# Reflecting on a Year of Partnership and Progress

With the close of the school year, I am filled with gratitude. It has been a remarkable year in District 196 – one marked not just by student achievement, but by the powerful relationships, tireless dedication, and steadfast community support.

Our focus has been on our mission to develop, educate, and inspire in classrooms and gymnasiums, on stages, and in science labs. We see evidence across the district.

Let's begin in our classrooms. This year, we launched new K-5 curriculum programs in literacy, math, and science – key steps aligned with our Strategic Roadmap. Over 90% of elementary teachers completed the intensive training required for effective instruction in the science of reading. Secondary teachers will begin similar professional learning next year as part of our districtwide investment to ensure foundational literacy skills in every student for lifelong learning.

At the high school level, more students than ever before are enrolling in Advanced Placement and College in Schools classes – 3,278 students (9-12) enrolled in 6,306 college-level courses. We had 287 seniors earn Minnesota Bilingual Seals and certificates, earning 722 semester credits for college-level language courses.

We've also strengthened our academic and career technical partnerships with businesses and industry, especially in STEM. With local partnerships, including Park Chrysler Jeep and the University of St. Thomas Schulze School of Entrepreneurship, we support STEM innovation frameworks for students. High school internships and field experiences with companies like Collins Aerospace, Pittsburgh Paints, SFM Mutual, and Genesys Works open doors to high-demand careers.

Embracing our Triple A philosophy of excellence in academics, arts, and athletics, our students continue to thrive in speech and debate, robotics, computer science, business, FACS competitions, and more. A team of high school students produced an

award-winning public service announcement to discourage vaping, and our future health services professionals clubs have also claimed leadership awards. More than 25 health services students finished top three in their state competitions. (See Pages 10-12 for photos.)

#### Triple A Success

District 196 is proud of its continued performing and visual arts success. From the Dakota Valley Choral Festival and marching band shows to compelling theater performances and art showcases, our students dazzled audiences. We will continue to inspire and be inspired by the talent, creativity, and ideas students express through the arts. A sincere thank-you to everyone in the community who attended shows and participated in District 196 performances throughout the year. (See Pages 10-12 for more details.)

Our student-athletes also found great success. Of the 37 Minnesota State High School League sports we support, District 196 sent 34 teams to state tournaments this year. Our legacy of athletic success comes from a commitment to hard work, dedication, and collaboration. Coaches not only focus on skills and knowledge, but also teamwork and steady improvement. Winning or not, there is value in athletic participation being active, developing skills, building relationships, meeting challenges, and having fun. We want to thank our many fans and families who show up week after week, supporting from the sidelines and behind the scenes

At the heart of all this achievement is something quieter, but just as powerful: relationships. Excellence doesn't grow in isolation. It takes trust between students and teachers, respect between colleagues, and collaboration across classrooms, campuses, and communities. 


broader community invests in our shared future.

These moments culminated in celebrating this year's graduates - multiple ceremonies of joy and accomplishment. We cherished the opportunity to celebrate with students and their families.

# Tech Skills Prepare Students for Digital Future



In 2015, voters in District 196 approved dedicated funding for technology tools to personalize learning. Early on, educators developed a clear digital learning framework with a balance between books, paper-pencil, project-based, and technology tools. Ten years later, students use technology to enhance academics and build critical thinking, creativity, and lifelong digital citizenship skills.

## Launching Students Into the Digital World

In our high schools, technology tools are deeply integrated to inspire critical thinking, collaboration, and career preparation.

"Teaching and learning has changed tremendously in the last decade," career development instructor Tabitha Senty said. "Technology allows us to make sure kids get what they need, when they need it, and how they need it."

Students actively access, create, and analyze information. Some are learning coding languages and designing their own apps.

Early exposure to technology careers can change lives. Senty shared that several alums have reached out to

say that skills learned in high school classes led them to careers in cybersecurity and other tech fields.

Across the district, the goal is to ensure that students graduate with not just academic knowledge but also the digital skills needed to thrive in a technology-driven world.

"We are trying to produce students who can step out of the school system and be productive," science teacher Joe Christman said. "When they step outside our doors, no matter where they go, they're entering a digital world."

#### Fostering Independence and Citizenship

Technology also plays a critical role in helping students become more independent learners.

"We're trying to foster more and more independence," said sixth-grade English language arts teacher Sarah Trudeau. "They need to start learning how to think critically and problem-solve on their own," beginning in middle school.

Technology also enables teachers to meet a variety of learning styles. Brianna Dawson, who teaches seventh-grade U.S.

studies, said technology helps every learner engage with the material through words, images, movies, and interactive lessons.

Beyond technical skills, teachers focus on building digital citizenship to enable students to be critical consumers and positive contributors online.

"Collaboration through tech is useful, and it allows students to share their voice, creativity, learning, and understanding in real time." Dawson said.

#### Sparking Curiosity Early

In elementary classrooms, technology supports learning and encourages curiosity. Teachers use tablets and apps to make lessons more interactive, provide real-time feedback, and focus on individual student needs.

Rather than replacing traditional learning, technology complements it. Teachers like Taryn MacGibbon display lessons from their iPads, allowing students to follow along closely. Self-graded online quizzes save time and quickly give teachers insights into student understanding.

"There are also a lot of opportunities for students to create on their iPads." MacGibbon said. Students use programs like Book Creator and iMovie to show their creativity.

"Learning with technology has definitely sparked curiosity," said parent **Megan Wall**. "Kids are more apt to find answers for themselves."

Teachers emphasize that while technology is powerful, it's important to learn balance. "It's very beneficial to have students experience a proper way to use technology where it's not consuming their lives and not relying on it completely," MacGibbon said. "It's all about balance."

Across District 196, access to technology tools inspires research, independence, critical thinking, creativity, and problem-solving - preparing students to be the innovators and leaders of tomorrow.

#### New Human Resources Director



District 196 welcomes **Joel** Milteer, MBA, SPHR, as its new director of human resources, following the retirement of Shelly Monson,

who has served the district for 23 years.

Milteer brings more than two decades of experience in human resources, including 17 years in public education. He currently leads South St. Paul Public Schools' human resources and previously held leadership roles in

The President's Award is the third-highest honor given by Magnet Schools of America and is bestowed on behalf of all current and past presidents of the organization.

## School Board Eection in November, Filing Period is July 29 - Aug. 12

Four of the seven at-large positions on the District 196 School Board will be decided in two separate School Board elections on Nov. 4, 2025. First, three School Board seats are up for election in the General School Board Election. The terms of Robin Cerio, Leah Gardner, and Sakawdin Mohamed will expire on Jan. 5, 2026. Each of these three open positions has a four-year term, running from Jan. 2026 to Jan. 2030.

Concurrently, a Special Election will be held to fill the remaining two years of the term of former School Board member Sachin Isaacs, who resigned his seat in Oct. 2024. The School Board appointed Catherine Diamond to fill the vacancy until a special election is held. The term expires in Jan. 2028.

The candidate filing period is Tuesday, July 29, through Tuesday, Aug. 12, at 5 p.m. When filing, candidates must choose to run in the general election (three open positions with four-year terms) or special election (one open position with two years remaining).

Affidavits of candidacy may be filed during office hours (7:30 a.m.-4 p.m., Monday through Friday) in the Superintendent's



Office of District 196, 3455 153rd St. W., Rosemount. There is a \$2 filing fee or a petition with at least 500 signatures of eligible voters may replace the filing fee.

# Health Occupations of America Leadership Awards



# Lucas Gerten: 4-Time State Champion Diver



- · Sophie Stramel (Rosemount), a standout hockey player and leader, will also play at MSU-Mankato.




# Boys Volleyball Heads to State in Historic First Season

# Striking a Chord With **Elementary Music**

District 196 was well-represented at this year's Minnesota Music Educators Association (MMEA) state conference, with 45 students from Rosemount, Eastview, Apple Valley, and Eagan High Schools performing in the All-State Band and Eagan's Wind Symphony taking the main stage. However, musical development begins in the primary years. So, Oak Ridge Elementary School of Leadership, Environmental and Health Sciences showcased its first-grade Generation POUND® group and fifth-grade band at the state conference this year.

District 196 supports music specialists in each elementary school, and fifth-grade band is a highly anticipated milestone. It reflects a long-held belief: When students have access to music, the impact resonates beyond the stage.

#### **Universal Access**

"Starting band in fifth grade is a huge asset," said Bojan Hoover, Oak Ridge's instrumental music teacher. "It gives students access without barriers and lays a strong foundation."

Supported by Band for All, a District 196 Foundation initiative started by retired Oak Ridge music teacher Angie Wyatt to eliminate financial barriers by providing instruments, District 196 works to ensure all students can experience the lifelong benefits of music education.

At Oak Ridge, every fifth grader signed up for band this year.

Hoover, who has taught music at every level, emphasized the importance of the learning journey. "Performing arts isn't just creating a product - it's a process. Those small victories and daily achievements matter," he said. "Gratification isn't always instant, but students learn to value the journey."

Oak Ridge has integrated band into the regular school schedule, removing time-based participation barriers. "Not everyone can make it to school early or stay late," said Micah Boudinot, general music teacher. "Since everyone's here, everyone can participate."

#### From Movement to Music

Boudinot is a certified Generation POUND instructor, a youth fitness program combining movement, rhythm, and music. The energetic sessions build physical coordination and confidence while teaching musical patterns.

"It takes a lot of brainwork for students to recognize patterns in Generation POUND," Boudinot said. "Once they get it, the next one comes easier. It brings joy and builds community."

Boudinot's creative approach has energized students and families. One highlight came when first graders performed at MMEA.

"Micah Boudinot's musical expertise and passion have made a powerful impact on my granddaughter," said Naomi Paulsen. "Tatum had an epic experience at MMEA and will soon perform Frog and Toad stories at Lebanon Hills. Kudos to Micah for the magical experiences she provides."

### A Lifelong Journey

Oak Ridge's approach to music is comprehensive. Students sing, play instruments, and learn to read music - both traditionally and creatively. Research shows music education enhances learning, especially in vocabulary, symbolic understanding, sequencing, and auditory development.

Collaborations with hip-hop artists like Tall Paul and Rosemount High School alum Nur-D have deepened learning experiences. Fifth graders even composed and performed an original rap song with Nur-D, learning music begins long before the performance.

During Earth Day, second grade students performed outside alongside Tall Paul, who added a custom verse to "Garden Song" in harmony with Oak Ridge's environmental theme.



In a poetic moment, an eagle circled overhead as students sang "Love lift us up where we belong ... where the eagles cry," from a pop song that parallels the Seven Grandfather Teachings, where the eagle symbolizes love.

## **Building Skills and Confidence**

Beyond musical ability, students develop resilience, teamwork, and perseverance. They learn to take feedback, overcome challenges, and celebrate growth.

"Elementary students sometimes get overlooked," said Hoover. "We often celebrate high school achievements as we should - but younger students are just as passionate and deserving of praise."

The success at Oak Ridge reflects a broader District 196 focus on developing the whole child through academics, arts, and athletics. Students at Oak Ridge also see music as a lifelong endeavor, inspired by an adult band composed of staff, parents, and grandparents.

"When students see adults in their lives making music, it strengthens community and shows music can be a lifelong joy," Hoover said.

From first-grade ukuleles to full fifth-grade bands, District 196 ensures every student has the chance to discover their rhythm - and perhaps a lifelong passion.



# Student Rights and Responsibilities Handbook

In mid-August, District 196 families will receive an email to access the Overview of Student Rights and Responsibilities Handbook for the 2025-26 school year. Families are encouraged to review this handbook with their student to understand district policies and student behavior expectations. The handbook is updated annually to comply with state and federal requirements. All changes are approved by the School Board. Printed copies are available at each school.

## **Cell Phone Policy**

As Minnesota law requires, the District 196 School Board has adopted a Cell Phone policy (Policy 503, Section 7). The purpose of the policy is to improve academic focus and attainment, minimize the negative impact of cell phones on student behavior and mental health, and create a distraction-free learning environment that fosters stronger student-teacher and student-to-student relationships. District 196 limits student possession and use of cell phones in schools. Students also are prohibited from using a cell phone to engage in conduct prohibited by school district policies including, but not limited to, cheating, bullying, and harassment.

# Homeschools Are Required to Report to District

Families living in District 196 who plan to homeschool their children for the 2025-26 school year must submit a completed Compulsory Instruction Report to the director of Community Education by Oct. 1.

## **Building Our Future: Bond Construction Progress**

Across Rosemount-Apple Valley-Eagan Public Schools, 11 major construction projects are underway. Approved by voters in May 2023, these improvements reflect our community's strong commitment to preparing for enrollment growth, addressing safety and security, and ensuring an equitable educational experience across the district.

**Emerald Trail Elementary: On Track and On Time** Emerald Trail Elementary (#20) will welcome its first students this fall. Using the same floor plan as East Lake Elementary, the district saved on architectural and design costs, stretched bond funds, and accelerated the construction timeline.

This summer, the district is working closely with the city of Rosemount to develop a school traffic safety plan for the site. This includes a one-mile bus zone so students won't have to cross Bonaire Path walking to school. The school property will also be seamlessly connected to the city's trail system, allowing neighbors and adults to use the property for daily walking routines. The traffic plan also includes additional crosswalks and the creation of a school speed zone on Bonaire Path. Watch for more information in August.

- Rosemount Middle School: A New Chapter Begins Just a few miles away, the walls are going up at the future site of Rosemount Middle School. The building's footprint is now visible on the land formerly owned by the University of Minnesota and UMore Park. Slated to open in fall 2027, this new middle school will replace the district's oldest school building, initially built in 1918.
- **Activity Centers: Expanding Recreation and Wellness** We have officially broken ground on new activity centers at Apple Valley and Eastview High Schools. Families and visitors should be aware that site access and parking will be limited during the coming months as crews work to bring these long-awaited facilities to life.

When completed, all four activity centers-one at each comprehensive high school-will greatly expand community recreational opportunities, increase gym availability, and provide much-needed indoor space for wellness activities, youth sports, and extracurriculars. These aren't just school improvements-they're community assets that will serve the broader public for decades.

 Next up: Rosemount and Eagan High Schools Looking ahead, Rosemount High School's construction project has moved into the bid phase, marking an important step toward transforming and expanding the existing facility. Meanwhile, the Eagan High School Activity Center is currently in the design phase.

Projects are also underway at Falcon Ridge, Scott Highlands, and Valley Middle schools. At Thomas Lake Elementary, a new dedicated bus loop and expanded parking will improve traffic flow. Districtwide, additional security cameras are being installed to enhance visibility and monitoring at all sites.
