- Teachers will provide parent reports/report cards every nine weeks with information regarding their child's progress. Student progress can be monitored throughout the quarter via Schoology.

- The school will send home brochures and digital flyers with students, post notices in school facilities and public buildings about parent workshops and meetings.
- The school will use the student handbook, school web site, signage at the school entrance, and parent orientation meetings about the School wide Title I Plan and how to get a copy upon request.

 - Parent teacher conferences will take place on a regular basis as indicated by student needs. Parent teacher conferences will be held school wide twice a year.

- Parent meetings will include parent training sessions to help parents understand how to enhance their child's education.

- Teachers will hold conferences individually with parents of children in their classrooms. Parents will also be given suggestions for coordinating school-parent efforts and explanations of homework and grading procedures.
