

Annual event introduces parents to another new school year

The annual PPS Title I Parent Welcome Back to School Kickoff event took place this year at John F. Kennedy High School, marking the start of another exciting school year and celebrating the invaluable role that parents play in their children's education. The event was hosted by the District's Family and Community Engagement Department, in a partnership with the District-Wide PTO, funded by Title I Parent Involvement, and support from the City of Paterson Community Policing Anti-Violence Grant. Superintendent Laurie W. Newell and Board Commissioner Valerie Freeman addressed the attendees. They were accompanied by other notable guests such as Board Vice-President Kenneth L. Simmons, Commissioner Nakima Redmond, district and school administrators, and city officials.





The event was designed to welcome back Paterson Public School parents with a wealth of knowledge and resources in supporting them to guide their

children at home. Over 500 parents and families attended, making it one of the most successful turnouts in recent years. More than 30 educational and community resource tables were set up, offering information and assistance on a range of topics that promote student success and parental engagement. 


MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Dr. Carlos Miranda, Paterson P-TECH's Planetarium Manager, has been inducted into National Life Group's "LifeChanger of the Year" program, an annual recognition of K-12 educators and school employees nationwide. The program celebrates those making a significant difference in students' lives by exemplifying excellence, positive influence, and leadership. This allows him to be nominated for Lifechanger Of The Year Awards, which grants winners prizes up to \$10,000 that is evenly split between the teacher and their school or district; the award is funded by National Life Group's charitable arm, the National Life Foundation.

Dr. Miranda was anonymously nominated for inclusion into the LifeChanger of the Year program last year and received notice of confirmation only recently.

"I am truly honored to be nominated for the LifeChanger Award," said Dr. Miranda. BREAKING THE CYCLE

The students at Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Educational Complex and School No. 3 were visited by presenters from Breaking the Cycle, a program designed to deliver the message of nonviolent conflict resolution through forgiveness. The presenters, Pat & Annmarie D'Aliso using their own story about the loss of their son to suicide, spoke to students about suicide awareness and prevention. They told the assembly about red flags such as giving away items, money and other items to being out of character. Expecting that some students would have difficulty with this important and sensitive topic, counselors were stationed around the assembly to watch for a thumbs-up sign. Upon seeing one, a student would be escorted to a predetermined room for counseling.

The Breaking the Cycle staff gave high praise to the District for having a plan in place to assist the students who were experiencing mental troubles. They said that in their travels around the country, this was the first time that they saw counselors placed in a position to help the students. Each student and staff member received the book, "Why Forgive?", written by the program's cofounder, Johann Christoph Arnold.



MAKING CONNECTIONS

Dr. Frank Napier, Jr. School of Science & Technology (School No. 4) and the Full Service Community School team held a Meet & Greet with parents. The event allowed the participants connect through interactive games, sharing their insights, and even win prizes.

One of the highlights was Mr. Smith's engaging demonstration of the Pocketalk translator device, which translates voice recordings almost immediately. Parents were captivated by its capabilities and one parent had the opportunity to use the device to speak with the principal. This hands-on experience left parents feeling more confident and excited about attending Back to School Night, knowing they can effectively communicate and engage with school staff.



FIRE SAFETY



The Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (MLK) school held an event to celebrate Fire Prevention Month. The event offered students opportunities to learn fire safety. The Paterson Fire Department was on hand to provide interactive fire extinguisher training and fire truck, equipment tours, and story reading. Firefighters introduced a new training system, Bullseye, which offers a hands-on experience for attendees to learn proper fire extinguisher techniques in a fun and safe environment. Firefighters also allowed students from grades PSD to 2nd grade to explore the fire trucks and equipment up close, gaining insights into the tools and technology that keep our community safe.

For the children of the school's autistic population, firefighters read engaging stories to foster connections and enhance fire safety education.

"We believe these activities not only promote fire safety, but also strengthen community bonds," said Tammie Harrell-Simmons, MLK's School-Based Special Education Supervisor.

At Dr. Hani Awadallah School (DHA), students and staff gathered for a special assembly, all dressed in vibrant yellow to raise awareness for childhood cancer. Representatives from St. Joseph's Hospital led the event which highlighted the importance of supporting young cancer patients and their families, with heartfelt stories and inspiring messages shared. One of DHA's students, Camila Izaguirre, has been dealing with cancer since she was first diagnosed at 1 ½ years old. The sea of yellow not only symbolized hope and solidarity, but also helped educate students on how they can make a difference in the fight against childhood cancer.
