Spotlight on Learning: Jill Lachenmayr, assistant superintendent of academic affairs, and Joel Schaefer, AHS social studies teacher, presented about the Saturday Academy, which allows middle school and high school students to explore topics from U.S. history. The Academy is sponsored by The Foundation for Andover Schools and is open to students from Andover and other area schools.
