

This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Caliber: Beta Academy expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.





Plan Summary [2025-26]

General Information

Caliber: Beta Academy is a school operating in San Pablo, CA serving students in grades TK-8. Caliber Beta's total enrollment is 950 students. According to the 2024 CA School Dashboard, 78.7% of students are socioeconomically disadvantaged and 30.2% of students are English Learners.

The mission of Beta Academy is to shift the experiences, expectations, and outcomes for students in our historically underserved community. Our school model balances high-quality academic preparation with social-emotional learning and is focused on our four pillars: Heart, Smart, Think, and Act. Our school opened its doors in 2014.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

The release of the 2024 California School Dashboard indicators for Caliber Beta Academy demonstrates continued progress, despite ongoing challenges. Based on a review of performance on state and local indicators, we have made meaningful improvements in several areas, particularly in reducing chronic absenteeism and improving academic outcomes in ELA and Math.

Key Successes:

Chronic Absenteeism: Our 2023-24 chronic absenteeism rate declined significantly overall, with a reduction of 13.5 percentage points across all students. Notably, reductions were seen across all student groups:

English Learners: -13.4 percentage points

Socioeconomically Disadvantaged: -14.4 percentage points

Students with Disabilities: -4.4 percentage points

African American: -18.1 percentage points

Asian: -22.7 percentage points

Hispanic: -10.7 percentage points

These improvements reflect the impact of our increased investments in attendance initiatives, including targeted outreach, family engagement, and the role of our Attendance Improvement & Engagement Coordinator (Goal 2, Action 3). While our chronic absenteeism rate remains above the state average, we are committed to sustaining and furthering these gains.

Academic Achievement: We have also seen promising gains in both ELA and Math performance:

ELA: All students improved by +8.6 points in distance from standard, with particularly notable gains among English Learners (+22.3), Socioeconomically Disadvantaged (+7.7), and Hispanic students (+13.6). Asian students saw the highest improvement (+24.7).

Math: All students improved by +7.8 points, with strong progress among English Learners (+15.3), African American students (+13.9), and Asian students (+28.6).

While Long-Term English Learners showed a decline in ELA (-4.4), their Math performance improved significantly (+29.2), which suggests the effectiveness of targeted interventions in mathematics.

On the i-Ready assessment, a median growth percentile of 100% generally means a student made more than a year's worth of growth. Students at Caliber: Beta Academy had a 116% median growth percentile in Math and 124% median growth percentile in Reading. These results indicate that the majority of students at Caliber Beta Academy are making at least one year's worth of growth in Math and Reading.

Suspension Rates: Our 2023-24 school-wide suspension rate increased to 2.1%, placing us in the Orange performance category. While this represents an increase from the prior year (0.9%), it aligns with our increased focus on predictable learning environments, resetting expectations, and strengthening our behavioral support systems. African American students saw an increase (+1.6 percentage points), which remains an area of concern that we will continue to address through improved support and interventions (Goal 2, Action 2).

Preliminary CAASPP results for the 24-25 school year demonstrate steady improvement. 29% of students were proficient in Math and 43% of students were proficient in ELA.

Younger students (K-2) demonstrated 74% at or above benchmark in foundational skills.

Areas for Continued Focus:

According to the 2024 California School Dashboard, the following groups were in the lowest performance category (Red) and will require additional support within our LCAP:

English Learners in the English Learner Progress Indicator (-2.4 decline from the prior year)

African American students in Chronic Absenteeism (though significantly improved, still higher than other groups) and Suspension Rate
Asian students in Chronic Absenteeism (though improved, remains a concern)

To address these challenges, we will enhance our behavioral support structures and family engagement strategies to further reduce suspensions and chronic absenteeism among targeted student groups. We will build on our English Learner Development program to ensure teachers are using ELD strategies in their Tier 1 instruction.

Overall, we are encouraged by the progress made in key areas and remain committed to implementing data-driven strategies to support our students and families in the coming year.

According to the 2024 Dashboard, no student groups were in the Red.

A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

Teachers: Teachers asked for a more intentional focus on supporting EL students. This influenced actions in Goal 1, where Title III and general funds are utilized to provide designated ELD instruction, and Goal 3, where whole - school professional development in reading foundations for all students and ELD strategies will be included.

Principals and School Administrators: Principals and school administrators are primarily concerned with teacher retention. New, improved salary scales for teachers are covered in Actions 1.1. Efforts to build on joyful staff climate are reflected in Action 3.1. Teacher residency funds and efforts (Action 3.3) go to roles that have been historically difficult to fill.

Other LEA Staff: All staff expressed a need for improvements in communication around student behaviors. This is encapsulated in Action 2.2.

Parents: Parents have expressed concern about academic intervention for students who are behind in reading. This influenced actions in Goal 1, where Title I and general funds will support additional intervention in phonics for early-grade students. Additionally, parents expressed concern about teacher vacancies. For this reason, among others we have ensured our teacher residency funds and efforts (Action 3.3) go to roles that have been historically difficult to fill.

Students: The LCAP includes additional actions supporting student safety and belonging, including actions 2.1 and 2.2.

Our approach includes bolstering Transitional Kindergarten and early intervention services, ensuring our youngest learners have a solid academic foundation. Additionally, we will deliver tailored support to historically marginalized groups, including English Learners, Long-Term English Learners, and Students with Disabilities, to foster improved academic outcomes. Finally, our expanded learning program will offer diverse and enriching educational experiences representing a broad course of study. The metrics and actions are grouped together as the data is aligned with measurable outcomes for these actions in the state priorities listed above.

Goal Analysis [2024-25]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

Action 1.1: Caliber: Beta Academy had a strong year of teacher retention (>90%) between 23-24 and 24-25. There were very few teacher vacancies in 2024-25 (1 in middle school).

Action 1.2: Improvements to our TK program implementation with emphasis on play-based learning

Action 1.3: Caliber made no changes to curriculum this year. High Quality Instructional Materials were in every classroom all year.

Action 1.4: Caliber maintained academic intervention all year for students with Tier 2 academic needs. There are 5.0 FTE Instructional Aides funded by Title I funds, at an average annual compensation of \$50,000. The total of Title I funds spent on Instructional Aides is \$297,842.

The remainder of actions in Action 1.4, reading interventionists, are covered by LCFF and local funds.

Action 1.5: Beta Academy offered designated ELD in the master schedule as a separate pull-out class for newcomers. Beta Academy utilizes Title III funds to support compensation for of 0.5 FTE of an EL coordinator (0.5 FTE = \$60,000). \$31,334 of Title III funds go toward this salary.

Action 1.6: Designated ELD for our long-term ELs in grades 4 and up was a separate course with a separate teacher. Integrated ELD strategies have been included in all core content classes.

Action 1.7: Caliber: Beta Academy had no vacancies in Special Education this year, and had success with case management professional development to improve services for all special education students.

Action 1.8: Caliber: Beta Academy's implementation of this action was uneven. In areas where teachers had high access and high visibility to real-time student data we saw the most improvement (for example, i-Ready Lesson passage, and some classrooms where teachers regularly reviewed proficiency through exit tickets). There are areas where we still need to increase data visibility and access, particularly at the student subgroup level (example: Curriculum-Based Assessments, where implementation gaps were in both staying on scopes and sequences, and utilizing the performance data to improve instruction).

Action 1.9: All students at Caliber: Beta Academy had coursework in Art and Physical Education.

Action 1.10: Students at Caliber: Beta Academy had access to a range of Expanded Learning Opportunities in 2024-25, including Before School Care, After School Care, Summer School, and three Intersession Camps: Around the World, Sports Camp, and STEM.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Total expenditures on Goal #1 exceeded the amount that were budgeted by roughly 10%. Expenditures exceeded budgeted amounts in virtually all actions in this goal as a result of overall cost escalation, and as a result of the availability of more funds overall. Academic intervention (instructional assistants and interventionists) was the primary area where expenditures decreased as a result of staff turnover and hiring challenges.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Based on SY24 Dashboard data, we saw improvement for ELA and Math distance from standard. ELA: All students improved by +8.6 points in distance from standard, with particularly notable gains among English Learners (+22.3), Socioeconomically Disadvantaged (+7.7). Math: All students improved by +7.8 points, with strong progress among English Learners (+15.3). According to the CA Growth model, for ELA all students (+16 points), English Learners (+16 points), LTEL (+28 points), and SED students (+14 points) exceeded typical growth and were in the Above category. For Math all students (+9 points above), English Learners (+9 points), LTEL (+18 points), and SED students (+8 points) were in the Above category for growth.

Based on SY25 middle of year iReady data, we see that following groups made a year or more of growth: for ELA K-5 all students, 6-8 all students, K-8 EL students, RFEP students, LTELs, and SWD. For math: K-5 All Students, 6-8 All Students, K-8 EL, K-8 RFEP, and K-8 SWD. LTELs were the only group to not make a year's worth or progress in Math.

This data provides evidence that the majority of students in all subgroups except LTELS are making at least a years worth of growth and indicates that our actions have been effective in improving student learning.

Our teachers have been implementing curriculum based assessments for 3-8 ELA and math, but there has been mixed implementation on data driven instruction practices and many teachers are off pace compared to their original scopes and sequences.

Based on mid-year Dibels data for K-2 students, the percentage of students at or above grade level benchmark has grown steadily over the last two years with 64% of students above grade level benchmark at mid-year.

On the whole, this data provides evidence that actions 1.4 Academic Intervention, 1.8 Data Driven Instruction, and 1.5 EL Program are being somewhat effective to effective at improving academic outcomes for students. The evidence is more mixed for 1.6 LTELs, so we will continue to monitor to ensure that our LTELs are growing and progressing.

ELOP Participation: so far there have been 380 students who have participated in an ELOP program with 84% being unduplicated students. This provides evidence that actions 1.10 Expanding Learning are being effective at providing additional learning and enrichment opportunities for our unduplicated students.

All students have been able to participate in an art, physical education, or other enrichment class, and this provides evidence for the effectiveness of action 1.9 Enrichment and Electives.

According to the 2023 CA Dashboard our African American students had an increase in suspension rates, and we hope that our actions related to SEL and PBIS will improve their suspensions rates in the future.

Attendance Improvement: We are committed to enhancing Average Daily Attendance and decreasing Chronic Absenteeism, recognizing its critical role in student engagement and academic success. According to the the 2023 CA Dashboard, our African American and Asian students struggled with chronic absenteeism and this action will be directed in improving those student groups.

Communication: We actively promote regular communication and meaningful partnerships with families, recognizing their integral role in student achievement and well-being.

Total expenditures on Goal #2 were roughly 10% below the amount that was budgeted as a result of staff turnover and hiring challenges.

According to Student Climate Surveys Fall 2024: 63% of responses were favorable which is on target for the overall goal. Similarly, according to Parent survey satisfaction from the Fall 2024 survey, 89% of parents were satisfied with Caliber Beta Academy which is on target for the overall goal.

While we saw an increase in suspension from the prior year (0.9%), it aligns with our increased focus on predictable learning environments, resetting expectations, and strengthening our behavioral support systems. Moreover, for the 2024-2025 school year so far we have seen a reduction in the number of suspensions to be closer to the baseline data.

Together this data provides evidence that the action 2.1 Promote Mental Health and 2.2 Promote positive behavior and Social Emotional Learning has been effective so far.

Our 2023-24 chronic absenteeism rate declined significantly overall, with a reduction of 13.5 percentage points across all students. Notably, reductions were seen across all student groups:

English Learners: -13.4 percentage points

Socioeconomically Disadvantaged: -14.4 percentage points

As of mid-year SY25, chronic absenteeism is continuing to decline. All students 17.7% chronically absent, English Learners 18.2% chronically absent.

Together this shows evidence that our action 2.3 Attendance Improvement has been effective so far.

Action 3.1 - Improving staff relationships and connections to our school culture through celebrations and staff recognition have supported the steady growth of our instructional culture. This action was fully implemented.

Action 3.2 - Caliber staff received weekly professional development in 24-25 with an emphasis on implementing high-quality instructional materials. Title II funds were used to support external service provision of professional development services for our Transitional Kindergarten teams and early literacy teachers, with actual expenditures for these efforts over \$40,000.

Action 3.3 - Caliber Beta Academy is proud to host two teacher residents this year.

Action 3.4 - Caliber Beta Academy maintained full-time principal (2) assistant principal (4) and instructional coach (1) roles in 2024-25 to support teacher growth and development.

The school invested significantly more in teacher and other staff recruiting and retention in 2024-25 than was originally budgeted. This was driven by the need to invest in staff development as well as the availability of grant funds to support residency efforts that were not originally included in the budget.

We saw a slight increase in our instructional culture favorability on the TNTP Insight survey at 6.8. The lower school is at the 52nd percentile and the upper school is at the 41st percentile. This would put us on track to meet our year 3 target. There has been high participation and high satisfaction with our communities of practice for instructional leadership teams, operations teams, TK teams, and Special Education teams.

Together these quantitative and qualitative measures indicate that on the whole action 3.2 Professional Development has been effective.

Curriculum selection was guided by alignment with the Common Core. In the Spring of 23-24 and again in 24-25, teacher leaders and administration worked on scope and sequences, pacing calendars, unit plans. Most of the work around standards and curriculum internalization has occurred within the coach - teacher relationship, with foundations laid during summer professional development. In addition, teachers have monthly or quarterly roll off days, when coverage is provided for the classroom and teaching teams prepare for a new unit, review upcoming standards and analyze the data from the preceding unit.

These calls are also intended to emphasize the importance of daily attendance.

Parent leaders at the school have become more involved with advocacy efforts this year and have held 2 action research meetings with local officials to advocate for the school.

Both school leaders hold monthly meetings with families on a range of topics as well as to gather feedback on current practices.

This recognition is grounded in a research base demonstrating that a positive school climate directly impacts indicators of success such as increased teacher retention, lower dropout rates, decreased incidences of violence, and higher student achievement.

In the 24-25 school year, Caliber Beta Academy administered two rounds of SEL/Culture & Climate Surveys to students in grades 4-8 in the Fall and the Spring. Our goal was to have 90% of students participate in the surveys.

Mixed results characterized our culture and climate in 24-25, as we made key improvements in our area of focus from 23-24 of school safety. At the same time, student engagement dropped significantly and was a focus in the 24-25 school year.

As a result of these results, we will continue our school safety actions, particularly around predictable learning environments. In 25-26, we are focusing on improving Tier 1 Lesson Design and Execution to enhance student engagement.

All students receive ELA, Math, Science, and Social Studies instruction. Students are also enrolled in PE, Art, Music, and/or Computer Science as electives. We utilize initial ELPAC data to plan designated ELD coursework and rosters.

In the lower school, grades K-4, students have either science or social studies on a six week cycle and an increased number of minutes for ELA and Math instruction, as well as having science and social studies embedded in our ELA curriculum. In addition students receive computer science and art on a rotating quarterly cycle.

In the upper school, grades 5-8, all students have math, science, ELA, and social studies, as well as built in time for english and math intervention. In addition, all students have a full year of PE and a semester each of Art and Music.

Students enrolled in ELD receive the same elective courses, but go to designated ELD instead of their elective 2 days per week.

Identifying high-quality computer science teachers has been a challenge, and we've explored alternatives for electives as a result.

We are able to run a number of clubs outside the school day and utilize Expanded Learning Opportunities funds to provide enrichment coursework that is more specialized and responsive to student interest.

The upper school has also expanded its Athletic Department, supporting multiple teams in 4 different sports and exposing students to college programs.
