

# Y12 A level Photography Journal Transition Project

## What?

Create a visual photography journal which reflects aspects of your own life and personality in a small sketchbook or altered book (maximum size A4). You could also work digitally e.g. using PowerPoint, if you prefer.

## How?

Use a combination of photographs, drawings, found images/objects and text/words to illustrate the suggested themes using a range of materials, techniques and processes.

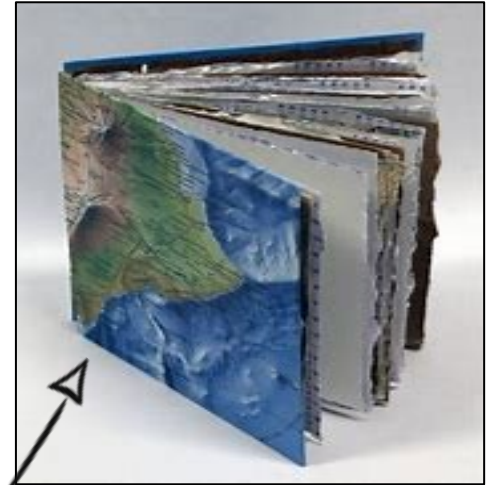
## Why?

To develop and refine your observation skills by looking more closely at things around you, taking photographs, using annotation and drawing to show your ideas and thoughts.



# Sketchbook and Journal ideas

To begin with you will need a sketchbook. You are more than welcome to make your own (you can find tutorials on YouTube), or you may simply purchase one, try to use one that is no bigger than A4 in size (A5 works well and is more transportable). If you are making your own, look at some of these examples for ideas. Just use whatever you have available at home. Check out Pinterest for ideas as well as researching handmade artist sketchbooks.

You can use an old, damaged or unwanted paper or hardback book and draw on top of the pages and words



Create an accordion or concertina journal by folding and gluing paper into a long strip.



# What will I photograph?

Each double page will have a theme (we have given you 30 to start with) which should keep your imaginations busy. You should use your own photos, drawings and annotation to illustrate these themes. You can also add ephemera such as quotes, receipts and tickets etc. to help with the narrative of the journal. You can include examples of artists whose work relates to the theme as well as your own photographs. Consider how you could interpret each theme – it doesn't have to be a purely literal interpretation – be creative and think outside the box! Think about viewpoint & perspective. Look at the following slides for inspiration from different artists.

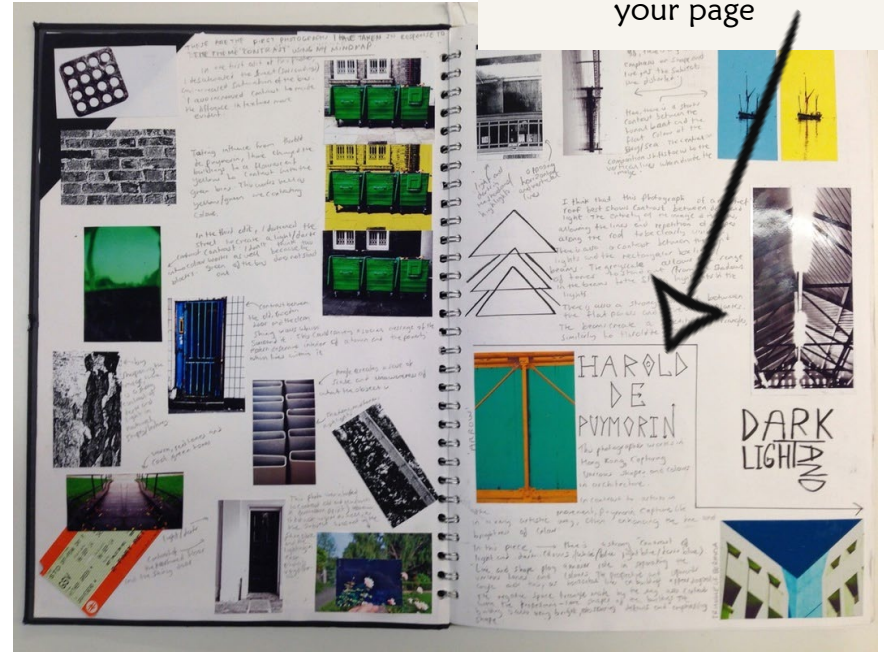
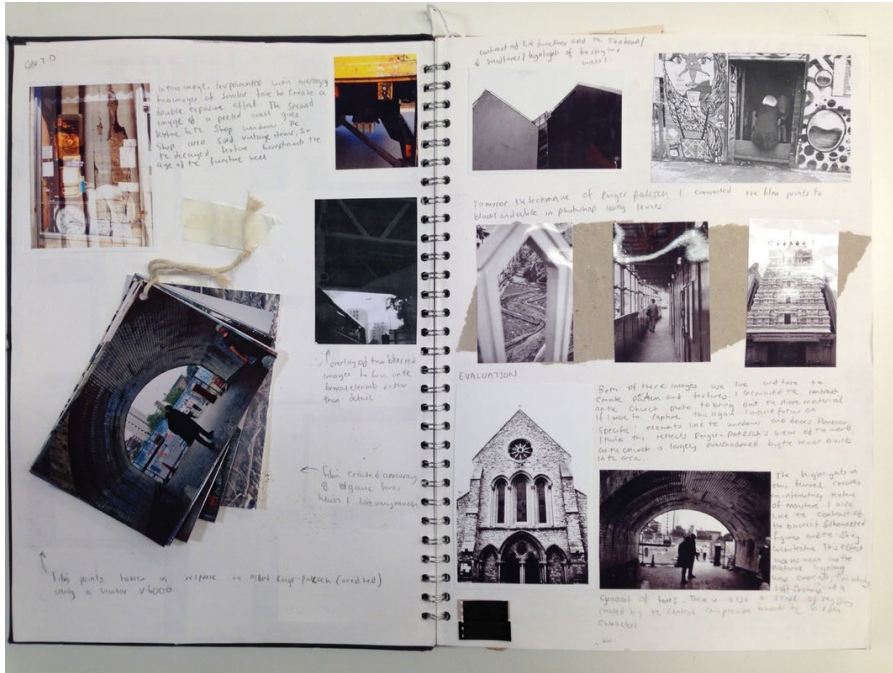

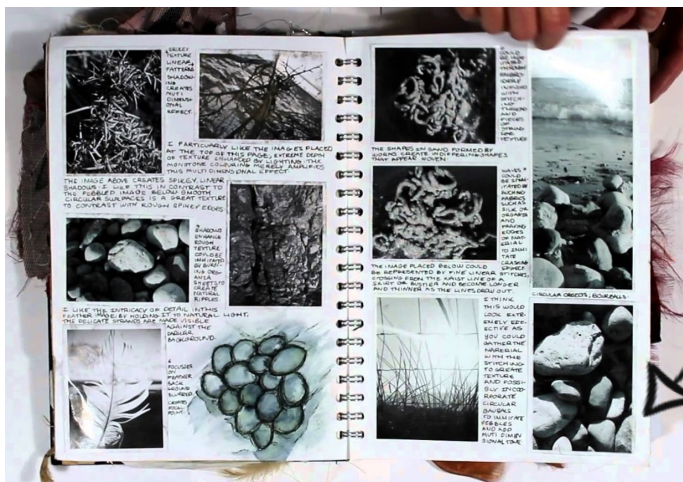
# Page inspiration and layout ideas

You can use small titles using a relevant font as a way to give context to your page



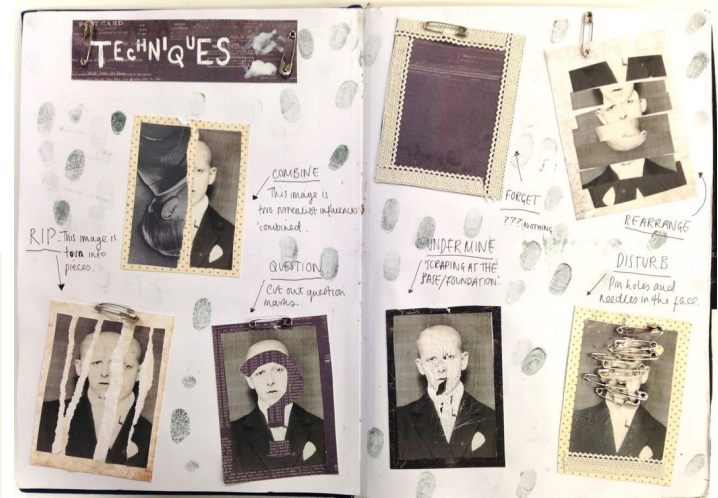

# Artist: Peter Beard



Peter Beard was born in 1938 in New York. Beard began keeping diaries as a young boy and making photographs, as an extension of the diaries, at the age of 12. After leaving school, he went to university, initially planning to study medicine but he switched to art history, graduating in 1961. After this, he travelled extensively in Africa, documenting the demise of 35000 elephants and other species of wildlife.

Beard's photographs of Africa, African animals and journals that often integrate his photographs have been widely shown and published since the 1970s.

Each of his works is unique, a combination of his photography with elements derived from his daily diary-keeping, a practice he continued until his death in 2020. These volumes contain newspaper clippings, dried leaves, insects, old sepia-toned photos, transcribed telephone messages, marginalia in India ink, photographs of women, quotes, found objects, and the like; these become incorporated, with original drawings and collage by Beard.

# Artist: Dan Eldon

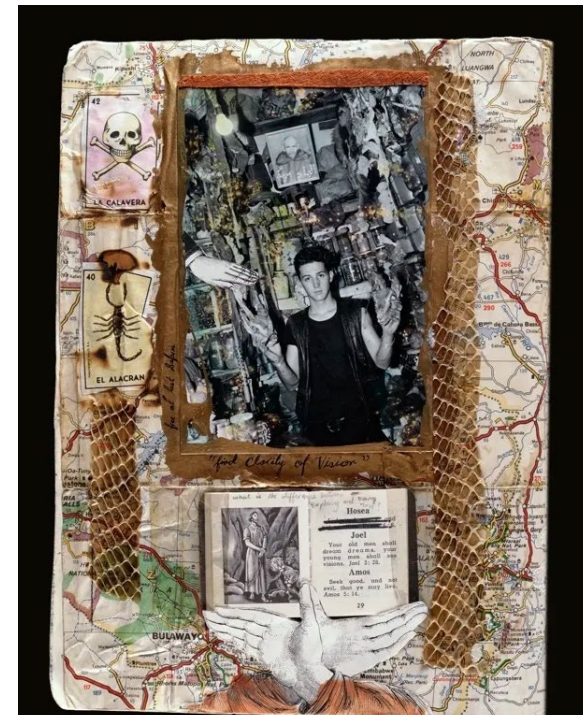


Daniel Robert Eldon (born 1970) was a British-Kenyan photojournalist, artist and activist killed in Somalia while working as a Reuters photojournalist. He was born in London, but moved to Kenya when he was 7 years old, and though he travelled often – visiting more than 40 countries in 22 years – he always considered Africa home

His journals were published retrospectively in four volumes by Chronicle Books, including *The Journey Is the Destination*, *The Art of Life*, and *Safari as a Way of Life*

# Success Criteria

- ❑ The main focus of your pages must be Photography – make sure you capture images you are proud of!
- ❑ Respond to at least 15 of the suggested themes (to create a minimum of 15 double pages)
- ❑ Think carefully about how you interpret each theme to make them personal – try to be creative and avoid taking the theme too literally!
- ❑ Aim for a minimum of 3 best photos per theme (5 photos if you're ambitious!)
- ❑ Include a range of photographic styles to show your skills off (e.g. think about viewpoint and perspective, close-up, bird's eye, worm's eye etc.).
- ❑ Include images from at least 3 photographers who inspire you (e.g. from Pinterest or Instagram). Try to link them with 3 of the themes to show where your ideas came from.
