level at which your son/daughter can read (easily with understanding) without help. Books at the independent level are those that come before the instructional level. Based on the assessment your child is at **Guided Reading/Instructional Level X**. The instructional reading level is the level that your son/daughter can read with support. While reading at this level, you should observe your child using the reading behaviors listed below.

- After reading silently, engages in critical thinking about the text.
- Employ a wide range of sophisticated reading strategies in difficult texts.
- More background knowledge is required to understand the text.
- Sustains attention to texts with more complex themes.
- More nonfiction is read.





- 2. Have your child read that page.
- 3. As they read raise a finger each time they get to a word that they don't know. If they read the page without any errors or just one error, the book is too easy (independent level). If they make 2-3 mistakes the book is just right (instructional level). If they make more than 3 errors, the book is too difficult to read independently (frustration level) and should be read aloud to your child.
