LEARNING SNAPSHOTS

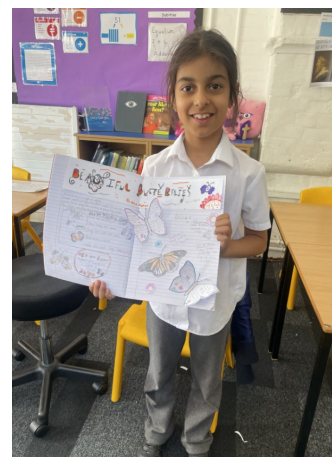
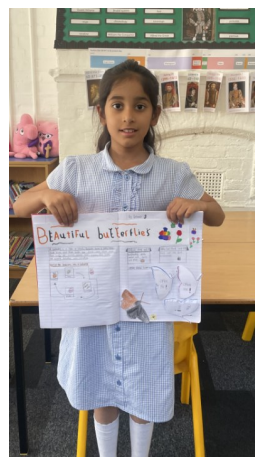
Year 1 have really enjoyed writing stories about naughty pets this week inspired by 'Diary of a Killer Cat.' They have also liked sorting and grouping animals in Science this term as well as observing wildlife in the garden. In Maths, the children have been learning about the days of the week and months of the year.

Ask me: What are the months of the year?



Year 2 have enjoyed learning more sewing skills this week by designing and creating Luggage Tags and they learnt how to add buttons and create embellishment on their design. On Monday, they released their butterflies in the garden and have also written a non-chronological report all about the lifecycle of a butterfly.

Ask me: What is the life cycle of a Butterfly?



Year 3 have been learning about their new science unit Light and Shadows this week. They have explored shadows in the playground and learnt how they are made. They also learnt how shadows change during the day by observing the shape they create when standing on the playground. In English, they are writing what would happen next after the ending of the Great Kapok Tree.

Ask me: What type of material would create a shadow?



Year 4 Some of our year 4 children have been attending their new middle school for their transition days. It is always a very nerve wracking time but also filled with lots of excitement. We cannot wait to hear how the children got on.

Reception have started their final project of the year, Moving On. We have been talking about the changes happening in our lives, with a focus on the transition to Year 1. We have had the opportunity to meet our new teacher, spend time in the classroom and try on our new uniform. The children have spent time talking about how changes can make us feel and what we can do when we feel nervous or worried. Each child designed their own puzzle piece because we all fit together.
