## **ABOUT OUR SCHOOL**

Our alternative school of choice petition was the result of a collaborative effort among various parents, teachers, and community members in Salinas. The purpose was to create a school that promotes academic success with a mastery of the “basics”.

We have worked hard to create an environment conducive to meaningful intellectual stimulation via independent studies. Our learning program is built on the belief that all children CAN and innately desire to learn—including those students without a history of academic success.

We believe that all children do not learn in the same way and children are gifted in various ways, and those gifts need to be encouraged. Reading assessment and targeted instruction are hallmarks of this school, raising the confidence level and academic output of traditionally labeled “low achievers,” while challenging the gifted learner to further explore areas of interest. We believe that real learning takes place when active participants make personal connections to the skills and knowledge imparted in the classroom.

Having created El Puente School under this model, we know that our program is a vital and integral part of our community. Our goal is to be a model school, offering successful educational opportunities and innovations to the students and parents that we serve. We seek to make education a community commitment.

## **PARENT ENGAGEMENT POLICY**

Username and passwords are unique to each parent. Your personal information will be given to you at the beginning of the school year. We are excited to offer our parents the opportunity to follow their student's progress at El Puente.

### **SCHOOL SITE COUNCIL:**

Every school that receives federal funds establishes a School Site Council (SSC). As members of the SSC, parents and legal guardians participate in the decision-making process regarding the school's educational program, allocating categorical funds to support these programs and planning to engage parents and legal guardians in their children's education. Members are elected to serve one or two-year terms. Typically, meetings are held once a month and are open to the public. Contact the Main Office for the exact dates and times.

### **English Language Learners Advisory Committee (ELAC)**

The ELAC committee consists of parents of English Learners. They meet monthly to discuss and support their children's academic progress. During these meetings, the committee monitors and reviews the services offered by school programs to ensure they meet the needs of English Learners.

### **HOW CAN EL PUENTE SCHOOL HELP YOU GRADUATE?**

- You earn a high school diploma or a high school equivalency when you meet the requirements for our school.
- We help you get caught up on credits so you can return to your home school if you so choose.
- We assist you with dual enrollment at Hartnell Community College or Graduation Plus at the Salinas Education Center, as well as additional classes on our campus if you need to accelerate your credit progress.
- We enroll you in an ROP class of your choice through the ROP counselor on our campus, in order to help you learn a work skill or get career exposure.
- We enroll you in the Retail Co-Op course to earn credits if you have a job.
- We allow you to change schedules as needed to maximize your potential credit earning.
- We offer you infant care if you need it for your child while you continue your education.
- We help you develop a life plan with you for after graduation.

### **OUR FOCUS ON LEARNING AND CURRICULUM**

- El Puente School believes all students deserve a challenging, motivating and relevant education. Curriculum is focused upon essential standards and

aligned to the California State Standards.

- El Puente School is focused on providing high quality and current textbooks and curriculum materials that are aligned to the California State and adopted by the Salinas Union High School District.
- Each teacher is expected to establish an environment that encourages and supports instructional consistency. Parents are encouraged to meet with teachers if they have specific questions about the curriculum.

## **MASTER AGREEMENT**

Upon enrollment at El Puente School, students and their parents are to attend an in-person orientation. The students will be given instructions on how to drop from their home school. The families will then be directed to the registrar to complete the registration process for El Puente. Once registered, the counselor will create a schedule and the master agreement. The master agreement will be created and then emailed for signatures. It is a requirement of the State of California to have a signed master agreement that allows the district to offer you the option to study independently. The student will not be allowed to enroll at El Puente without a signed master agreement. Then they will be directed to the registrar for the required paperwork. The Master Agreement is the legal document that allows the district to offer you the option to study independently.

## **INDIVIDUAL LEARNING PLAN & FUTURE GOAL SETTING**

The counselors work with each student to develop an Individual Learning Plan which will be reviewed with parents. The plan will serve as a guide for students. Students are expected to follow the plan for them to meet their requirements to graduate on their targeted date. The plan is updated during the year. The plan also contains goals and objectives to be attained after graduation.

The College & Career Counselor will provide step-by-step assistance with students who wish to apply for admissions into a 2-year college, 4-year college/university, or trade school. The counselor will also provide support to students who wish to apply for employment during their high school years or after graduation.

## **SCHEDULE CHANGES**

Students are placed in a class after their transcript has been reviewed and the course(s) needed to complete are identified. The expectation for the student is to earn 1 credit every 3 days. The student is expected to attend no less than 70 minutes each day Monday- Friday and work independently for 5-6 hours daily.

Once a student completes one course, a schedule change will be made. There are other reasons why a student's schedule may be changed. Some changes are made to take an elective class, R.O.P., or other special circumstances.

Class changes will only be made by the counselor. Some changes will require authorization by the Principal.

Students are expected to complete at least three classes each semester (30 credits). Students that need extra support to learn English or have Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) may have to take additional support classes.

## **PARENT-STUDENT-TEACHER CONFERENCES**

One of the best ways that we can partner together is through Parent/Student/Teacher Conferences. These conferences are mandatory for students that are not progressing. Students are expected to complete 30 credits per semester.

## **DESIGN OF THE INDEPENDENT STUDY COURSEWORK**

We view all our programs as Personalized Learning. Independent study is not for all students at the middle school and high school level; independent study requires a high level of commitment, motivation, organizational skills, and self-direction not unlike the level required by college students.

Students are enrolled in one subject at a time and are to attend five days per week. All assigned work by each credentialed teacher is to be completed by the student in order for the work to be considered for credit. The teacher reviews all completed assigned work from the student and grades the assignments. From the completed work, samples are pulled to showcase student mastery of academics. An independent auditor may review these work samples annually. The teacher assigns a time value to the completed work, which is translated into average daily attendance (ADA) to support school funding.

All students are required to attend daily, either virtually or in-person, until they complete the subject assigned. Once the class is completed, the teacher issues final grades and credits and submits a request to the counselor so that the new course can be promptly added.

## **COURSES OF STUDY**

The Salinas Union High School District requires 220 credits for graduation from El Puente School. We offer a full course of study to complete requirements. The following are the requirements for graduation:

### **220 total credits are required**

- 1) English 40 credits are required
- 2) History/Social Studies 35 credits are required
- 3) World History/Geography 10 credits are required

- 4) American History 10 credits are required
- 5) American Government 5 credits are required
- 6) Economics 5 credits are required
- 7) Ethnic Studies 5 credits are required
- 8) Science 20 credits of laboratory/applied science are required
  - a. Physical Science 10 credits are required
  - b. Biological Science 10 credits are required
- 9) Physical Education 20 credits are required
- 10) Health Education 5 credits are required
- 11) Foreign Language 20 credits are required
- 12) VAPA 20 credits or 10 credits of Vocational Education or 10 credits of VAPA and 10 credits of Vocational Education
- 13) Elective classes 30 credits of classes

### **\*\*District's Community Service requirement of 40 hours**

We encourage El Puente School students to enroll in ROP courses to learn valuable job skills and to earn additional credits toward graduation. Students may take training in a number of professions. Advanced Culinary Arts, Auto Service, Dental Careers, Engine Maintenance & Repair, Health Occupations/Physical Therapy, Industrial Welding, Foundations of Nursing, Medical Assisting, EMR/EMT, Fire Technology, and Careers in Education. Transportation to and from Mission Trails ROP is provided. Make an appointment with the ROP counselor for details.

### **COMMUNITY SERVICE**

All Salinas Union High School District students must complete 40 community service hours in any combination of the three categories: Educational Entity, Non-Profit, or Career Development. All community service hours must be unpaid and voluntary. Non-profit and educational organizations listed on the Pre-Approved List do not require prior approval. For Career Development or any organizations not on the pre-approved list, students must receive prior approval by the Work-Experience Coordinator. All pre-approval requests and completed logs must be submitted at [eps.is/communityservice](http://eps.is/communityservice).

### **ASSESSMENT**

All students enrolled at El Puente School are expected to participate in all required testing and assessments administered and/or created by El Puente School. If parents do not have their students participate in state testing, parents jeopardize the ability of El Puente School to operate as a public school of choice. We value testing opportunities for students and encourage each and every parent to have their student participate annually in the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP).

Each year, students participate in examinations in the area of English Language Arts, Math, and Science, depending on the grade in which they enrolled. It is

important to note that the state is not interested in your student's individual test scores, rather the school-wide aggregated student test data. The CAASPP testing program is only one of several tools used to evaluate your child's growth and development. The employees of El Puente School never evaluate your student based on one test alone. Practice tests and study materials are available to help your family feel comfortable with the process. Please discuss any questions or concerns that you may have with your student's counselor.

## **GRADUATION**

El Puente School is a school within the Salinas Union High School District. This means we issue high school diplomas the same as any of our other high schools. We have a graduation ceremony that takes place on the last day of school. All students who complete graduation requirements before the school year ends may withdraw early from El Puente School as graduates, but are expected to return for the graduation ceremony.

## **FINANCIAL AID & SCHOLARSHIPS**

California law requires all graduating high school students to submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or the California Dream Act Application (CADAA) to support funding their education at a 2-year college, 4-year university, or trade school. Students and parents/guardians who do not wish to submit an application must fill out an opt-out form. Scholarships are also available to high school students who plan to continue their education. We will assist students to identify scholarships and complete applications for scholarships and financial aid. Questions about college scholarships and financial aid should be directed to our College & Career Counselor.

## **GENERAL RULES & GUIDELINES**

In addition to their effort and attendance, good behavior and character are key for students to be successful. El Puente School expects our students to demonstrate good character. We expect El Puente School students to treat each other, and all adults, with consideration and thoughtfulness. The following are El Puente's rules, in addition to those you will find in your copy of the Salinas Union School District

Student Behavior Manual. The El Puente School reserves the right to add additional rules or restrictions at any time to ensure a safe learning environment for its students and staff.

- Students must comply with the directions of all staff members.
- Students must meet academic goals. Every student must come to school prepared with the required materials for learning.
- The parking lot is part of the campus and all school rules apply there. Vehicles may be searched. Students are not allowed to gather in the parking lot, or to sit in the cars, before school, during school or after school. The parking lot is

provided by the District as a convenience. The District or school is not responsible for thefts, accidents, etc., which may occur in the parking lot.

- Students are to adhere to the dress code described in this handbook.
- Students are not allowed to use cell phones during class time. They may use them outside of class before school, during lunch or after school.
- Students may only use the vending machines during break period, lunch, and before and after school. Students are not to stop at machines during class time.
- During class time, students are to have a pass or staff permission to be outside the classroom.
- To enter another class during class time, students are to ask the permission of their teacher.

## **Positive Behavior Intervention & Support (PBIS)**

As part of our district initiative, we work with students to promote positive behavior school-wide. Students have the opportunity to earn incentives and specific praise for their positive behaviors. Teachers and staff are always on the lookout to acknowledge students positively for appropriate behaviors.

PBIS is a proactive approach to establishing the behavioral support and social culture needed for all students in a school to achieve social, emotional, and academic success.

PBIS emphasizes teaching behavioral expectations in the same manner as any core curriculum subject. It focuses on preventing inappropriate behavior through clear expectations, teaching, and positive reinforcement. The goal of PBIS is to create a positive school climate where all students can thrive and succeed.

At EPS, we believe in students working towards being PACK; Persistent, Accountable, Courteous, and Kind.

## **GRADING**

Teachers will award credits based on student achievement of an “A”, “B”, or “C” or “D” letter grade according to the grading board policy. Students have an opportunity to earn as many credits as they can every week.

Grades will be given once the student completes a course. Teachers will base their grades on quality and quantity of work according to the following scale:

A 90-100% Excellent work is complete and accurate

B 80-89% Above Average work is complete and mostly accurate

C 70-79% Average work is mostly complete and somewhat accurate

D 60-69% Below Average somewhat complete and somewhat accurate

## **State Seal of Bi-Literacy**

The State Seal of Biliteracy will be awarded to graduating seniors in the Salinas Union High School District who have demonstrated proficiency in both standard academic English and at least one other language. The District will present the State Seal of Biliteracy to each graduating high school student who has attained a high level of proficiency in speaking, reading, and writing in one or more languages in addition to English. To be eligible for the State Seal of Biliteracy, students must fulfill the criteria as required by the State of California.

## **ATTENDANCE**

Regular attendance is essential for student success, ensuring consistency in instruction, access to support, and the ability to earn course credits. Students must obtain permission to be absent from class at any time during the school day. Whenever possible, we strongly encourage scheduling appointments outside of school hours. *Absent students are still expected to complete their coursework in order to earn Satisfactory Educational Progress (SEP).*

## **CLEARING ABSENCES**

Parents or guardians must contact the attendance office to verify an absence. The school's voicemail system is available 24/7 to record messages.

When reporting an absence, parents should provide the following information:

- Student's full name
- Date of absence
- Reason for absence
- Expected return date

Alternatively, a signed note containing the same information may be submitted.

## **Excessive Excused Absences**

Excessive excused absences may require a parent conference. Students with a pattern of chronic absenteeism due to illness may need to provide verification of absences (AR 5113). Those who are frequently absent and fail to make satisfactory academic progress will be referred to the attendance truancy process.

A doctor's note is required for long-term absences.

Board Policy requires that a student maintain at least 85% attendance for the days enrolled each year of high school to graduate and receive a diploma.

## **Checking out from Campus During the School Day**

Students who need to leave campus during school hours must submit a note from a parent or guardian to the attendance office in the morning. A pass will then be issued and a note will be documented on the attendance profile.

All schools are CLOSED CAMPUSES during the entire school day. A student must receive a Permit to leave at any time during the school day from the Attendance Office, or the absence may be marked invalid.

Parents/Guardians who need to pick up their child during school hours must be present (in person) at the attendance office prepared to show their Picture ID to pull a student out of class.

We strongly encourage appointments to be made during non-school time if possible.

## **TRUANCY**

A student is considered truant if they miss four full school days without a valid excuse and do not earn satisfactory educational progress (SEP).

- Being tardy or missing more than 30 minutes of a class is considered an absence.
- Truant absences accumulate throughout the school year.
- If a student transfers within the district, their truancy record will follow them.
- Disciplinary action for cutting class, skipping school, habitual tardiness, or truancy will follow district policy.

## **Truancy Absence Review Process**

### **First Notification:**

- A letter is sent to the parent/guardian informing them that the student has missed four school days and has not met SEP requirements.
- The letter serves as a reminder that continued enrollment at EPS is contingent on meeting attendance and academic expectations.

### **Second Notification:**

- A second letter is sent if the student has missed eight days and has not earned satisfactory educational progress.
- The letter includes a scheduled attendance and SEP review conference with the Intervention Specialist.

## **Lone Wolf Referral**

Students referred to the Lone Wolf (LW) process will meet with the Intervention Specialist to create an improvement plan. A referral may be based on one or more of the following criteria:

- Inconsistent class attendance
- Failure to earn satisfactory educational progress in coursework
- Non-compliance with credit completion pacing in the master agreement
- Not adhering to Hybrid learning expectations

## **BEING ON TIME**

Students are expected to be on time to school and to each class.

## **STUDENT DEPARTURE**

Students will leave campus following their last appointment or workshop. Exceptions will be made for students attending a campus activity or with permission of staff. Students should not be wandering on campus at any given time.

## **BUS POLICY**

Students are expected to behave in accordance with district policy on all school buses. Riding the bus is a privilege, not a right. Failure to abide by rules and show a lack of courtesy and cooperation may result in one of the following:

- Removal from the bus
- Disciplinary action (Suspension / Expulsion)
- Bus privilege revoked for a specific period of time / the remainder of the year
- Students are required to have an ID to ride the bus and are allowed to only use the bus for their designated home area.

## **STUDENT IDS**

Students will be given a picture ID once enrolled at the school. The ID card must be carried at all times while on school grounds. ID is required to check out textbooks, chromebooks and to ride the school bus.

## **EL PUENTE PARKING LOT RULES**

- All California State Vehicle Code Sections apply to all drivers.
- All District & school rules extend and apply to the parking lots.
- Park only in designated parking sections.
- Any object considered a weapon in accordance with National/California State Law and/or the Student-Parent Handbook is strictly prohibited on school premises, even inside a vehicle.
- All vehicles are subject to searches by the Proactive K-9s and the school administration.
- Permits must be mounted or visible to be considered valid.
- Students parked in non-spaces will lose driving privileges.

## **EL PUENTE SCHOOL DRESS CODE**

To provide an environment that is safe, non-disruptive, and promotes learning, El Puente School students are to abide by the dress code, which is based on the District policy and can be found on our District website.

## **STUDENT INVOLVEMENT**

Student involvement in extracurricular activities promotes school success. Students are encouraged to participate in many of the activities that occur on campus, such as: helping with “Back to School Night”, Wednesday Wellness events, and graduation.

## **MASCOT**

El Puente School’s mascot is the wolf. The official color is purple.

## **ATHLETICS**

El Puente School permits athletes to participate with their home school team if in compliance with CIF rules of participation. See the school counselor for guidance if you were or are participating with your prior school’s team and would like to continue participating with the team.

## **BREAKFAST & LUNCH**

Breakfast, Lunch, and Snacks are available to all enrolled students at no cost regardless of income under the Community Eligibility Provision. Students will receive one serving per meal; any second meal will be charged to the student's account.

Food Service provides free breakfast every morning to all students from 8:00 to 8:30 a.m. Free Lunch is served every day from 12:13 to 12:56 p.m. Students may

NOT use another student's ID card!

- Students are encouraged to carry their ID card!
- Form lines in a single file.
- Put trash in the trash containers.
- Students should treat others with respect.

## **FIELD TRIPS**

Field trips provide students with an alternative learning experience, an extension to learning in the classroom, and an incentive to achieve.

1. Students will complete all necessary forms prior to departure and must meet eligibility requirements.
2. During the trip, students will follow directions and cooperate with staff and other students.
3. All school and district rules will be in effect.
4. Vehicle safety rules must be observed.
5. All students will travel and return by the transportation provided by the school.

## **LOST BOOKS & DEBTS**

Textbooks, Chromebooks and materials are expensive and valuable. If you lose it, you must pay for it. If you have any books from your previous school, you are to return them to that school or turn them in at El Puente. If you owe any debts at any school you must clear your debts. Lost or damaged Chromebooks will result in a fine of \$300.00. You can pay your debts at El Puente. Students who have not cleared debts or returned books may not participate in the graduation ceremony.

## **LANGUAGE**

The SUHSD is committed to recognizing, addressing, and eradicating all forms of racism, gender discrimination, and ethnic oppression.

We condemn racism, discrimination, and bigotry in all forms. All members of the SUHSD community—students, staff, faculty, administration, trustees, alumni, and families—will use non-discriminatory language. Those not in compliance with our language norms will be addressed and instructed on our language norms. Students using unacceptable language will be disciplined according to our school board policies, and California Education Code, and will result in loss of privileges.

## **WELLNESS CENTER**

The Wellness Center provides prevention and short-term intervention for all students facing social and emotional challenges that impact academic performance, attendance, and behavior at school. They are safe, supportive environments on the school campuses where students can go to discuss a variety of concerns. Through both on-campus programming and community-based partnerships, students receive coordinated health education, assessment, counseling, and other support services to maximize student engagement and success.

## **SUBSTANCE ABUSE**

With the help of El Puente's Drug Resource Specialist, students can strengthen their ability to make choices that protect their well-being and pave the way for a future free from substance interference. Students are encouraged to participate in group sessions voluntarily. Students, who break school rules, regarding drugs or alcohol, may be assigned to participate in a counseling program.

## **RESTROOMS**

El Puente School provides restrooms that are clean and intended for student use. Students going to the restroom during class time must have a pass from their teacher.

## **STUDENT CLUBS**

Throughout the school year, students will have the opportunity to join various clubs that may meet on campus. All clubs are organized and supervised by school faculty/staff or parent volunteers. See front office staff for a current schedule of meetings.

## **ELECTRONIC SIGNALING AND MEDIA DEVICES**

Unauthorized use or possession of electronic signaling and media devices and other portable electronic or communication devices disrupt instructional programs and distract the learning environment. Therefore, unauthorized use or possession of such devices may be grounds for disciplinary action per board policy 5131.8

District teachers and employees are expected to provide appropriate supervision to enforce District rules and regulations. If a district teacher or employee observes or becomes aware of a violation of the rules and/or regulations, the teacher or employee may:

- Direct the student to turn the device off and notify a campus supervisor or

school administration.

## **HEALTH SERVICES**

Students are not permitted to have medication on campus without a signed order from a healthcare provider. The form to use is below:

## **IMMUNIZATIONS**

Students must meet state immunization requirements when enrolling in transitional kindergarten (TK) through 12th grade. Parents must show their child's immunization record as proof of immunization. Students who don't meet the immunization requirements may be excluded from school until the parent or guardian provides documentation of compliance with the requirements.

## **WORK EXPERIENCE & WORK PERMITS**

California law requires that all persons under 18 years of age who are employed must have a work permit. See the Work-Experience Coordinator for more information. Work permit applications are available on our website or in the main office. Students must have good attendance and be progressing toward graduation to obtain a work permit. A permit will be revoked if a student is not meeting these requirements. If students have a job and valid work permit, they may enroll in the Retail Co-Op Course and earn up to 10 credits per year.

## **EDUCATIONAL OPTIONS**

The Salinas Union High School District has other educational options for students offered through the Salinas Education Center. The Salinas Education Center is comprised of the Salinas Adult School, El Puente School, and Out of School Youth, Parent Education, Pupil Personnel Services and the SPED transitions program. Graduation Plus is an online after school program available to you.

## **MOUNT TORO HIGH SCHOOL (CONTINUATION SCHOOL)**

Mount Toro High School is a high school diploma program. Your students attend for five hours daily. Students earn a regular high school diploma and graduate from Mount Toro High School. Upon earning the required credits to be on track for graduation students may petition to return to their original school. To graduate from their original school they must enroll at the start of the second semester and have the minimum number of credits required at the comprehensive high school to be considered on track.

## **HiSET PREPARATION (BEL or BSL/ROP)**

Some students choose to obtain a High School Equivalency or HiSET, also known as an alternative to the GED, a General Education Diploma. The HiSET exam demonstrates that a test taker has attained the academic knowledge and proficiency equivalent to those of a high school graduate. Information from the exam helps identify the areas where test takers are career and college ready, as well as areas where they may need additional preparation. Test takers are tested in five core areas: Language Arts – Reading, Language Arts – Writing, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies. Test content is aligned with current practice in all states and jurisdiction. Test takers can use existing prep courses and materials to prepare for the HiSET exam. Test takers are given scores in all core areas, as well as a total score. Students passing the tests confirm that they have high school level academic skills and are able to pass the tests that are given to high school diploma graduates in California. If students pass all tests with the required scores, they will be issued a certificate, the High School Equivalency Test certificate, by the State of California.

To enroll in any El Puente HiSET program students must be 17 years and 6 months old at the time of enrollment. To enroll in Salinas Adult School HiSET program, students must be at least 18 years old. Students must have an official government identification card with your picture on it: California Driver's License, California I.D., military I.D. or Matricula Consular. Testing takes place at the Salinas Education Center.

It is expected that students will attend daily and study diligently. Students should take no more than twenty days to take and pass each test. Students, who pass all HiSET tests before the school year is over, can withdraw from school early. They are dropped and return at the end of the year to participate in the graduation ceremony.

## **MISSION TRAILS REGIONAL OCCUPATIONAL PROGRAM**

The Mission Trails Regional Occupational Program (ROP) is a vocational training program for Monterey County. It operates under the Salinas Union High School District. Courses are held year round, both part-time and full-time courses during the day or in the evenings. Courses are free of charge and are open to high school students and out-of-school youth over 16 years of age and to adults. First priority will be given to high school students. High school students under 16 years of age may be admitted with the approval of the Principal.

ROP training develops marketable skills, abilities, attitudes and work habits so students may secure jobs, work part-time, prepare for advanced training, or upgrade and enhance vocational skills. Credits applicable toward high school graduation will be awarded by the ROP each semester. Usually 10 credits per semester are awarded for each two-hour daily class. ROP courses meet the Salinas Union High School District graduation requirement for vocational

education.

We encourage El Puente School students to enroll in ROP courses to learn valuable job skills and to earn additional credits toward graduation. Students may take training in a number of professions: Advanced Culinary Arts, Auto Service, Dental Careers, Engine Maintenance & Repair, Health Occupations/Physical Therapy, Industrial Welding, Foundations of Nursing, Medical Assisting, EMR/EMT, Fire Technology, and Careers in Education. Transportation to and from Mission Trails ROP is provided. Make an appointment with the College & Career Counselor for details.

### **TEEN PARENT CENTER**

We offer child care free of cost to any teen parent enrolled at El Puente on a space available basis.
