The Terracotta Warrior

A few weeks ago, on Valentine's Day, 8th and 9th grade Unami PEN students embarked on a field trip to the Franklin Institute where they experienced one of history's greatest archeological discoveries: the Terracotta Warriors.



Thousands of years ago, Qin Shi Huang, founder of the Qin Dynasty and the first emperor of a unified China, ordered thousands of life-size clay statues of Chinese soldiers, completed with unique facial expressions, colorful clothing, horse-drawn carriages, and weapons, to be created to accompany and protect him in the afterlife. Since the first statue discovery in 1974, four underground pits filled with the emperor's terracotta (the material used) army have been uncovered, offering a glimpse into the fascinating history of Ancient China.

At the Franklin Institute, Unami students were lucky enough to enter the museum's new Terracotta Warrior exhibit and view several of the statues as well as learn about the history of the emperor's afterlife army. Every Terracotta Warrior had a specific role in the military, such as infantry soldier or general, and the exhibit contained several of the different categories of figures, all poised for battle. This helped provide a clearer image of what Ancient China's military hierarchy looked like. I personally found the archer statues to be the most interesting due to their eye-catching action poses.

Along with this, Unami students watched a film about the background and legacy of Qin Shi Huang and his terracotta army, but the theater in which they watched it was the best part. The movie was projected onto a massive dome that covered the entire theater, allowing you to feel as if you had stepped back in time and were a part of the story. While the PEN students were allowed to visit other exhibits within the museum, the Terracotta Warriors were the true highlight of the trip and gave the students a chance to be a part of history.

Florida School Shooting

How would you feel if all normality is shattered? How would you feel if you hear a rapid series of gunshots, and start to feel the impending doom and panic that the victims of a school shooting would feel? These were the questions kids were asking themselves when Nikolas Cruz, a 19 year old high schooler, hid an AR-15 and loaded magazines in a soft case and started shooting the students in the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School. Here is how it all played out: An Uber dropped Cruz at the high school at about 2:20 pm. Then he readied his AR-15 rifle and began shooting multiple classrooms. After three minutes of this, Cruz abandoned his rifle and ran to the nearest Subway to buy a drink and blend in. Deputies reacted to the reports of an active school shooter, and the Sheriff's office warned the public to avoid the school area. After that, the school district tweeted that they would be dismissing students, when a Coconut Creek police officer detained Cruz without any incidents. The next day, Cruz came to court and confessed that he carried an AR-15 with loaded magazines.

This horrifying and downright evil event spawned what would be a national debate about restricting guns. Many are divided on the issue: some believe that the solution would be to control everything but guns, like mental health, while others are calling for stricter gun laws. Many survivors of the shooting are calling for more restrictions on guns, as right-wing conspiracy theories called the survivors "crisis actors". "The fact that some of the students at Stoneman Douglas high school are showing more maturity and political action than many of our elected officials is a testament to how disgusting and broken our political system is right now in America. "But we're trying to fix that" said David Hogg, who is a survivor and an outspoken supporter of legislation that prohibits people suffering from mental diseases from owning guns.

This intense debate has also inspired the companies offering benefits to NRA (National Rifle Association) members, to rescind their partnerships to avoid any backlash. These include the First National Bank of Omaha, Delta and United Airlines, Hertz, Metlife, and SimpliSafe. Another key point in the debate is legislation. States like California and Oregon have passed laws that control and outright ban the selling of assault rifles and employ universal background checks. In contrast, many influential politicians hold the view that gun rights should be *expanded* and defended. As time passes, we will know if the efforts of millions of students walking out to protest guns in school and the lawmakers who support and oppose gun rights will bear fruit or not.

Starman's Journey to Mars

Years ago, on October 4th, 1957, the first space probe called the Sputnik 1 was sent into space by the Soviet Union. On April 12th, 1961, a Soviet cosmonaut named Yuri Aleksevich Gagarin became the first human being to go to space as well as orbit this planet. On July 20th, 1969, two Americans, Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin, became the first people to land on the moon. Space exploration is filled with significant milestones as technology gets increasingly advanced, minds become more creative, and people take greater risks. Recently, on February 6th, 2018, Elon Musk sent the first car into space on the Falcon Heavy test flight. But first, to understand the importance of this event, one must understand who billionaire Elon Musk is.



Elon Musk was born on June 28th, 1971 in South Africa, and he also has citizenship in Canada and America. He received multiple degrees in science and economics from several colleges, but ultimately decided to pursue entrepreneurship. On the 2016 Forbes list of World's Most Powerful People, Elon was ranked 21st and is the 53rd richest person in the world with a net worth of \$20.8 billion dollars. In May 2002, Musk founded SpaceX where he is both the CEO and the lead designer; SpaceX is a space transport and aerospace manufacturing company. In 2003, he co-founded a solar powered car company known as Tesla where he is the CEO and product architect. Elon combined these two companies and its products to create an entirely new concept of sending a car to space.

SpaceX accomplished a major feat in space exploration by sending a Tesla Roadstar on the path to Mars. The rocket that the car was sent on, known as the Falcon Heavy, broke records itself as the most powerful currently working rocket in history, and it is also the fourth highest capacity rocket ever. The rocket had a height of 230 feet and a weight of 3,132,301 pounds. It carried Elon Musk's very own red commute car with a mannequin, Starman, in the driver's seat. The car successfully orbited Earth for 6 hours and according to Musk, has "exceeded Mar's orbit and kept going to the asteroid belt". The closest it will reach to Mars will be in the year 2020. Elon Musk has high hopes of finally colonizing mars, and Starman's trip may be the first step in doing so.

There are some astronomers who believe that the car may pose a danger to the space it is currently traveling through. Any small materials or pieces of paint that could have fallen off the car in the launch are now moving fast enough to possible cause damage to the things it hits. To continue, the bacteria-covered car could be a potential bio-threat to Mars. The car picked up bacteria from Earth when Musk drove it around his current residence in Los Angeles. However, it is still unknown of the effects the bacteria may have on Mars. Nevertheless, Elon Musk has completed an astonishing achievement that is sure to improve what is known about space.

Starman and the Tesla Roadstar moving through space right now marks another landmark that has been achieved in the world of space and science. It is the technological and human development and innovation that has brought these amazing successes. These people had a goal, worked hard to acquire it, and finally, made it. Elon Musk along with his teams at SpaceX and Tesla will forever be known to mankind for sending the first car to space and thus, beginning a new era of exploration in space.

Dwayne Johnson In the Jungle?

Jumanji: Welcome to The Jungle is more humorous and better produced than the first movie, Jumanji, and its digital effects – which include stampeding albino rhinos and mountain-scraping aerobatics – are far better, as one would expect. It also delivers a message, geared to teens, about overcoming their insecurities to participate fully in life, without pounding the lesson into the ground.

In a prologue set in 1996, an abandoned copy of the Jumanji game from the first film is found on a beach. A teen rejects the old carved box, preferring his video game. But he hears drums coming from the box, opens it and ...

Cut to a present-day high school where four kids have landed in detention: neurotic nerd Spencer (Alex Wolff); hunky football jock Fridge (Ser'Darius Blain); shy Brainiac Martha (Morgan Turner); and Instagram selfie queen Bethany (Madison Iseman). Left to tidy up a storage room as part of their detention, the four discover the Jumanji box, inside which is an antique video game. The original board game, it seems, has evolved. The teens select avatars and accidentally, in an instant, beam themselves into the game's jungle. Not as themselves, but as their digital alter egos.

Spencer is now Dr. Smolder Bravestone (Dwayne Johnson!), a muscle-bound adventurer (though inside he's still a worried kid). The handsome Fridge learns he is now Franklin "Moose" Finbar (Kevin Hart), a zoologist who whines a lot. Martha is now martial-artist, Ruby Roundhouse (Karen Gillan). Best of all, the self-absorbed Bethany has turned into Dr. Shelly Oberon, a paleontologist and cartographer played by Jack Black. In the film's best moments, the high school glamour girl is creeped out over having, as she puts it, "an overweight middle-aged man" as her avatar. Black earns even more laughs when his character offers a seminar on flirting to the socially awkward Martha (AKA Ruby) so she can distract a couple of bad guys while her friends execute a plan. In the universe of the game, there is also a villain: greedy explorer Van Pelt (Bobby Cannavale), who has stolen a jewel from a sacred jaguar sculpture, bringing a curse upon the world of the game. To survive all its levels and exit Jumanji, the four avatars – with the help of a stranded pilot (Nick Jonas) – must dodge Van Pelt's goons and return the jewel. But it's the characters, not only the digital magic, that makes "Welcome to the Jungle" such fun. For a high-concept Hollywood special-effects movie, that's quite a good movie.



Black Panther Movie Review




