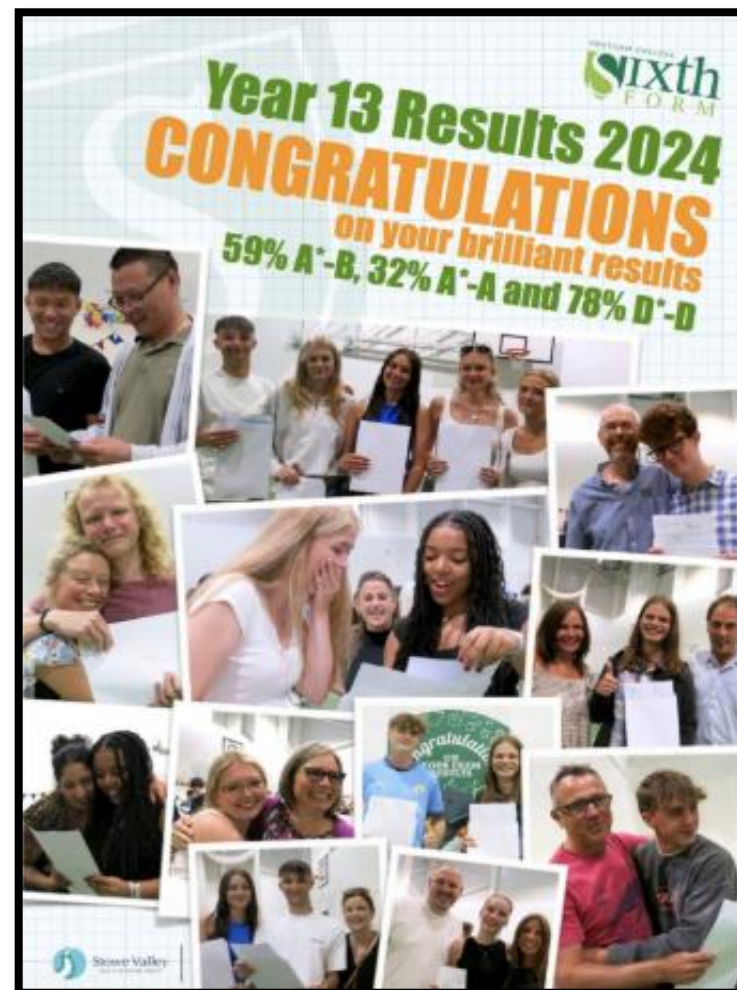
At Southam College, our core aims are to ensure:

EXPECTATIONS

Sixth Form students can expect to:

- To have work regularly set and marked. Also if and when a member of staff is absent.
- Access to comprehensive careers education, information, advice and guidance.
- Opportunities to engage in a wide range of personal development and enrichment activities to support your growth beyond the classroom

REACH OUT TO US!

What to do if there are any problems? Reach out to us!

We encourage all students to speak up early if they are facing difficulties.

- Talk to your subject teachers (academic or subject specific concerns)
- Talk to your form tutor (general progress and wellbeing)
- Talk to your Head of Year.
- Talk to the Head of Sixth Form.
- Talk to your parents/carer.
- Talk to the Learning Mentors (further academic support).
- Arrange an appointment with the Careers advisor.
- Use self-help materials and resources available from the Sixth Form team or trusted external services.

Request a meeting with a combination of the above. You are not alone—support is always available.

STUDY ROOM

We aim to provide you with a learning environment that positively contributes to everyone's ability to study. Therefore, when using the Sixth Form study room, we expect you to be considerate to others and ask for your co-operation in upholding the following expectations.

NOISE LEVELS

The Sixth Form Study room will have allocated periods which will be designated to two types of noise zones, "Silent" and "Quiet" study periods.

- When arriving, we ask that you please pay attention to what level of noise is permitted for the allocated period. Adhere to the noise 'zone' expected levels of interaction. This is to maintain an environment conducive to intensive study and ensure students are aware of their conduct while here.
- Please treat the Sixth Form study room space as a "Silent" Study zone, unless otherwise signposted. **This includes when entering and exiting the room to 'sign in and out' for safeguarding.**
- On occasion, we may adjust and alter the noise zoning provision from time to time to accommodate the needs of students, e.g. there will be more dedicated "Silent Study" time during exam season.
- Use laptops and mobile phones with consideration (headphones to be worn and sound must be inaudible to those nearby). Refer to the mobile phone usage poster for more information.

"SILENT STUDY" ZONE

- Adhere to the "Silent" study expectation throughout the duration of period 1 & 2 daily.
- Please respect the direct instruction of the Sixth Form Learning Mentors and students who have chosen this allocated time slot to enhance everyone's learning experience.
- The noise volume is to be silent. No conversations. Studying with no disturbance.
- Encourage yourself to put your mobile phone away, "out of sight, out of mind" to avoid distractions. Devices set to silent.
- Ideal for working alone. Revise in silence, consolidation time and researching.
- Independent and focussed study time with no interruptions.



"QUIET STUDY" ZONE

- Adhere to the "Quiet" study zone after breaktime. Period 3, 4 & 5 daily. Also expected during afterschool study unless otherwise stated.
- Studying with minimal disturbance. Ideal for individual, quiet study alone or alongside others.
- The use of mobile phones is allowed for study purposes and if inaudible to others.
- Conversation is acceptable between pairs and small groups but please keep conversation noise levels low volume, 'quiet' and to a minimum. Conversations about work.
- Ideal for retrieval practice to test each other.
- Be considerate to others who may still wish to work silently.

If you need help encouraging a peer to comply, please tell your Learning Mentors. Talk to your Learning Mentors should you require any other support with your learning.



**Note: The Sixth Form Learning Mentors, Heads of Year and Head of Sixth Form may remind you of these expectations if we see that you are not using the space appropriately. Failure to adhere to the Sixth Form study room code of conduct and expectations may result in warnings, sanctions, removal, and/or further disciplinary action*



SOCIAL AREA EXPECTATIONS

- Follow staff instructions first time, every time.
- Only the allocated year group may use the social area.
- Sit on chairs, not tables.
- When the social base is full, please use the canteen, space outside or the hall.
- Food and drinks are allowed in the Sixth Form social space, the canteen, hall and outside space as per the whole school rules. No eating and drinking allowed in the Sixth Form study room, on corridors or adjacent classrooms so please finish here first.
- Put any litter in the bin and straighten chairs and tables before leaving.
- Move promptly out of corridors.
- Use toilets in your allocated block.
- No posters or flyers to be put onto the walls unless approved by the Head of Sixth Form.
- Respect your facilities. Leave the social space as you would hope to find it. Keep the room clean.

Dress Code

Professional Wear

- Demonstrating the highest of standards in appearance is part of your leadership responsibility
- You enter the sixth form to work and contribute to the wider community, your dress should reflect this.
- Lanyards to be worn at all times- safeguarding.



Sixth Form Dress Code

We expect students to adhere to the smart, professional dress code within Southam College Sixth Form. All students are required to wear a skirt/trouser and shirt & tie/blouse/formal top, as well as smart shoes. For safeguarding, it is compulsory for students to wear a lanyard.

Further details on appropriate items follow:

Trousers
Suit trouser. Subtle sober patterns allowed such as pinstripe. Tailored fit and linen trousers acceptable provided smart.
Belt should be one colour (Dark grey/dark brown or tan/black).
Not allowed: Denim/chino/jeffing/skin-tight trousers/shorts/legging/sports bottoms.

Skirts & Dresses
Formal, tailored suit type skirts and dresses, including pencil skirts. Sober colour/patterns e.g. pinstripe. Skirt/dress must be no more than 10cm above the knee.
Not allowed: Items that are excessively short, Denim. Low neckline/trappy dresses/Play suits/jump suits.

Shirts/Blouse/Formal Top
A shirt and tie or blouse or smart work style top that covers the shoulders.
Formal light-weight knitted jumper or cardigan over blouse.
Sober colour/subtle patterns.
Short sleeves are permitted.
Jackets are optional.
Not allowed: Loose T-shirts/polo shirts/sports shirts/military style shirts/lumberjacks shirts/trappy tops/trapped tops/halter-neck tops/off the shoulder tops/wearhairs with sport logos or sportswear/logos. Areas such as the stomach or back should not be on show.

Shoes
Formal/smart. Must be of leather or suede material/look.
Smart boots of a sober colour are permitted.
Heels permitted on shoes and boots if of a suitable height.
Smart 'ballet' pumps are allowed.
Smart boots of a sober colour are permitted.
Not allowed: Walking boots/leiker boots/trainers/flip flops or open toe/canvas shoes/canvas pumps/converse/UGG style.

Other Aspects
Tights should be one sombre colour without pattern.
No hats, caps or headgear of any kind to be worn in school.
Hair colour to be one natural colour – see your HOV before you dye your hair to disous.
No hoodies/sweatshirts are permitted.
All items of dress, including outdoor coats, should be clean, and should not be adorned with slogans or in any other way be likely to cause offence.
No visible body piercing other than to the ears, or one single small nose stud. No visible tattoos. Any jewellery worn should be reasonably small and not excessive in quantity. Entirely clear plastic retainers are permitted for piercings that are not in ears or single nose stud.
We are respectful of religious attire that students wish to wear.

Within this dress code the school reserves the right to determine if an article of student dress is acceptable to be worn. Consequences for not adhering to the dress code: Tutor monitoring and verbal warning > A warning issued via CC > Exclusion on Class Charts > Letter sent home and Dress Code Report for a week > Last warning letter given > Remain in Sixth Form Area > Parent/Carer Meeting and required to go home to address dress code.
Clear and obvious disregard for the dress code will result in immediate isolation in the Sixth Form Area.

Appendix A: Sixth Form Student Dress Code

Sixth Form students at Southam College are role models to the rest of the school. In addition to their behaviour, attitude and ethos, students are expected to set an example through their high standard of professional, smart, business-like dress and the way in which they present themselves. Please pay close attention to the full dress code expectations document and the guidance exemplar 'Acceptable' and 'Not acceptable' images of the dress code below to ensure students are dressing appropriately for the school environment.

Ward students Our Sixth Form dress code has been created and endorsed in order to ensure student code. Student consultation has taken place before any changes to ensure we are considered. Please in any respect and adhere to our code of dress.

Authorised and unauthorised absence

SIXTH FORM

For unplanned absence from Sixth Form (e.g. general illness), a parent or carer must notify the School via ClassCharts, phone the Absence Line or email/text to account for the absence ideally by 9AM on each day of absence. If the absence is likely to last more than two days, the parent/carer should aim to contact the HOY and/or HOSF to share finer details in the hope we can support returning to school as soon as possible.

Students should book appointments, tests, and so on during free periods to ensure they do not miss out on learning time. Authorised absence is an absence which has been approved in advance by the Head of Sixth Form or Heads of Year only. The table, below, shows what is and is not likely to be authorised and the evidence required for authorisation to be given.

Leave of Absence for exceptional circumstances	Discretionary	There is an expectation that the Parent / carer will contact the Attendance Office at Southern College. A form will need to be filled in and response will be provided. No fees will be asked but this may be unauthorised.

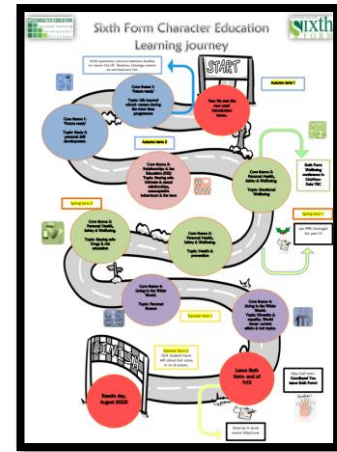

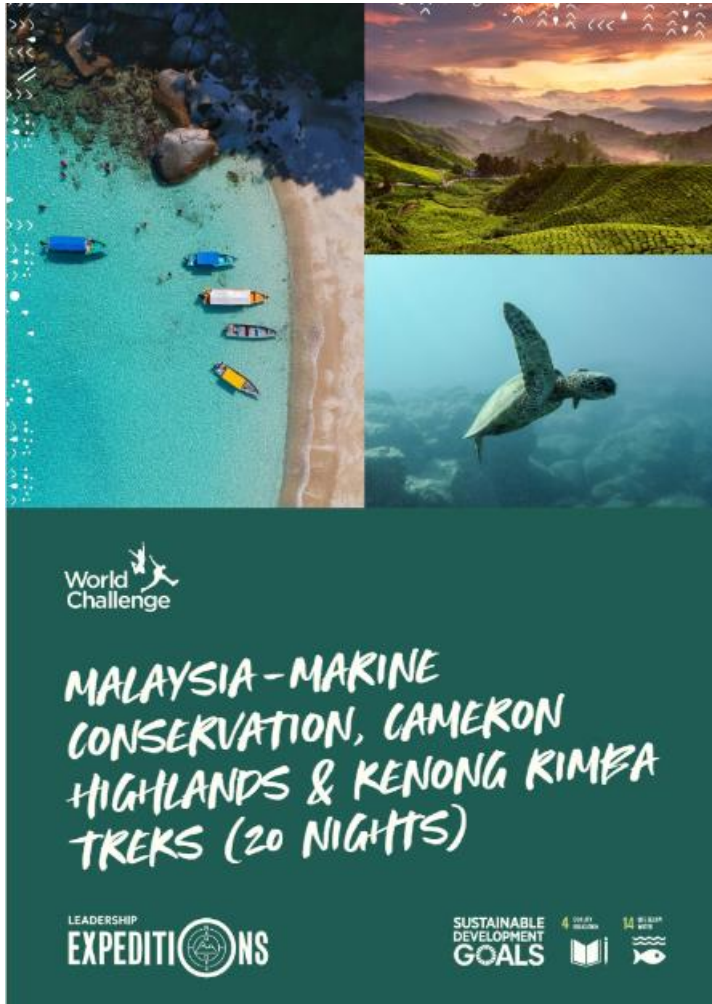

Travel up the coast, about an hour north of the city. You'll spend the next three days contributing to marine conservation. Learn about local efforts to protect the coastal habitat.

With their striking patterned shells and long beaks, hawksbill sea turtles have been visiting Malacca's beaches for centuries. Around 200-300 come to rest here every year. But they are now critically endangered because of poaching, pollution and habitat destruction. Learn about these threats and help out where you can.

Join night patrols along the beach to protect the nesting turtles and their eggs. Look out for turtles surfacing from the sea and lend a hand with collecting data, including turtle size and the number of eggs laid. Help with beach cleanups and building turtle hatcheries.



DAYS 8-10

CAMERON HIGHLANDS TREK

Sleep: Hostel/guesthouse

Travel: Transfer 5hrs to Tanah Rata

Trek: 2-3 days



Step off the transfer bus in Tanah Rata, a town in the Cameron Highlands. These emerald hills were named after the 19th-century explorer William Cameron. Back then, British expats took to the hills to escape the heat.

The best way to explore is on foot. Gather the team and decide which of the self-guided hiking trails to tackle. You could trek beside the river, passing rolling hills and tea plantations, or take on the challenge of Gunung Barambut (1,841m) - it's a steep climb to the summit!



You've also got the option of a white water rafting trip - travel a couple of hours to the start point and ride the rapids on the Kampar River.

KENONG RIMBA TREK

Sleep: Hostel, camp

Travel: Transfer 2hrs to Kuala Lipis

Trek: 6 days

Now for something bigger. Travel to the little town of Kuala Lipis. Once you've stocked up on food supplies for your trek, it's a short ride to the starting point.

Meet your guides and enter Kenong Rimba - a lowland forest that borders the Taman Negara National Park.

Step forward as team leader and set the pace as you trek into the jungle - past gnarled trees, listen for monkeys, and keep your eyes peeled for signs of wild pigs and tigers. Push on past cascading waterfalls and towering limestone pillars.

At eight, pitch your tents and get some dinner on the go, then fall asleep to the sounds of the jungle.

Trek back to the start point and return to Kuala Lipis for a well-earned rest.

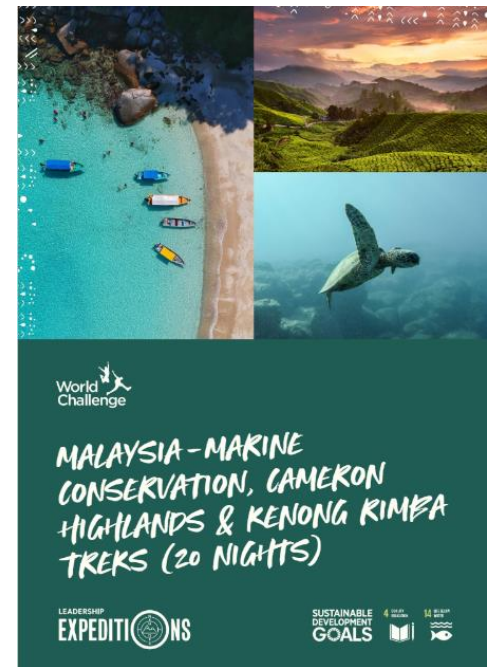

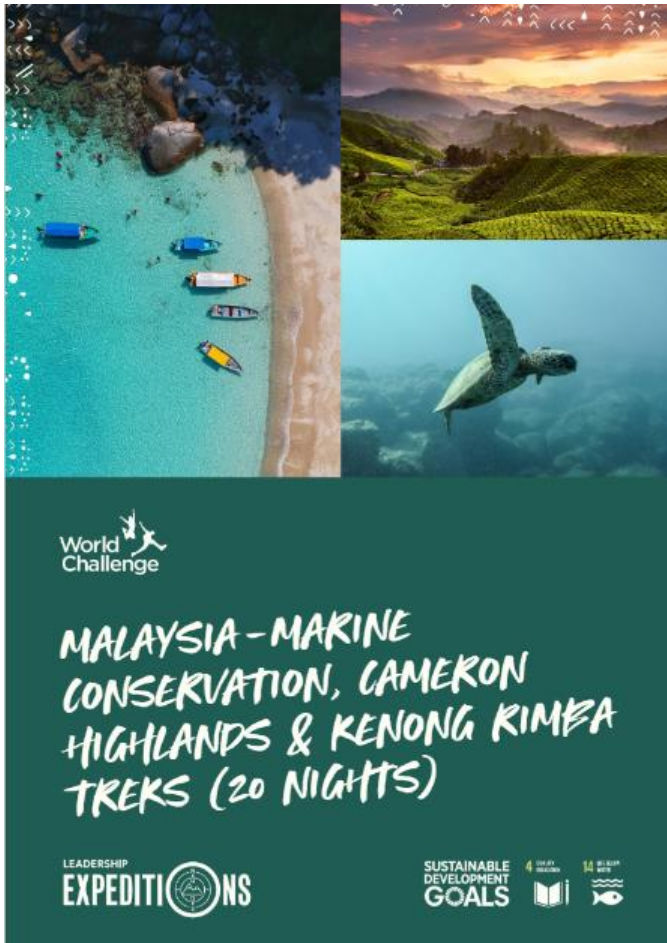


