AP Government Summer Assignment

While your summer is a time for rest and relaxation, there are a couple of small things I would like you to do in preparation for the work we will be doing in Government this year.

1. Create a document identifying your representatives at ALL levels of government (i.e.: Federal, State, and Local). Be sure to note the last time they were elected (and if they are up for re-election this year), where applicable their political affiliation, and any other information you might feel relevant to understanding who they are. You should also include – since we are in Massachusetts – your town government information, if you live in a Town Meeting town, or if you have Selectmen, or if it's a City Council, or whatever else you might have (I think those are the only three types of local govt. in MA). This document will be used as a reference tool for you throughout the year.
2. Choose three sources off of the list attached below. AT LEAST ONCE A WEEK over the summer read AT LEAST ONE article from each source. Keep a log of your reading – i.e. start a document where you chart the date you read your article for the week, the source of the article, and a brief summary of the article. These readings should be primarily political in nature.
3. Watch an interview – an in depth interview, not one that is just a couple of questions, something like a segment on *Face the Nation* or *60 Minutes* or a dedicated politics podcast – with a politician, and write a newspaper style summary of the interview. Tell me in 300-350 words the following: who was interviewed, what the interview was about, and whether or not you agreed with the politician's positions. Be sure to include a citation (in Chicago style) of the interview. The politician can be ANY politician at any level of government (local, state, federal).

In summary, by the end of the summer you should have: a document that lists all of your representatives from the National down to the Local level, a reading log of all of the political articles you have read from three different sources (should come out to about 18-21 articles in total), and a 300-350 word summary of a political interview that you've watched.

Beyond this, have a great break, and I will see you in September!
