

CONGRATULATIONS CLASS OF 2025!

The 210 members of the Northbrook Junior High Class of 2025 graduated June 2 at the Glenbrook North auditorium.

Four students were selected by their teachers for the American Legion Citizenship Awards. Students were nominated based on the character qualities of courage, honor, leadership, patriotism, scholarship and service. This is one of the highest honors awarded to American youth by the American Legion organization.

Madeline Feeney and Greta Wahlstrom were recognized for Distinguished Achievement. Madeline Junkmann and Reese Mueller received Honorable Mention.

Also at the ceremony, student speeches reflected their experiences in District 28.

Student Greta Wahlstrom said, "As we move forward into high school - into a world that is larger, faster, and sometimes harder— don't just race toward the next achievement. Walk slowly enough to notice. Laugh loudly enough to remember. Love deeply enough to make a mark."

Students Madeline Feeney and Maeve Zale teamed up for the second speech. "Keep writing your story. Keep striving for the person you have fought so hard to become. Keep reaching-past comfort, past fear, past everything you've

Northbrook Junior High Principal Dr. Scott Meek shared his encouragement with the class, who will attend Glenbrook North next year.

"You've overcome obstacles in your life already. Some minor, and perhaps some much more significant. Yet you've always come out on the other side. Stronger. Better. More resilient." Dr. Meek said.

SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL LEARNING FOR ALL

(1) Over the past two years, a committee of educators representing all grades and content areas has been laying the groundwork to strengthen Social Emotional Learning in our schools. One practice that will be fully implemented next year at all schools is called "Packs" or "Crews," which are small, multi-age groups that meet periodically with adults. "Watching the relationships grow among the students in each pack, year after year, is amazing," said Meghan Dames, a social worker.



(2) Twenty-three Northbrook Junior High Independent Science Research students brought home 22 gold awards and one silver award at the Illinois Junior Academy of Science State Fair, continuing a long tradition of top honors at the event. Students

pursue their own interests in a research project using the scientific method. "I always thought this research was just something that was unattainable at my age. But by being able to do this and having the support system of (my teachers) helping me throughout the process really showed me that this is something you can definitely achieve," saidTalia Nayman, recipient of Exceptional Project in Category Award, and the Innovators Challege Award, representing the top 10% of projects at the fair.

NEW LITERACY CURRICULUM FOR K-5

(3) A new elementary literacy curriculum is being adopted for kindergarten through 5th grade. The "Into Reading" English Language Arts resource was selected from 11 different programs

that a committee reviewed as part of its three-year research and development process. "Into Reading" offers systematic phonics instruction, rich texts, and evidence-based reading and writing experiences. It includes tools for embedded assessments to monitor progress and resources to support differentiation.









BEST COMMUNITIES FOR MUSIC EDUCATION AWARD

(4) Northbrook District 28 has been recognized for the 10th straight year by the NAMM (National Association of Music Merchants) Foundation as one of the Best Communities for Music Education. Northbrook District 28 is one of 29 school districts recognized in the state of Illinois this year, out of a total of 850 school districts across the country.

BUILDING ON A TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE

The community approved the \$94.9 million bond referendum on April 1. The proposal was developed with community input as part of the district's (3) Building Tomorrow Together community engagement program last fall and was based on needs identified in a Facilities Master Plan.





Our fourth strategic goal is to optimize resources to accomplish equitable, data-informed priorities within a balanced budget.

FACILITIES MASTER PLAN

The \$94.9 million bond referendum was developed after a comprehensive study of facilities needs. The building plan will update safety and security, improve accessibility, and ensure our classrooms are equipped to support today's best practices in curriculum and instruction. The plan addresses overcrowding and protects the community's investment in our schools. Replacing Meadowbrook rather than renovating it is a better use of funds and results in minimal maintenance or repairs for years to come. The district will apply \$20 million of reserve funds to the plan in addition to the bond sales.



AAA RATING

The district received an AAA rating (stable outlook) from Standard & Poors for the first round of municipal bonds sold for the school construction and renovation projects approved in the April 1 referendum. The bond sale of \$14,550,000 will be used for the construction of the Meadowbrook School gymnasium (4).

INCLUSIVE CULTURE

FOCUS ON WELLNESS

The District 28 Wellness Committee was formed from Goal 2. The committee is dedicated to fostering a holistic and supportive environment that prioritizes the well-being of all staff. The primary

objectives of the wellness committee will include promoting physical, mental, and emotional health, organizing wellness events and providing resources for stress management and work-life balance. SUMMERTIME IS PROFESSIONAL LEARNING TIME

District 28 offers a professional development program during the summer, often taught by colleagues eager to share and collaborate. This year, 36 sessions are offered in topics ranging from CPR to instructional technology tools, to wellness and instructional practices. The session topics are framed by a staff survey for relevance and interest. "We're very fortunate to have many talented District 28 staff members leading these sessions, sharing their expertise with their peers," said Director of Learning Michelle Jackson.

District 28 enjoyed a transformational year of community support. Thanks to a voter approval rate of 63% on the \$94.9 million bond referendum on April 1, coupled with an additional \$20 million in district funds, the coming three years will bring about significant improvements to our school buildings.

We are sincerely grateful for the community support and are excited to embark on this ambitious plan, which includes building a new Meadowbrook School, adding a classroom wing and renovating the oldest wing at Greenbriar School; adding a cafetorium and renovating the core hallway at Northbrook Junior High and adding washrooms and a cafetorium at Westmoor School.

These additions will bring hot lunch service to our elementary students, make room for growing enrollment and enhance learning spaces for all.

Young Explorers Has Rolling Enrollment

Northbrook School District 28 serves our youngest learners with an innovative early childhood program that encourages exploration and skill development through child-centered experiences, building self confidence and connections between learning and natural environments. The program serves at-risk students, special needs students and typically developing students in a blended classroom model five days a week. New Greenbriar Principal Appointed



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

New Board Seated, Officers Elected

New Board of Education members took their seats following the April 1 election. New members Diana Horwitz and Eve Pfanzelter, along with incumbents Beth Bazer and DeShawn Arms, were seated for four-year terms. Beth Bazer was first appointed to the board in 2022 to fill a vacant seat and re-elected to a two-year term in 2023. DeShawn Arms was first elected to a four-year term in 2021.

The newly elected members join Mara Silver-Schack, Adam Weinstock, and Christine Beeftink on the board. Mara Silver-Schack was first elected to the board in 2019, and Adam Weinstock and Christine Beeftink were elected to four-year terms in 2023.

Former Board President Jen Gallinson and Board Member Matt Cassidy expressed appreciation for the community, fellow board members and the administrative team before stepping down from the Board of Education. The board elected Mara Silver-Schack as president, Adam Weinstock as vice president and Beth Bazer as secretary. Officers are elected for two-year terms.
