BI-MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CITY OF UPPER ARLINGTON

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The City's Parks & Recreation
Department recently wrapped up
community engagement for Phase II of
the Fancyburg Park Master Plan, with
more than 600 residents completing an
online survey. This round focused on
updated design concepts and proposed
amenities developed by The Edge
Group, and the feedback received is
guiding next steps for upgrades to this
important community space.

Thoughts on the Overall Plan

Residents expressed strong support for many of the proposed features. The natural play areas and a four-season pavilion were seen as opportunities to enhance recreation and community gathering. While many liked the idea of an outdoor amphitheater, others questioned the need or were worried about neighborhood impacts, stressing the importance of making sure park elements complement the neighborhood setting.

One of the more debated elements

was an interactive wetland. While some appreciated its educational value and natural feel, others voiced concerns about safety for young children and the potential for attracting mosquitoes.

Other recurring themes included the importance of maintaining open green space, preserving mature trees, and improving safety and accessibility. Many residents suggested adding more shaded areas, especially near play equipment, and ensuring that the park is accessible to children of all abilities. There was also strong interest in additional recreational features like pickleball courts, along with amenities such as picnic areas and improved parking.

Respondents were able to weigh in on design approach for the playground. Steel and fabric designs were seen as more versatile, engaging, and safer, with shade features and materials that stay cooler in the sun.

The survey also asked for feedback on architectural styles for the pavilion. In general, there was a preference for a timeless, welcoming design that would blend in with the natural setting, with natural materials like wood and stone.

What Comes Next?

This second phase of community feedback provided valuable insights into what residents want - and don't want – for Fancyburg Park. The project team shared the findings with the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board and City Council in June. These conversations will help guide the final direction of the Fancyburg Park Master Plan. After incorporating input from both groups, a refined design will be developed and shared with the community in the coming months. Once finalized, construction of the maintenance facility will occur in 2026, with the balance of the work scheduled for 2027 and 2028.

2025 Community Survey Update

Community Invited to Complete Online Version of Survey DEADLINE: Sunday, July 13

Every few years, the City surveys its residents to gauge how we're doing in terms of the services that we provide, and to identify where improvements or adjustments might be needed to stay in tune with community needs and desires.

The statistically valid data gathering portion of the 2025 Community Survey process is now complete. During this phase, 1,500 randomly selected households received an invitation to participate.

Now, we are now opening the survey up to the entire community, with an online version that can be completed between June 30-July 13.

The primary goals of the 2025 Community Survey are to obtain feedback on areas that include:

- The quality of life in Upper Arlington
- Satisfaction with existing City services
- Opinions on implementation of the City's Capital Improvement Program
- Opinions on recent economic development activity
- Perceptions of the challenges that currently face UA

 Identifying or reaffirming important goals for the City

The emerging opinions and themes will be used in a variety of ways, aiding City Council as it sets direction for the City and as it revisits the 2026 budget. In addition, City departments will use the data to determine satisfaction with existing programming and services, possibly obtaining new ideas or suggestions for improvement.

In the fall, our consultant from Illuminology will present the survey findings to City Council, so please watch for details in the coming weeks.

July: UV Safety Awareness Month

Summer is here! Which means it is time to practice sun safety skills. Did you know that having five or more sunburns doubles your risk for melanoma, a form of skin cancer caused by over-exposure to UVA and UVB rays? We are exposed to UV rays in all seasons, but in the summer frequent sun exposure puts you at risk for skin cancer, sun burns, and eye damage. Wearing sunscreen, monitoring existing moles, limiting sunbathing and tanning beds, and wearing sunglasses are best practices to protect against UV health risks.

August: National Immunization Awareness Month

Immunizations are one of our most effective tools in keeping society safe from illness, disease, and cancers. Vaccines help the body's immune system learn how to fight germs and protect against preventable diseases. Compliance in vaccines has resulted in the control and elimination of diseases such as polio, small pox, and mumps. Highlights of City Council & Its Policy Decisions

Property Maintenance Code Amendments

In mid-June, City Council authorized a series of amendments to the City's Property Maintenance Code, providing stronger penalties for repeat, chronic and severe offenses or for non-responsive offenders.

Fortunately, extreme instances of property neglect are rare, but when they do occur they negatively impact the surrounding neighbors - oftentimes for an extended period of time. It's in everyone's best interests to have the appropriate tools in place to reach compliance when property owners ignore or refuse to cooperate with the City's code compliance team.

The code revisions include:

- Reclassifying a property maintenance violation from a minor misdemeanor to an unclassified misdemeanor. This classification allows fines of up to \$1,000. This aligns with a corresponding change made in the Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) which now includes a fine of up to \$500 for a first offense, with the ability to charge the maximum for subsequent offenses within a two-year period.
- Moving appeals of property code violations from the Board of Building Standards to the Board of Zoning & Planning (BZAP), since BZAP already hears appeals under the UDO.
- Aligns the variance application under the Property Maintenance Code with UDO variance requirements.
- Expands the civil violation process from the commercial use zone to any buildings, structures and property, allowing the City to use the civil penalty process in property maintenance matters.
- Allows the City to use the tax address on file with the Franklin



County Treasurer's Office when serving notice to the property owner.

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Give Old Clothes New Life Through Pilot Textile Recycling Program

In a partnership with SWACO, Circular Thrift, and Sustainable UA, the City has launched a textile recycling drop-off pilot program that runs through August 31.

This initiative provides residents with a convenient and



eco-friendly way to dispose of worn-out or damaged clothing and household textiles – items that are no longer suitable for donation or resale and would otherwise end up in the landfill.

The average person throws away around 70 pounds of clothing each year, much of which ends up in landfills. By participating in this pilot program, Upper Arlington residents can help reduce waste and support the circular economy by giving these materials a new life – often being repurposed into insulation, industrial rags, or other products.

Location & Hours

The textile donation enclosure is located in the front parking lot of the Public Service Center, at 4100 Roberts Road. The enclosure is accessible at all hours, seven days a week.

What Can be Donated?

This program is specifically for end-of-life textiles that are stained, ripped, or otherwise unsuitable for traditional donation or resale. Accepted items fall into the following five categories:

- Denim
- Sweatshirts & Fleece (with hardware such as zippers or buttons)
- T-Shirts & Sweatshirts (without hardware)
- 100% Polyester Items
- Other Items includes sheets, towels, blankets, socks, underwear, and bras (no underwire)

How to Participate

All items should be clean and dry before dropping off. Clear signage and donation instructions are provided at the site to guide you through the process.

Zollinger Road Mobility & Safety Improvement Project

Community Invited to July 10 Open House to Help Shape Corridor Vision



The City is kicking off a planning and design initiative focused on improving safety, mobility, and overall experience along Zollinger Road, from Riverside Drive to North Star Road. The Zollinger Road Mobility & Safety Improvement Project is an opportunity to thoughtfully invest in a corridor that serves thousands of daily users and sits at the heart of one of the community's most active areas.

"Our goal is to reimagine Zollinger Road as a safer, more comfortable, and more accessible corridor for everyone," said City Engineer Aaron Scott. "This effort reflects our broader, ongoing commitment to creating high-quality, connected infrastructure that supports long-term livability and public investment."

Community Open House

6-8 pm, Thursday, July 10

Bob Crane Community Center (Level 5), 3200 Tremont Road
The project will launch with a Community Open House that will

include interactive exhibits, maps, and hands-on opportunities for community members to highlight issues, share their experiences, and weigh in on priorities for the corridor. Topics will range from street safety and traffic flow to lighting, landscaping, signage, and the pedestrian experience.

Registration is not required to attend this meeting, however you are encouraged to RSVP using the QR Code to help the planning team prepare.

The Zollinger Road project will unfold in two main phases of community engagement. This first phase centers on identifying existing conditions, needs, and values. A second round of input later in the year will focus on reviewing concepts and shaping design direction. Public feedback will directly inform a vision statement and a set of goals that guide

statement and a set of goals that guide future improvements to the corridor.

National Church Residences Brings Corporate Campus Redevelopment Project to the City



If you're a regular reader of *UA Insight*, you may remember receiving updates on two projects focused on the Henderson Road Corridor in recent years.

Prior to last year's Henderson Road Corridor Study, in the fall of 2022 we shared plans with the community to rezone a portion of the office district surrounding Arlington Centre Boulevard to a Planned Mixed Office District, setting the stage for prospective redevelopment projects that would be more dense in nature - combining office space with other uses, such as residential and retail spaces. We held a series of public engagement opportunities throughout this process, with many residents providing invaluable input to help make the end result better, and by the close of the year, City Council had approved the rezoning.

We have long known that the Henderson Road Corridor was in need of a refresh. As one of the largest of seven key commercial districts with redevelopment potential, the Henderson Road Corridor had yet to undergo any significant change, as has happened along Lane Avenue and at Kingsdale. We knew we needed to take a closer look to see what role the City should play in setting the stage for quality redevelopment projects that would meet our economic development and community quality of life goals.

We started with the office district, in part because National Church Residences had indicated to us that they were considering redevelopment options for their corporate headquarters on North Bank Drive. We wanted to be sure we had a good framework

in place for the district that would define the community's parameters for redevelopment as National Church Residences explored its options.

After doing their due diligence, National Church Residences is now ready to bring a proposal to the City. They have drafted plans to redevelop the 7.5-acre site into a mixed-use development that would include their corporate offices and residential units designed to serve older adults, with potential public improvements by the City that could further enhance their proposal.

The public review process for this proposal began mid-June, with two public meetings designed to share details of their plans and to seek community feedback. A third meeting is scheduled for the evening of Wednesday, July 23, from 4:30-6:30 pm at the Bob Crane Community Center, 3200 Tremont Road.

Moving forward, National Church Residences has indicated that they plan to bring their plan forward for approvals by various government bodies in July, August and September. As public meetings and hearings are scheduled, we will have up-to-date information on this project available on the City's website, so that you can catch up on the details and follow the next steps in the process.

Celebrating Independence Day - UA Style!

UA knows how to put on an incredible Independence Day celebration, thanks to the hard work of the all-volunteer UA Civic Association (UACA). To help ensure the day is safe and enjoyable for everyone, we always share several reminders.

Watching the Parade

NEW FOR 2025: For safety and logistical reasons, parade spectators will not be permitted north of the Zollinger Road and Northwest Boulevard intersection. Parade viewing will only be allowed south of Zollinger Road along Northwest Boulevard.

Parade Participant Safety Reminders

If you are planning to participate in the Parade, please make sure you do your part to keep things safe. Here are some basic reminders:

- Make sure anyone riding on a float does not sit over the wheel wells
- No passing out or throwing of candy or other items
- No jumping on/off moving vehicles
- Make sure children are properly supervised
- Make sure you have water and that everyone has applied sunscreen
- Respect and follow direction from parade officials and police officers

Parade Diversability Zone

The Red Oak Family Foundation is hosting a sensory friendly parade experience in front of Holy Trinity Church, where volumes will be set to 50%, tents for shade are provided, with convenient parking and easy access to the viewing area.

Parade Traffic & Safety Restrictions

The Police Division will place barricades or City vehicles at streets intersecting Northwest Blvd. As a result, local traffic will not be able to cross or use Northwest per the following schedule:

- 6:30-7 am all streets between Zollinger Rd. and Lane Ave. closed at Northwest.
- 7-7:30 am most streets between Lane Ave. and North Star Rd. closed at Northwest. It will still be possible to cross Northwest at Guilford, Barrington and Waltham roads until approximately 8 am.
- Travel on Northwest Blvd. limited after 7:30 am.
- Lane Ave. remains open to traffic until approximately 8:30 am.
- All streets are expected to be reopened to traffic by 1 pm.

Parking Restrictions

Parking restrictions will be in effect for most streets south of Lane Avenue that surround the parade route - in some instances this will be on both sides of the street, in other instances it will be on the fire hydrant side only. The affected streets will be posted in advance with "no parking" signs. No parking hours will be from 5 am-1 pm on the day of the parade. If you live in the area, please move cars into your driveway or to a nearby location where parking is permissible.

Party in the Park

Gates open at 5 pm at Northam Park, featuring Yachtopia, followed by The Conspiracy Band, and culminating in an exciting display of fireworks at 10 pm. New this year, UACA has also scheduled a pre-fireworks Drone Show that will paint the night sky with lights, shapes and surprises.

Fireworks Safety

The State of Ohio now allows the sale and usage of some consumer-grade fireworks around certain holidays, while giving local governments the option to ban the discharge of and/or sale of fireworks. Upper Arlington has maintained its existing ban on sales and usage with one caveat: party poppers,

smoke devices, snappers and sparklers may now be used, but on private property only. Therefore, no consumergrade fireworks, not even sparklers, are permitted in any City park.

Help Protect the Northam Park Athletic Fields

UA Parks & Rec has issued some simple reminders for attendees to follow that will help protect the newly renovated turf fields and sprinkler system at Northam Park:

- No blankets are allowed on the turf prior to the start of Party in the Park at 5 pm. These blankets should be breathable (ie, no plastic tarps).
- Pop-up tents or other items that require stakes are not allowed.
- Using stakes to section off areas for seating is not permitted.

Electric Aggregation

More than 10,500 UA households and small businesses that have been part of the City/SOPEC Electric Aggregation Program since January 2024 were recently notified of their new rate of 9.756 cents per kWh, effective with the June 2025 meter read. The AEP Ohio Standard Service Offer (or price to compare) for June is 9.97 cents per kWh.

For the 2024 program, it is estimated that program participants realized approximately \$2.2M in combined savings.



Mosquito Prevention

Mosquito season is upon us, so make sure you are informed on ways to minimize the population around your property. The City contracts with Franklin County Public Health (FCPH) for the provision of an integrated mosquito management program each year. When fogging is deemed necessary, the City typically receives at least 24 hour notice of areas to be treated, and in turn, we use our website, email database and social media to inform affected residents. Garage/Yard Sales CODE COMPLIANCE | 614-583-5070

Residents may conduct one garage/ yard sale during any six-month period, not to exceed three consecutive days or two days on two consecutive weekends. Sales may be held from 8 am-8 pm, with items placed for display in a garage or backyard. Any signage should be placed on private property only and should not exceed eight square feet.

Grass/Weed Control Guidelines CODE COMPLIANCE | 614-583-5070

The care and maintenance of property and landscaping benefits the entire community. City code specifies that grass must not exceed 10 inches in height and should be kept free of noxious weeds. Failure to comply will result in notice from the City to rectify the situation within five days, at which time the City will arrange to cut the grass/weeds at the owner's expense.

Building Permit Reminders DEVELOPMENT | 614-583-5070

If you have plans to remodel part of your home, our Community Development Department can help with an important first step: checking to see if your project requires a permit. Examples of projects that require a permit include:

- Constructing a deck
- Finishing or altering a basement
- If framing is removed/added to a kitchen/bathroom or the layout is altered
- If non-load-bearing walls and/ or soffits are removed, altered or added

- Adding a porch or covered entry
- Building a fence or replacing an existing fence
- If roof decking, exterior sheeting or framing is replaced, along with shingles or siding
- If an exterior wall and/or header framing is altered during window replacement

The City's second semi-annual utility invoice is being mailed to UA households early in July. This includes fees for Solid Waste, the Stormwater Utility and, in some cases, a Neighborhood Lighting Utility fee.

Panhandling: There's a Better Way to Help! UA POLICE | 614-583-5150

In the summer, there's often an increase in panhandling across the community. While panhandling itself is not illegal, the City restricts individuals from entering the roadway and obstructing traffic to accept cash, food, or other items from vehicles. Our Police Division along with UA CARES actively responding to these situations, engaging with individuals and families who are panhandling to identify their needs and help connect them with essential services, such as shelter, food, and other resources.

We understand the desire to provide assistance directly to those in need. However, we encourage you to support the local organizations and services that are equipped to provide more long-term solutions.

While the 2024-2025 school year has come to a close, there is much to do in our schools as we work on final preparations for the upcoming school year and continue to provide academic support and enrichment for students through summer programming.

This summer, another major focus for us is phase two of our facilities master planning process. Since May, we've gathered feedback through surveys on revised draft options for our aging middle schools and Burbank Early Childhood School. These options range from addressing the physical needs of the buildings to also considering educational needs – such as classroom configurations, space for growing enrollment, and other factors that impact students' daily experiences.

I've been impressed by the level of

community engagement. By late May, we had more than 2,700 touchpoints, and that number continues to grow.

As we've connected with the community, two key questions have emerged: Why now? And what's next?

Why Facilities Planning – and Why Now?

A decade ago, our community began the first phase of our master planning process. At that time, the physical needs of our middle schools and Burbank were projected to be about a decade out.

Now, 10 years later, there is much more urgency. Hastings, Jones and Burbank have immediate physical needs. While we've maintained these buildings well, the systems within them are reaching the end of their useful life.

There is no zero-cost option. It's critical that we work together to create a strategic, financially responsible plan that reflects our community's priorities and supports a high-quality educational experience for students.

What's Next?

Over the past two months, we've received a wealth of feedback on the draft options. That input is invaluable as we shape a master plan that reflects our community's vision.

We are also aware that these options involve complex factors – especially for the middle schools – such as swing space needs during construction, timelines and considerations around the historic nature of Jones Middle School.

Because of this complexity, we are extending the planning process timeline, and anticipate bringing a recommendation to the Board of Education in early 2026. This allows us to gather even more input and engage our Financial Advisory Board to ensure a thoughtful, community-driven master plan.

Treasurer's Notes

Upper Arlington Schools provides our community with a key financial update twice a year through the five-year forecast – a



legally required document submitted to the state of Ohio each November and updated every May. This report serves as an important check-in on our current financial position and long-term outlook, reflecting our ongoing commitment to transparency and fiscal responsibility.

In May, the updated five year forecast was presented to the Board of Education at their regular meeting. The updated forecast reflects minimal changes since the November 2024 filing but does not

incorporate any potential impact from the state biennium budget, which was still making its way through the state legislature.

As it stood in May, the proposed budget could have a significant negative impact on school districts across the state, including Upper Arlington. Our two biggest areas of concern center on the proposed abandonment of the Fair School Funding Formula and a potential cap on cash balances for school districts. The latter would take away funds that our community has already approved for education.

We are continuing to share our concerns with state lawmakers and keep our community informed as the budget bill progresses through the legislature. Enrollment Update

This spring, we shared the latest enrollment projections for our district. This independent report looks at everything from real estate trends to birth data to project how many students will be enrolled in our schools during the next 10 years.

As expected, we are continuing to see steady growth in K-12 enrollment districtwide – an exciting challenge that requires thoughtful planning for staffing, space and resources.

With this trend likely to continue over the next several years, the district will continue to monitor our enrollment growth to efficiently plan for additional students and the additional people, space and resources students need to support them on their academic journey.

This affords the district additional greenspace for Tremont and the potential for future flexibility around that site.



We prioritized the most urgent needs: a new HVAC system, updated heating/cooling controls, and redone ceilings on both floors. These critical infrastructure upgrades accounted for the majority of project costs.

At the same time, we had the opportunity to respond to feedback from our patrons. The renovated Lane Road Branch now offers greater flexibility, additional access to power, more meeting rooms, and improved sound baffling to create a guieter, more comfortable space.

We received gifts from 134 community donors to further improve the children's area with new shelving and seating options. Thank you to everyone who donated to make this possible!

We are thrilled to welcome you back to a refreshed, revitalized Lane Road Branch – ready to serve our community for the next 50 years.

At press time, our plan is to reopen on Monday, July 7 at 10 am, and to hold a grand reopening celebration on Monday, July 14 at 5:30 pm, featuring a ribbon-cutting ceremony and brief remarks.

constraints. In January 2020, we installed a more ergonomic and functional circulation desk, along with an enclosed staff workroom to improve efficiency. Thanks to generous donations, we were also able to add drive-through book

drops - an amenity our patrons have

come to appreciate.

In 2022, we unveiled a refreshed Early Learning Play Area - our second iteration of this interactive, playbased learning space. Designed for young children and their families, the area encourages shared reading, creativity, play and socialization in a vibrant, engaging environment. These enhancements were made possible through the generosity of individuals and community partners, including the UA Community Foundation, the Tri-Village and Upper Arlington Rotaries, and the Friends of the Library.

Despite these updates, more substantial improvements were needed. With limited funding, progress had to wait until May 2022, when our community overwhelmingly supported


A Game of Noctis



Set in a fantastical and futuristic city of canals, *A Game of Noctis* is an imaginative interrogation of what fairness truly means. Through the












