Action Steps:

- Identify students with highest needs for Pre-K enrollment in our Title I Schools.
- Provide ongoing Project Read Phonics Training and coaching for K-2 Staff with onsite trained teachers.
- Identify students at risk of reading difficulties through Universal Screeners and Dyslexia Training and put supports in place for them as early as possible.
- Ensure K-3 teachers are implementing reading and writing instruction with fidelity (Ready Reading, i-Ready, Project Read, Thinking Maps, and Extended Texts).
- Review retention rates by school to identify specific teachers who need additional support with differentiating instruction.

Subgroup Performance

Goal: Provide additional assistance to subgroups with disparities in performance on state assessments when compared to their peers.

Action Steps:

- School administrators will review subgroup data from District Common Assessments and State Assessments to identify disparities in performance
- School administrators will meet with teachers to review interventions for all students, particularly those with subgroup achievement gaps
- Professional Development will be provided ongoing by Special Education Department, ESL Specialist, and Curriculum Specialists from Instructional programs.
- An ATSI Specialist will monitor progress of student subgroups, meet with administrators to develop plans of action, and present results and plans to the Director of Instructional Programs, Superintendent, and School Board.

Juvenile Detention Center Transitions

Goal: Provide supports for students who transition from the juvenile detention centers to a school in the district

Action Steps:

- Identify students who have been detained at the detention center.
- Provide supplemental educational resources to students while in detention.
- Notify home schools of students detained.
- Participate in a transitional meeting with juvenile detention staff and parents to develop a transitional plan for return to home school.
- Notify counselors and school administrators of students return to school and the transitional plan developed.
- School personnel will develop and individualize a support plan for the student to remain at school.

Average Daily Attendance

Goal: To Increase average daily attendance K-12 district wide and decrease the number of students who are chronically absent

Action Steps:

- Identify students who are chronically absent and communicate with parents and attendance officer when needed.
- With the assistance of District personnel, develop strategies to reduce the number of chronically absent students.
- Develop procedures for notifying parents, school/district personnel of students' absences and patterns and define personnel responsible for each task (Design Team Attendance Committee is developing Standard Operating Procedures)
- Contact other agencies or assistance with chronic absenteeism.
- Through parent engagement activities, communicate attendance issues and resolution for absenteeism in a timely manner.
- Develop a plan of action for individual students who meet the criteria as specified in our district attendance policy.

Current Initiatives Descriptions



SYSTEMIC RENEWAL

- GSD Progress Monitoring: Formative and summative assessments are administered frequently and the data is
 used by teachers and administrators to redesign practice and instruction to fit the needs of the individual
 students.
- Essential Pieces: Essential Pieces is staff development for all teachers in the GSD delivered in a conference format. Teachers and staff may choose programs of interest for morning and afternoon sessions.
- Administrative Nuts & Bolts: In the summer of each year the entire administrative staff and principals from each school meet for professional development.
- Design Teams: Design teams are school level teams under the direction of the principal that leads in creating engagement focused schools. They operate as a learning community and a resource of support to all teachers about a focus on engagement.
- Title III: EL Small Group and Individualized Instruction: Depending on the age and need of the child, students will receive service and support 30 (elementary) to 75 minutes each day (middle and high school). The teacher works with ELL students to assist them in becoming acquainted with English language and targets skills which will have strong transfer into the general education classroom. This teacher also acts as a liaison while students familiarize themselves with a new language and academic requirements. Furthermore, students have access to an online remediation program. Elementary students employ the use of Image Learning Language and Literacy and students in the intermediate and secondary settings will make use of Imagine Reading .

SCHOOL-COMMUNITY COLLABORATION

- Parent-Community Surveys: Annually, parents and community members provided feedback about the schools' programs, safety, and general functioning via survey. The information is collected and analyzed to assist the principal and district in the development of Title I school- wide plans, which detail such plans as school reform initiatives, timely assistance to students, professional development, and highly-qualified teachers and teacher assistants.
- School Resource Officers: Every school has access to a police officer supplied by the Gulfport Police Department.
- School Based Clinic: Schools have a site-based clinic staffed by nurses. The Learning Center shares the nurses in the district.
- Career Speakers: All GSD schools have career speakers who visit the schools at various times during the school year.
- Total Health Clinics: Medical clinics are available for staff and family members.

SAFE LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS

- Code of Conduct: A code of Conduct is printed in handbooks for every school. Parents and students have access to these rules.
- School Safety Inspection Checklist: Weekly/Monthly site visits are conducted by the maintenance department to
 ensure that each site maintains a clean and safe learning environment. The principal receives a written report
 detailing findings, concerns, and accolades.

FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

- Parent-Community Surveys: (See Above)
- Parent Advisory Committee: The superintendent facilitates a monthly parent advisory committee meeting. This
 venue gives parents from each school an opportunity to converse with the superintendent about issues that are
 important to them, their children, and the schools. Occasionally, the committee will also function as a parent
 advisory board for federal programs to ensure beneficial use of Title I parenting funds.
- Home Portal (Previously called Parent Communication Center) is a web-based center that provides parents realtime access to their child's attendance, grades, and discipline.
- School Websites: Every school in the GSD has a website. Information for students and parents is updated regularly.
- SchoolStatus Parent Notifications Emergency and informative calling/messaging system used by district
 administrators to notify and remind parents of upcoming school-district events. Parents may be notified in
 English or Spanish as well as via email and text messaging. The system may also be used to notify parents of
 school closings due to inclement weather and to survey parents regarding a myriad of topics.
- School Status Has a parent engagement platform that allows teachers to log all calls (recorded) and texts.
 Furthermore, there is a feature which will auto-translate text messages when the preferred language is selected, thereby bridging possible language communication gaps with our parents.

EARLY LITERACY DEVELOPMENT

- Project Read: Project Read is a multi-sensory instruction designed to reach every avenue to the brain and to address every child's learning style (auditory, visual, and kinesthetic). Teachers use similar techniques such as look-listen-point and structured routines to make learning fun and engaging for students.
- Write From the Beginning/Thinking Maps: Developmental thinking and writing programs are established for students in Kindergarten - twelfth grades. The focus of the program is on early training in those criterion that are necessary for successful writing achievement beyond the primary years. Teachers within a school develop a common targeted focus and shared accountability for school-wide writing performance. The purpose for implementing the program is to give both students and teachers the knowledge, skills, and tools necessary for age-appropriate writing instruction and achievement.

- Intermediate Fine Arts: Fine Arts are offered to all students. Students are allowed to take Band, Strings, Choir, and/or Art as an elective. BVMS also offers Dance. These classes prepare them for Advanced Fine Arts courses and programs at the high school level.

- Seal of Biliteracy: Beginning in the academic year of 2021-2022, each year graduating seniors with qualifying scores to demonstrate proficiency in English and a World Language can obtain a credential on their transcript and the honor of the Seal of Biliteracy. Silver and Gold distinctions are based on the level of achievement. Students will begin receiving exposure to the Spanish language in elementary school beginning 2021. Furthermore, students can begin taking Spanish for course credit in the sixth grade and AP French or Spanish at the High School. We also offer Mandarin Chinese.

School-Community Collaboration

• Part-time School Based Mental Health Therapist: This is a pull out program for individual therapy for students who have an open case with Gulfport Mental Health Center.

Safe Learning Environment

- Video/Surveillance: Both middle schools are equipped with technology which allows staff to monitor traffic areas located within the school. In addition, we have designated hall monitors to ensure a safe environment while students transition from classes/activities.
- Surveys are completed annually to assist in diagnosis of issues that may be present within the school environment. The data from these surveys is shared among stakeholders and used to create school improvement goals/initiatives.

Family Engagement

- Open House: This event is held annually to provide parents with essential information pertaining to his or her child's education. Parents and students attend a briefing conducted by school administration and visit classrooms to review details of the classroom syllabus with the teacher.
- Orientation:
 - New student orientation is held in July of each year to welcome students and parents who are new to the district
 - o 6th grade orientation is held at GCMS for 5th grade students coming from the elementary feeder schools

Every third Tuesday, PTO meetings are held to initiate involvement from various stakeholders (parents, community, etc.). During these meetings, parents are informed of various aspects pertaining to the vision and mission of our school. Family Nights are held on occasion to provide a more relaxed interaction between the school and home.

- Weekly Newsletter: Newsletters with information for parents and reminders of upcoming events are sent home weekly. It is also used as a learning tool; we often publish helpful tips for testing and other middle school related issues.
- Intake Family Conference (TLC): An in-depth family conference is held for every student that enters TLC. An IIP for the student is developed at this time. A learning inventory is taken to be included in the IIP. A reading and math assessment is also conducted using i-Ready.
- Open Door policy: This is a policy put in place that encourages parents to stop by and visit their child's classroom without an appointment.
- In grades 5-9 counselors transition with students as they progress to the next grade level. This provides a consistent person within the district/school for students and family members to communicate with when needed. As the students enter the 10th grade, the transition counselors move back to the 5th grade to begin a new cohort.

Service Learning

- Student Council: This after school club meets once a week. Meetings are facilitated by teachers and conducted by the elected officers. Student Council is involved in various service projects throughout the year to assist those within the school community. This club prides itself in setting goals to assist students in becoming positive, productive citizens.

Reading Lab: Remedial labs are staffed with a certified teacher and a teacher assistant. During the day, each teacher has six classes, two classes per grade. Eighth grade classes are based on the regular ed. 7th grade students who passed the course work but did not meet the benchmark on the Mississippi Academic Assessment Program (MAAP). The 6th and 7th grade classes are composed of regular ed. students who performed Basic or Minimal on the MAAP or, if available, any student who is struggling in the areas of mathematics or reading. The reading lab utilizes a computer based program, My Reading Coach, to instruct and remediate students.

SYSTEMIC RENEWAL

- Academic Institutes: At the end of 10th grade, students choose one of three Academic Institutes offered at GHS. These institutes are STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math), CAB (Communications, Arts, Business) and HHS (Health and Human Services).
- A major focus for the Gulfport School District is Career Pathway Education in grades 3-12. Students in elementary and middle school are exposed to various opportunities for career exploration through their academic courses. Additionally, the middle school students enroll into Cyber Foundations and STEM courses that ensure they meet technological requirements but gain more insight into the career pathway opportunities they will become part of throughout their high school career. During the 2019-2020 school year the district opened Gaston Point College and Career Readiness Center. This work-based learning training facility houses the Ingalls Shipbuilding Academy and the Mississippi Power Energy Academy.
- Advanced Fine Arts Development: GHS has developed an advanced fine arts curriculum consisting of Art 4, Band, Choir, Strings, Photography, Ceramics, AP Music Theory, AP Art Studio, and AP Art History
- Ninth and Tenth Grade: Within Gulfport High School, the Ninth and Tenth grade have a building dedicated to teaching the core subjects to those students. The grade levels are on separate floors and also have a separate administration office. Cafeteria, electives, and gym space are shared with the entire high school. Ninth and tenth grade courses focus on a rigorous curriculum that aids in preparing students for the coursework in the AIG Institutes.

SCHOOL-COMMUNITY COLLABORATION

- Gulf Coast Mental Health Center Therapist: GCMHC supplies a full-time therapist to students in day-treatment for one period a day. The therapist works with other students for the remainder of the school day.
- FAFSA Workshops
- MGCCC teams with the guidance department at GHS to offer two days of help for students in completing the FAFSA. This is done on the GHS campus. Middle College allows students to complete a 2-year Associate of Arts degree during high school.
- Team Fusion: GHS Technology Applications classes compete in the annual robotics competition. Engineers from NASA team with these students to build the robot.
- MGCCC Partnership: Gulfport School District and MGCCC have established a partnership to provide students the opportunity to take dual credit classes and Middle College courses.
- Academic Institute Advisory Board: Members of the community serve in partnership with school officials to advise the Academic Institutes at GHS.

- Admiral Card Program: Every nine weeks students are rewarded with Admiral Cards based on grades, behavior and attendance.
- Rising Stars and Advance in Finance is a culmination of the College and Career Readiness requirements. This
 event allows students to interact with local businesses and industry professionals from the Mississippi Gulf
 Coast. The event primarily focuses on interview and personal finance skills.

SAFE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

- Video/Surveillance: Our school is equipped with technology which allows us to monitor traffic areas
 located within our school. In addition, we have designated hall monitors to provide a safe environment while
 students transition from classes/activities.
- Alpha Alert System: The Alpha Alert system has been installed throughout the entire campus and will allow staff members to alert proper authorities when there is a disturbance in the classroom, weather emergencies, intruders on campus, or medical emergencies.
- Behavior Interventionist/Social Worker: GHS employs a full-time behavior interventionist who works with students experiencing discipline problems. This individual serves as the TST Chairman for grades 10-12.

FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

- In high school, the Academic/Career Counselors meet with parents and students to advise academic progress along with career guidance to enhance a students participation in an Academic Institute during the 11th and 12th grade. Students entering the 11th grade choose one of three institutes, (CAB, STEM, HHS) to focus their academic and technical courses.
- GTV/Admiral Nation is the Gulfport School District's television production offered through various technological platforms throughout the community. Through GTV/Admiral Nation community members can view high school events through live streams or record productions.
- In grades 5-9 counselors transition with students as they progress to the next grade level. This provides a consistent person within the district/school for students and family members to communicate with when needed. As the students enter the 10th grade, the transition counselors move back to the 5th grade to begin a new cohort.
- Open Door Policy: At any time during the school day, parents may come to GHS without an appointment to see the Principal.
- Open House: This event is held annually to provide parents with essential information pertaining to their child's education. Parents and students attend a briefing conducted by school administration and visit classrooms to review details of the classroom syllabus with the teacher.
- Orientation: New 9th grade student campus orientation is held in July of each year to welcome all ninth grade students to the new school. Students are given their schedule and spend the day going through their schedule acclimating themselves to the campus, meeting their teachers, finding their classrooms, and lessening their

anxiety about the first day of school with all students on campus. Counselors have a pep rally of sorts to encourage them throughout the day.

- Parent Newsletters: GHS principal publishes updates on the GHS website providing details for upcoming events, awards, and student recognition. GHS guidance department publishes a senior parent newsletter monthly. In addition, many monthly updates are given to parents on graduation information, financial aid and scholarships.
- Senior Recognition: In the spring, GHS holds a Donut Decision Day event for students who have been accepted to a college, university, military, or trade through Gaston Point. Parents may attend this program.
- Intake Family Conference (TLC): An in-depth family conference is held for every student that enters TLC. An IIP for the student is developed at this time. A learning inventory is taken to be included in the IIP. A reading and math assessment is also conducted using STAR Reading.

MENTORING /TUTORING

- After School Tutoring: Teachers are available after school for tutoring. Bus transportation is provided.
- Edgenuity: Designed for grades 9-12, Edgenuity is a comprehensive, online courseware system that meets countless needs. ALTERNATIVE SCHOOLING

- Credit Recovery Edgenuity: GHS students who fail a course with a grade above 60 can apply to their counselor for credit recovery. If accepted, the students can take the course over using Edgenuity Internet courses.
- Small Group Remedial: Students that need remediation in reading or math are given the opportunity to take basic skills courses in these areas. Entering ninth graders are the most likely students to take these classes.

- Over 30 student clubs and organizations for students to become involved in where community service can be applied.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- Team Meetings: Department Meetings are held once a month in the areas of science, math, history, and English.
 Teachers discuss curriculum, current issues in education, needs, and concerns. Technology, Kagan Strategies, inquiry based learning and questioning strategies have been major topics over the last several years.
- Weekly PLC meetings within the Academic Institutes in grades 11 and 12. During these meetings students are identified that may need mentoring/tutoring or have attendance concerns. These weekly meetings also allow teachers to collaborate on instructional practices.
- All teachers are encouraged to join their professional organizations and participate in appropriate professional development opportunities.

- Work-based learning (WBL) is an effective teaching approach used to engage students in real-life occupational experiences, allowing them to connect the knowledge and skills learned in class to the workplace. WBL provides students the opportunity to engage and interact with employers while learning to demonstrate essential employability and technical skills necessary for today's workforce
- Gulfport High School offers students a unique way to earn the required CCR course credit through the use of The Academic Institute Seminars. Through these seminar sessions students have opportunities to meet with and hear firsthand the expectations of business and industry leaders from all over the Mississippi Gulf Coast.
 Students engage with these business leaders on and off campus.

EDUCATIONAL TECHNOLOGY

- Edgenuity: see above
- Mastery Connect: A comprehensive assessment tool used in the state tested courses to assess skills on specific standards in English 2, Algebra 1, US History, and Biology. Students take a pre-test to get a baseline data sample of knowledge then each 9 weeks a cumulative assessment is taken to track student progress.

INDIVIDUAL INSTRUCTION

- Individualized Reading Plans: This is a document created for individual students who receive special education services. It outlines academic and/or behavior goals and services and accommodations that will be made available for the child. The IEP is developed by the special education teacher, regular education teacher, and parent during an official meeting.
- Language Service Plans (LSP) are drafted for every EL student to create goals and a service plan of support around the literacy areas of; Speaking, Listening, Reading and Writing.
- The Career and Technical Education (CTE) Student Services Coordinator provides opportunities for CTE students where they are provided individualized instruction/tutoring to help achieve academic attainment outcomes that are aligned with The Carl Perkins V Career and Technical Education Legislation.

- Gulfport High School currently offers 10 career pathways and work based learning to students through the Academic Institutes. The Academic Institutes allow students the opportunity to discover and develop their passions, while empowering them to choose an educational pathway that integrates their skills, aptitude, and interest.
- During the 2019-2020 school year the district opened Gaston Point College and Career Readiness Center. This work-based learning training facility houses the Ingalls Shipbuilding Academy and the Mississippi Power Energy Academy. Bus contractor First Student, hosts a Bus Driver/CDL training program. Plans are being made to add an additional program during the 2021-2022 school year in a partnership with AMR to offer an EMT program for students.
