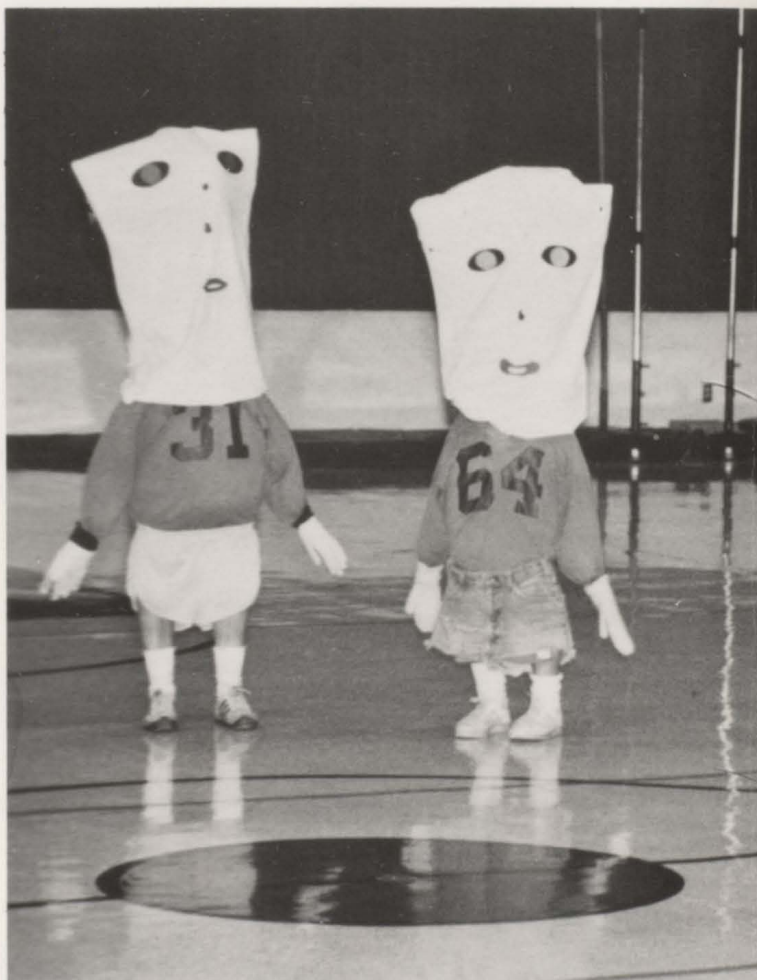

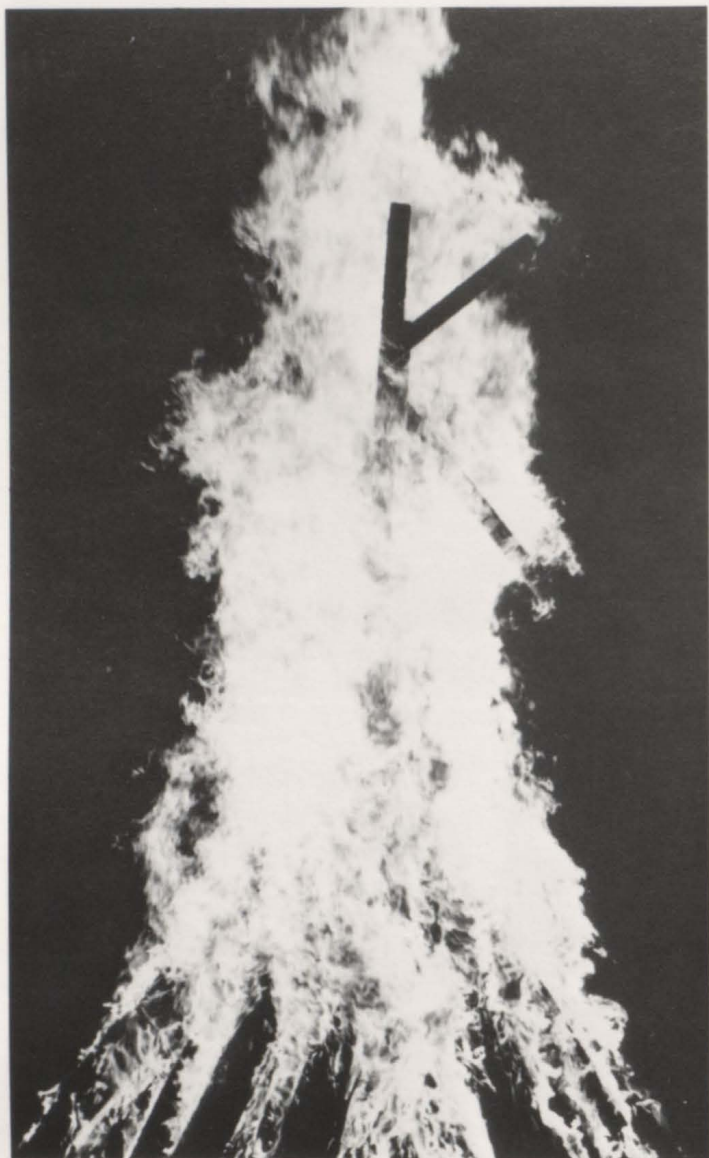

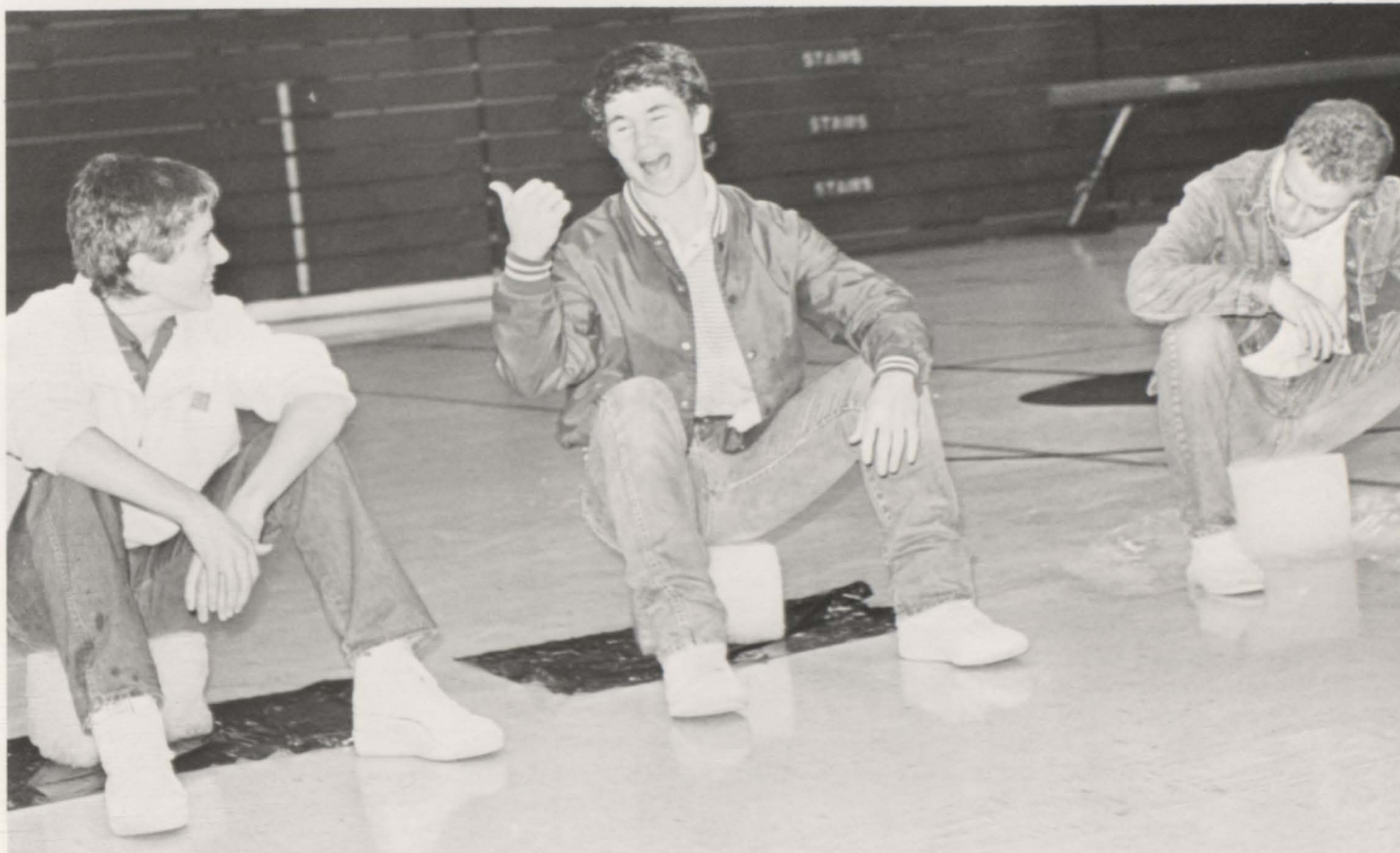

Seniors participated in sports and club activities throughout their last year at Wall High School.

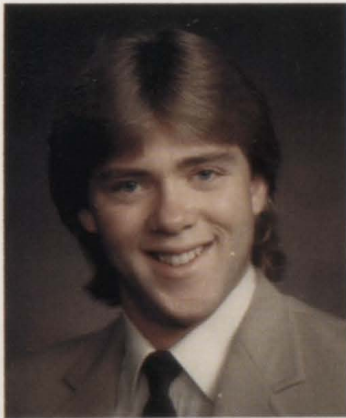

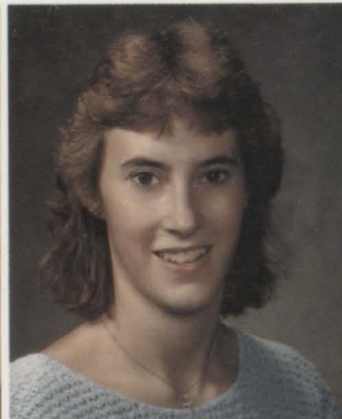

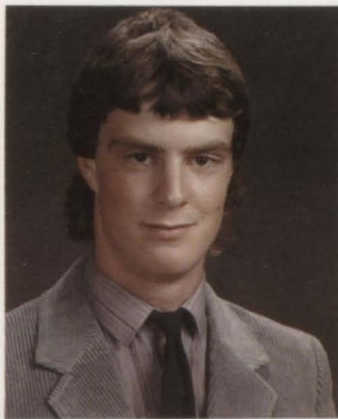




Ten seniors play football

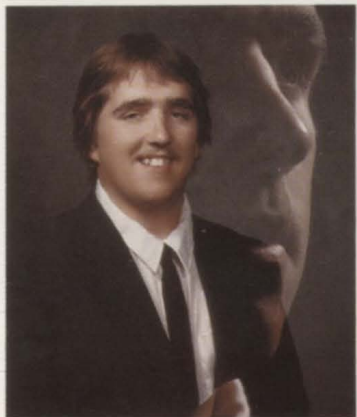

Juniors in academics; visit legislature

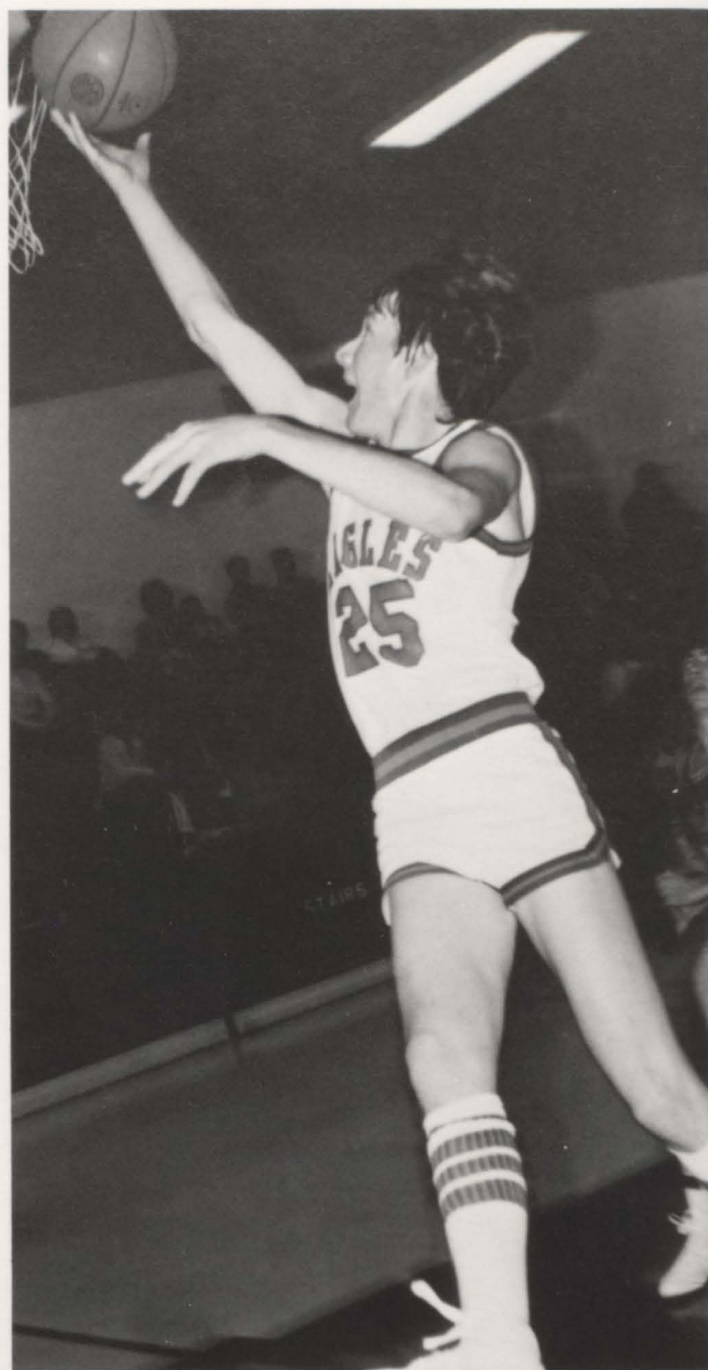

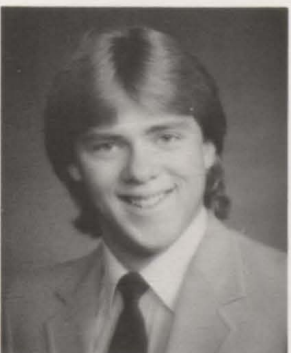
Lisa was active in Student Council, National Honor Society, student government, basketball, cheerleading, pep club and choir. She is a member of the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

Board studies task force recommendations

The Board of Education studied recommendations made by a task force. The task force consisted of three board members, the school administrators, three teachers and three community members. Recommendations included studying the country schools to see if it is cost efficient to keep them open. The study included proposed bus routes so the students could attend in Wall. However, after completing the study, the board decided to keep all country schools operating. Another recommendation was to remodel the building in Wall to provide more classrooms and work space for teachers. The board approved a recommendation to build a fence around the playground.

The board also studied class sizes in an effort to make instruction more efficient. The reduction in force included eliminating one English teacher and the elementary office aide. One administrative position was reduced to half time. The business and industrial arts positions were also reduced to parttime. Lower high school enrollment (85) was one reason for small class sizes.

English classes were revised in 1985 changing from quarter to semester classes in order to meet new state requirements. Some of the class changes were combining Indian literature and South Dakota literature into one class and yearbook and journalism into a single class. This change narrowed the classes down to three electives leaving upper classmen less freedom to choose.

Ms. Nancy Iversen said, "I feel that the change caused some problems this year because some students had the same material twice. That won't happen in the future though."

For the first time Ms. Lisa Sternhagen taught a class of freshmen. She said the age level was a new experience. Sternhagen taught a unit on poetry by regional authors and a unit dealing with regional concerns such as farming and ranching.

Ms. Connie Simon had creative writing students compose and illustrate a book for the first graders.

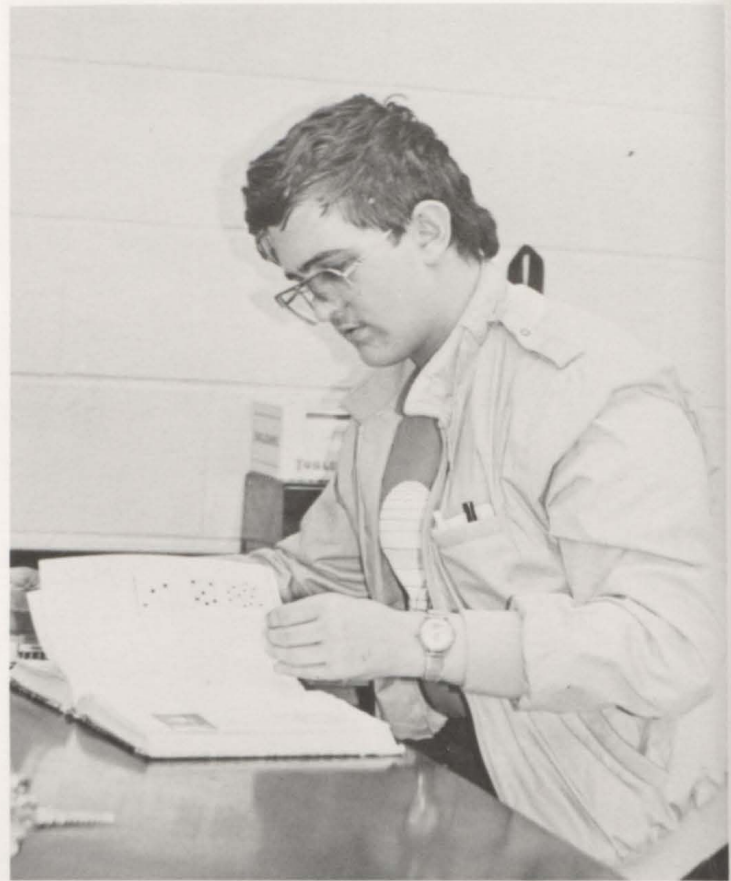

The freshman ag class started with an introduction to vocational agriculture and FFA. They studied herbicides, crop production, animal science and poultry production.

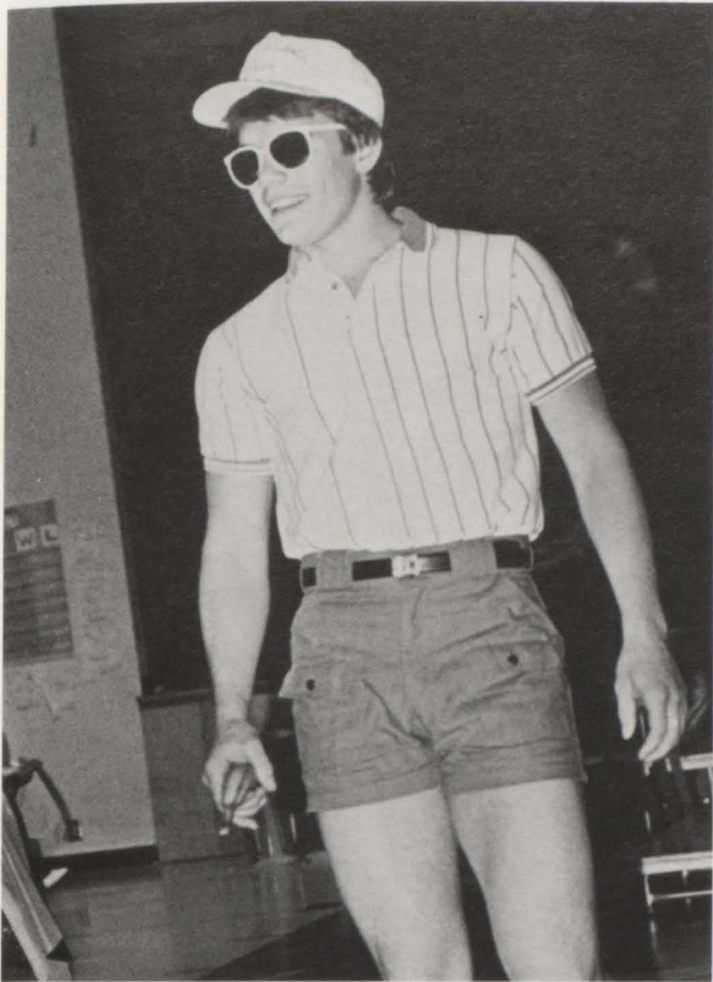

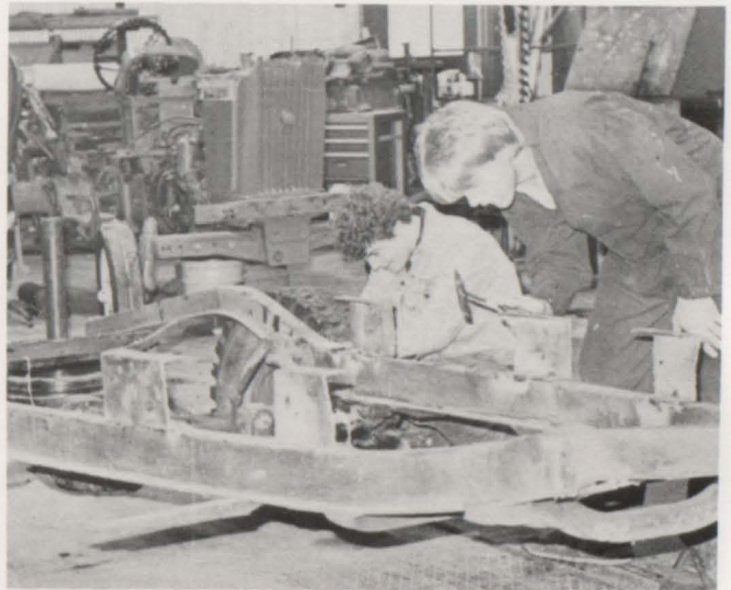

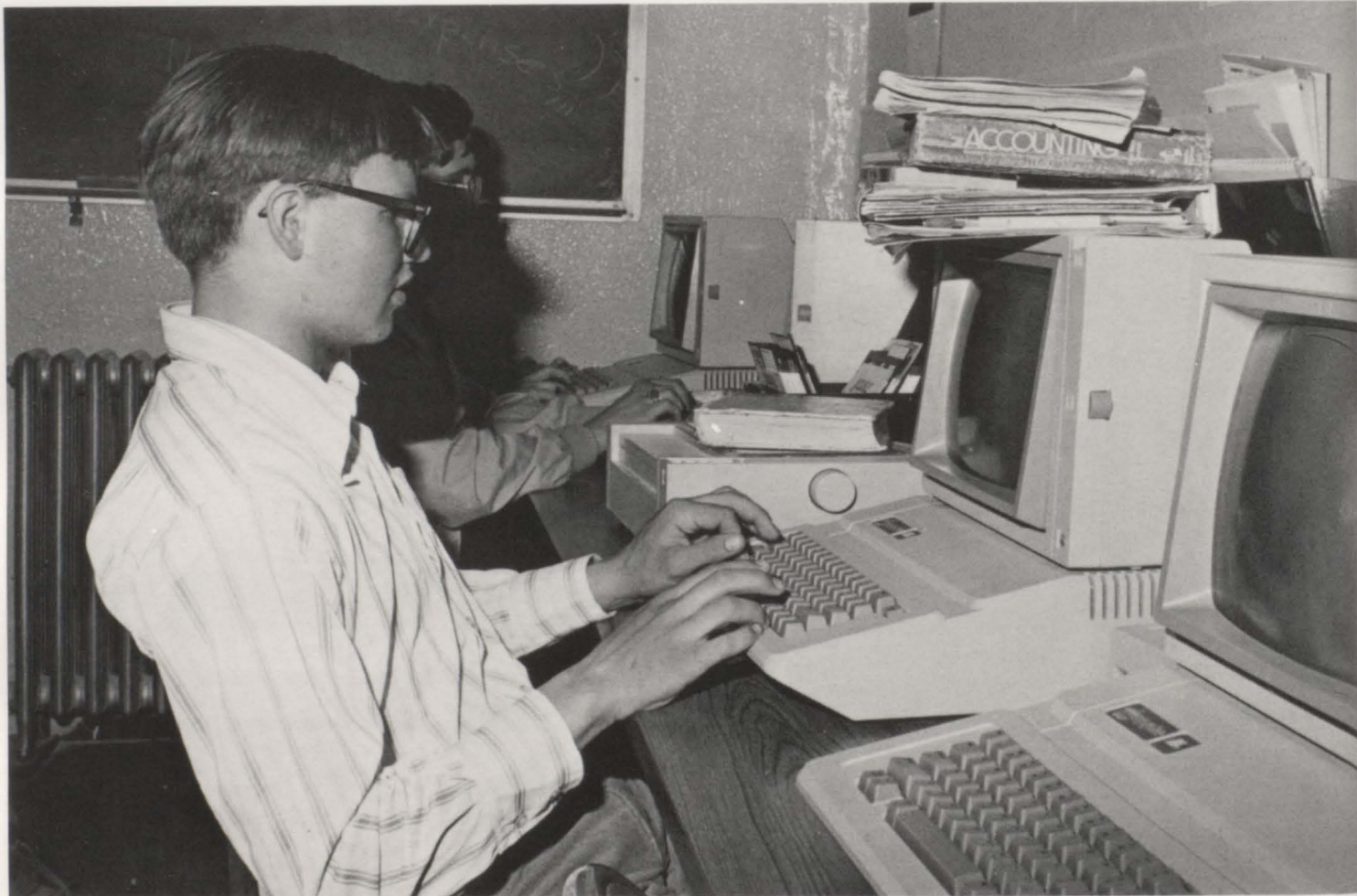

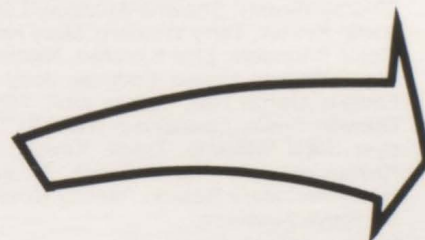

There was no yearbook class, but 24 writers in journalism wrote body copy. Using both class time and free time they conducted more interviews than before.

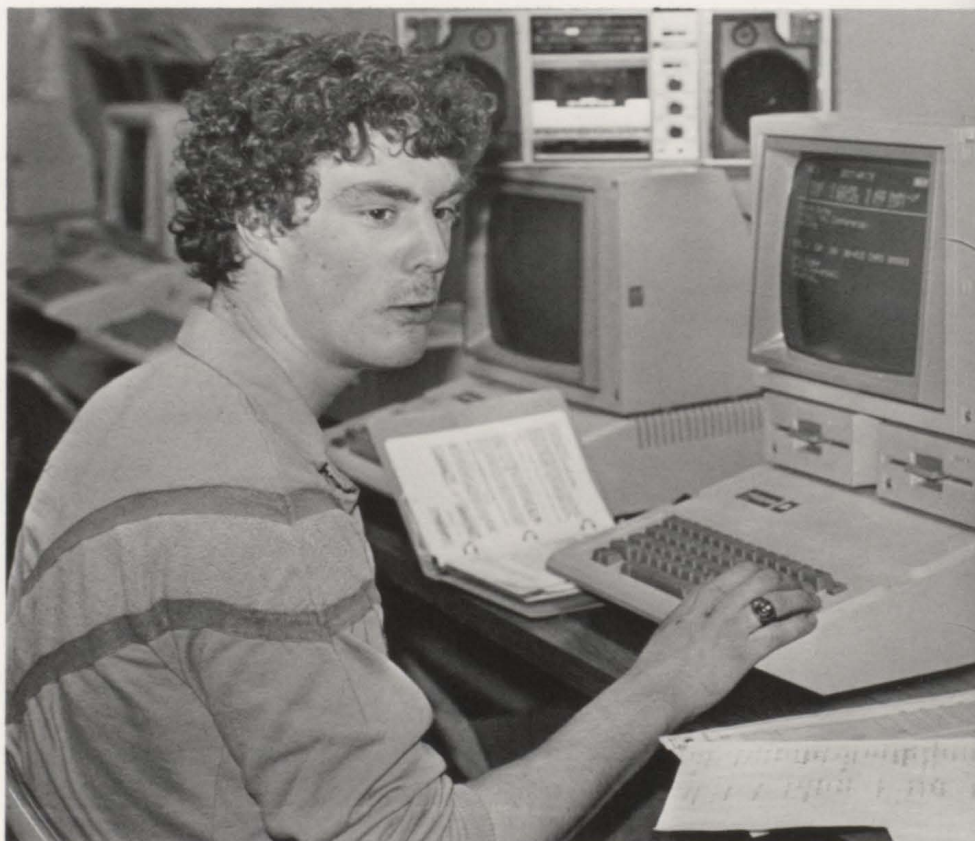

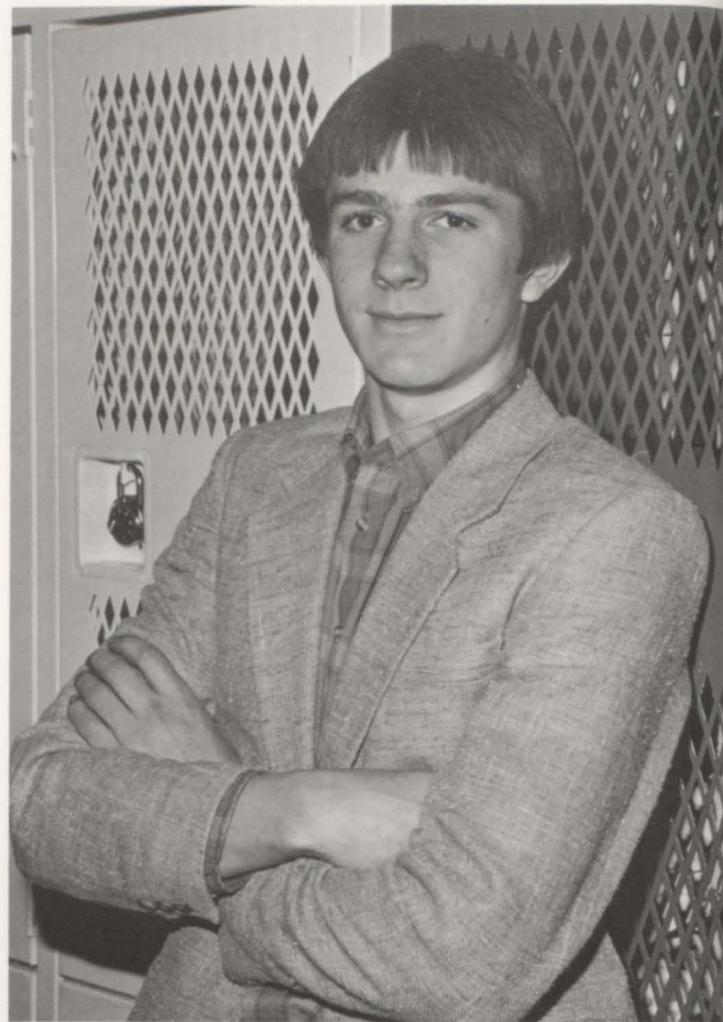
Athletes win recognition

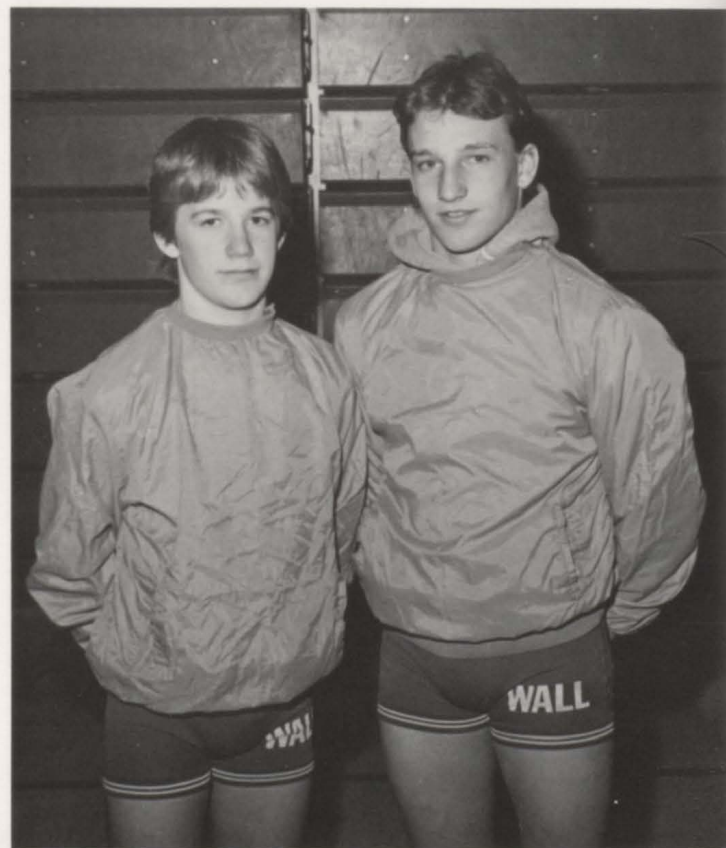

"The best times were at the State Cross Country Meet," said Coach Merlin Doyle after his team placed third.

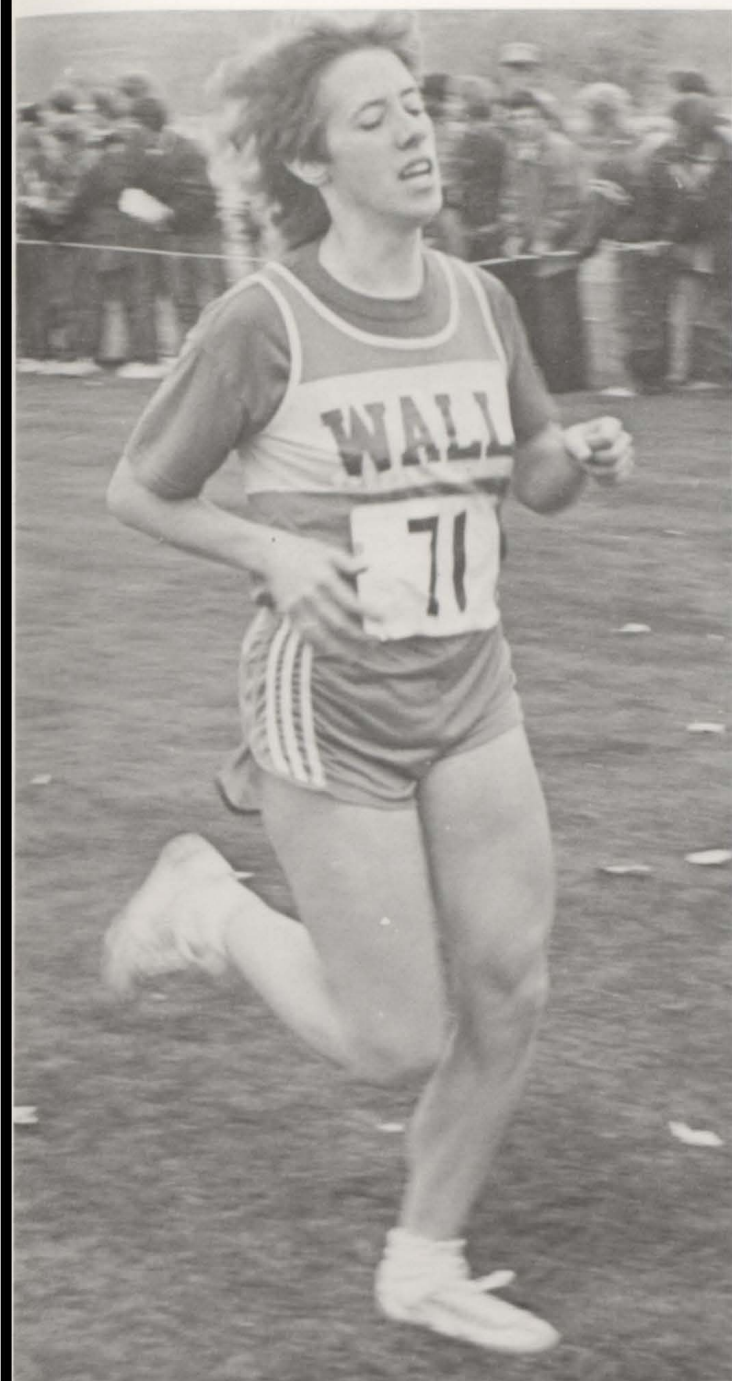
"The competition was tougher this year than it was last year," said Jana Fauske. Jana placed third in state. The cross country team placed in the top four places in all their meets.

Football team wins two

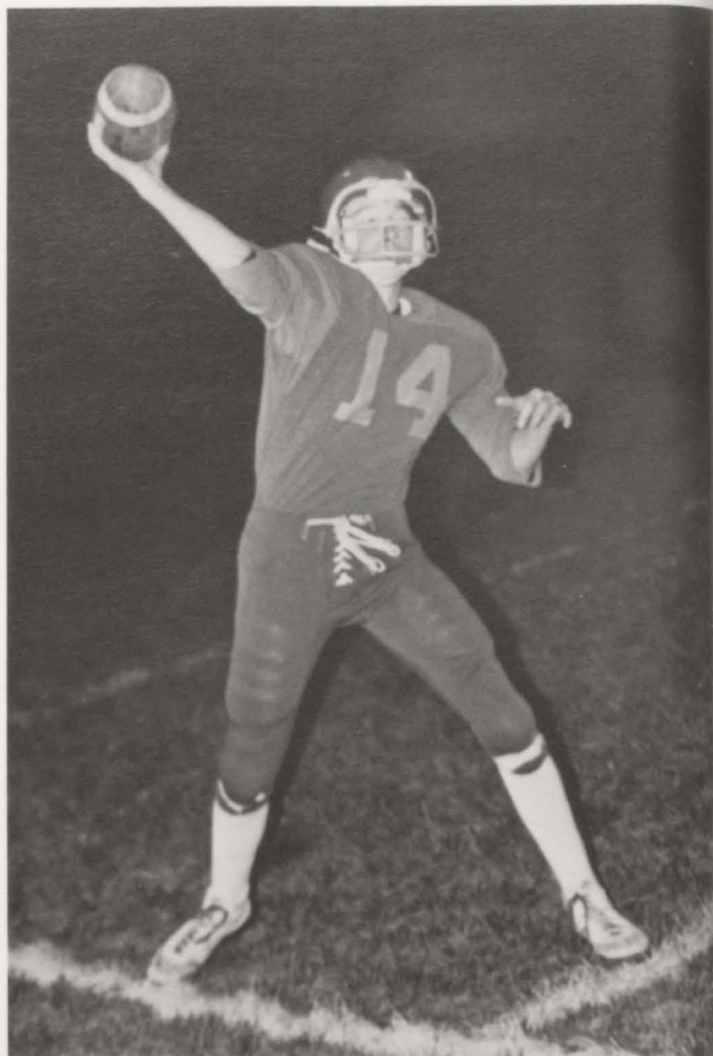

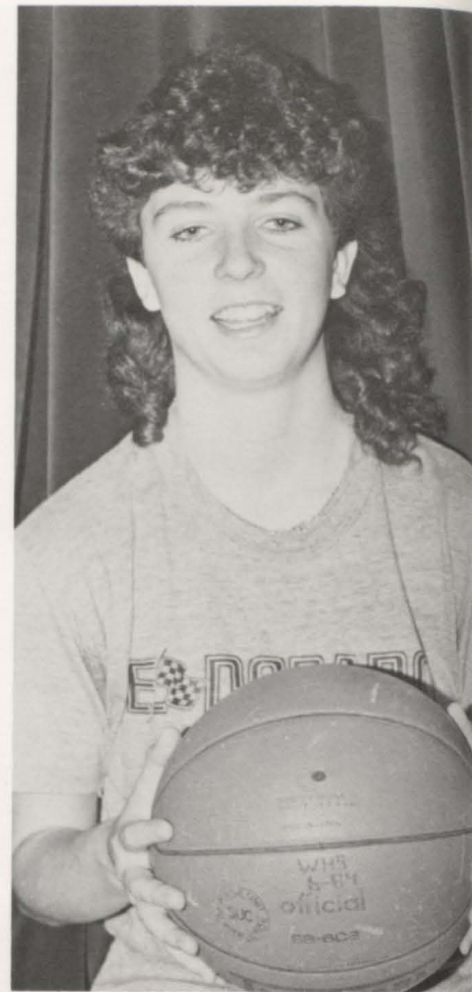
"The B team was fast and gutsy," said Jim Cudmore. The team lost only to Bennett County, Kadoka and New Underwood.

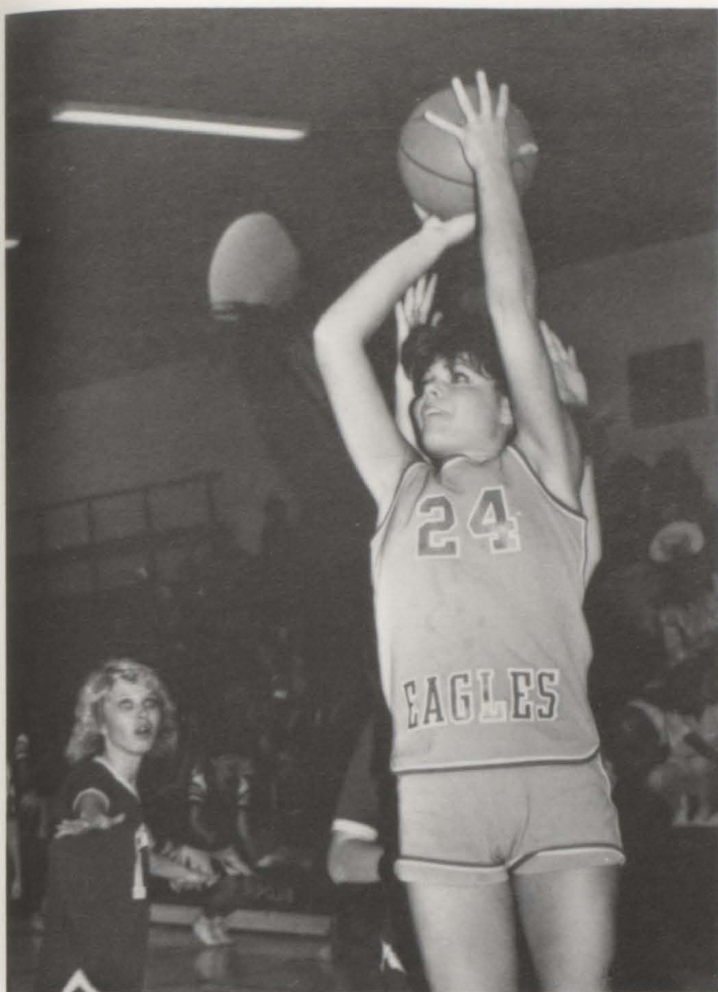

Eagles win eight; six lettermen return

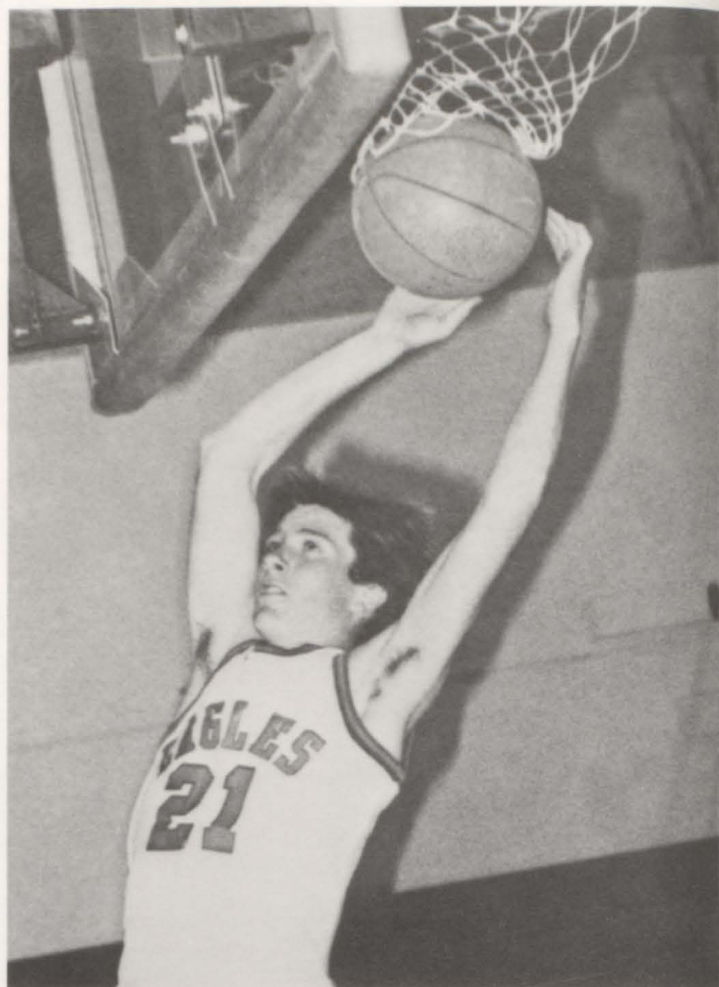

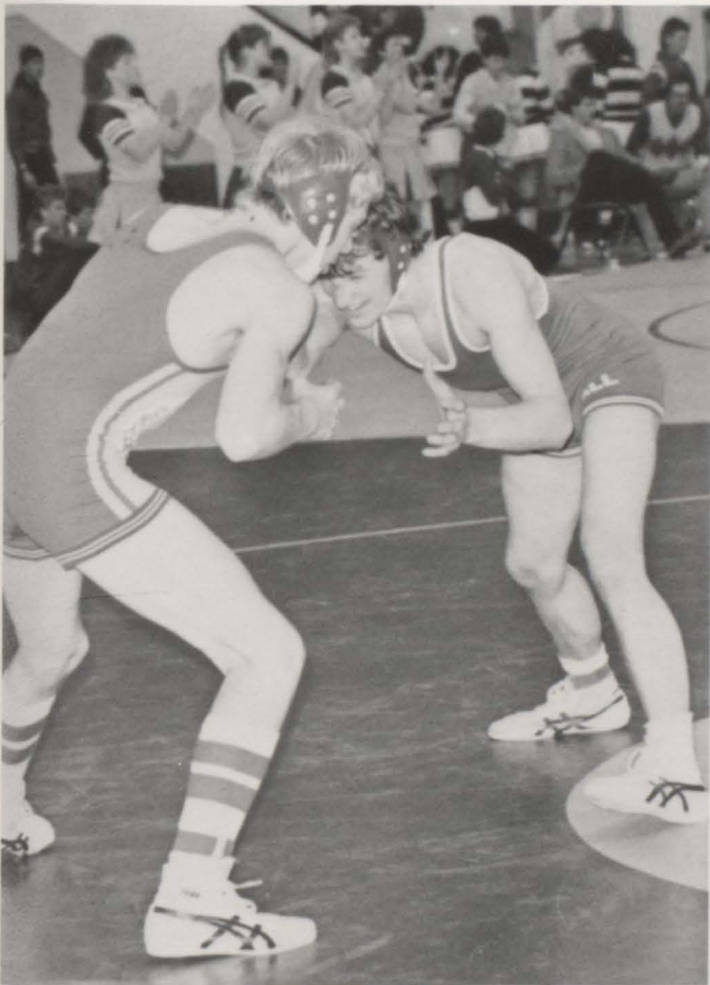

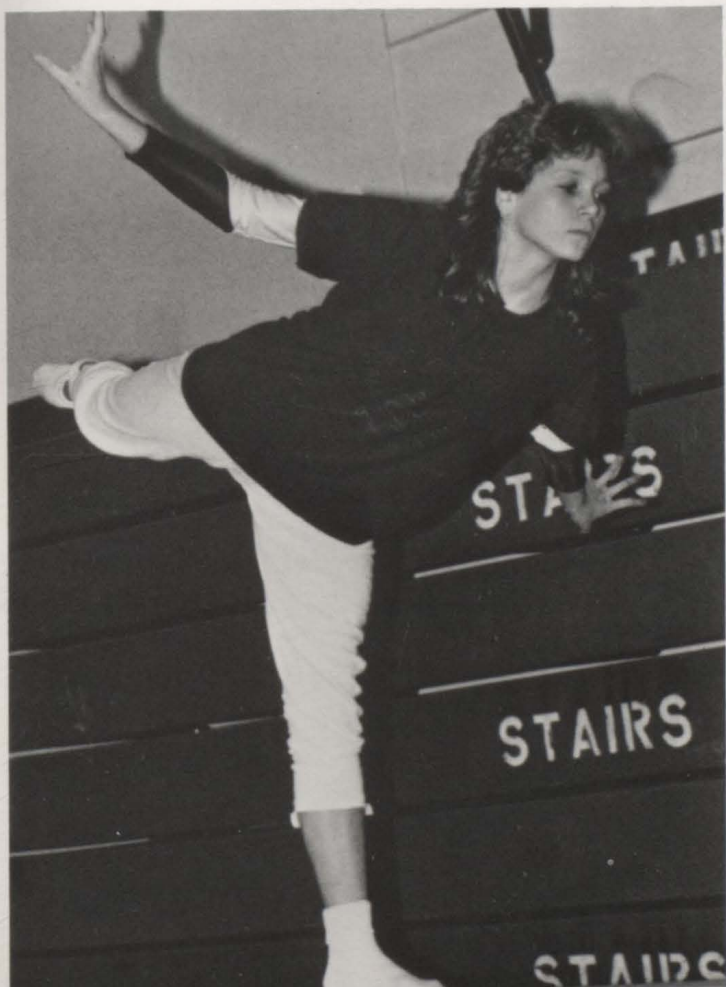

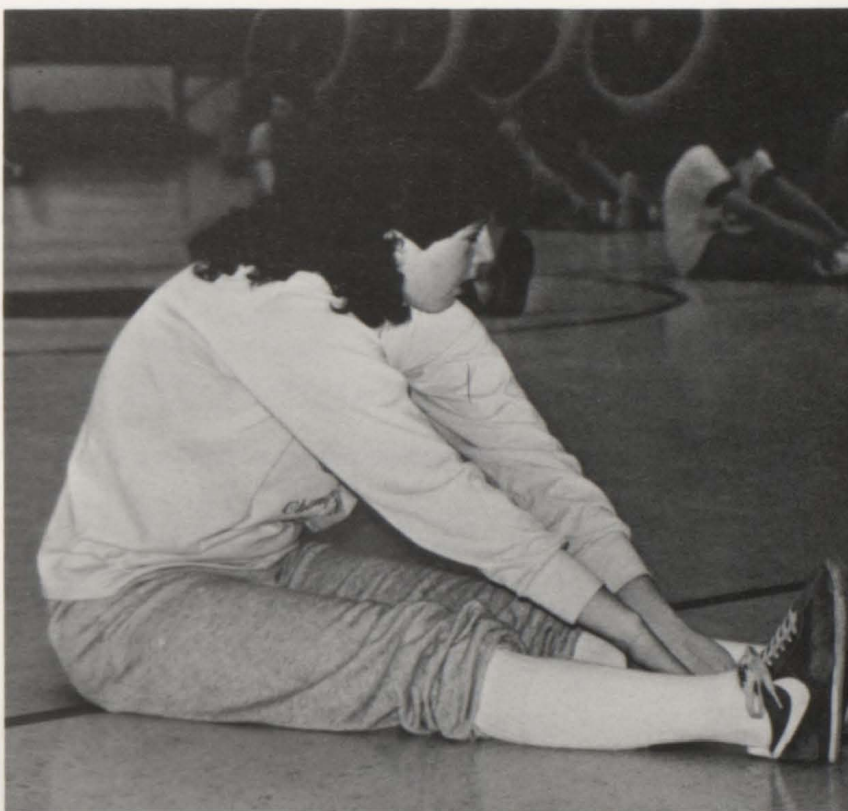

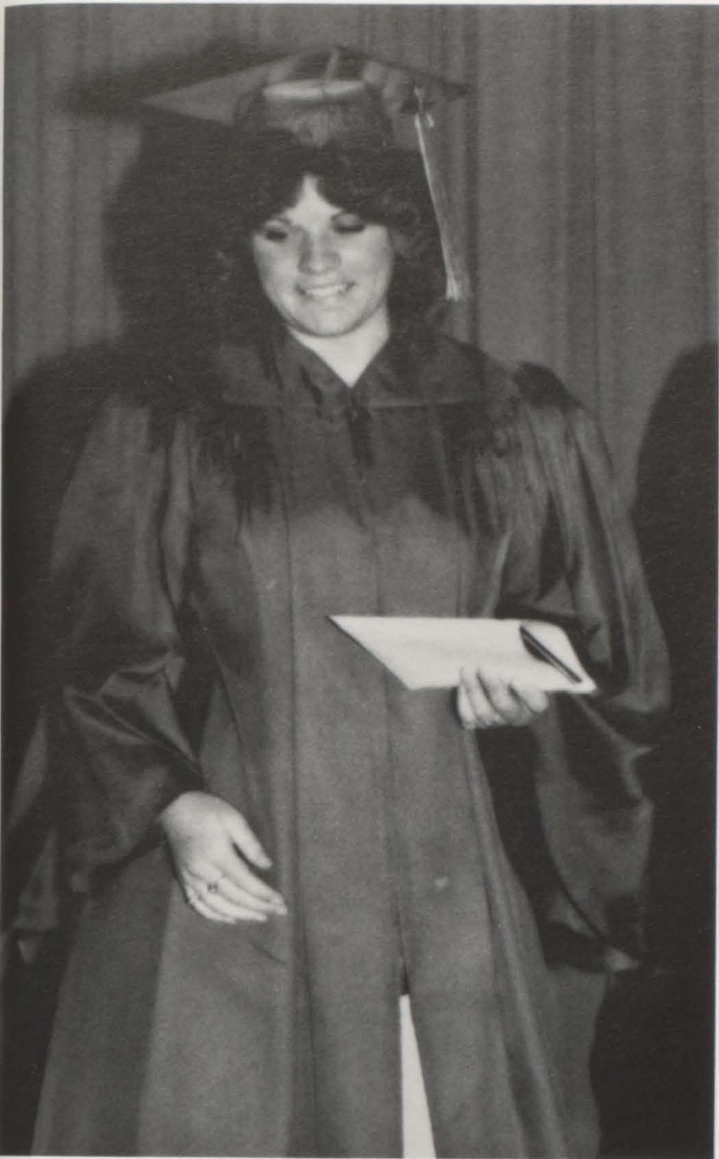

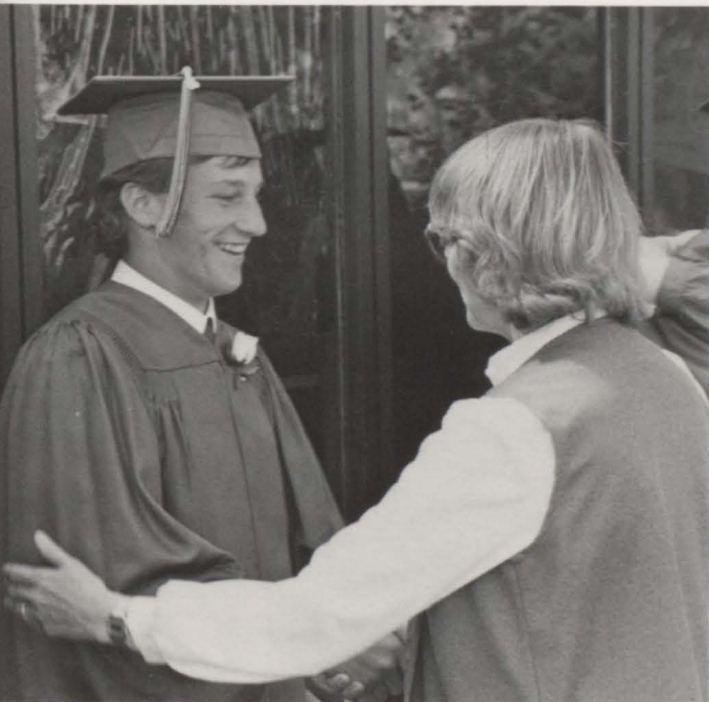

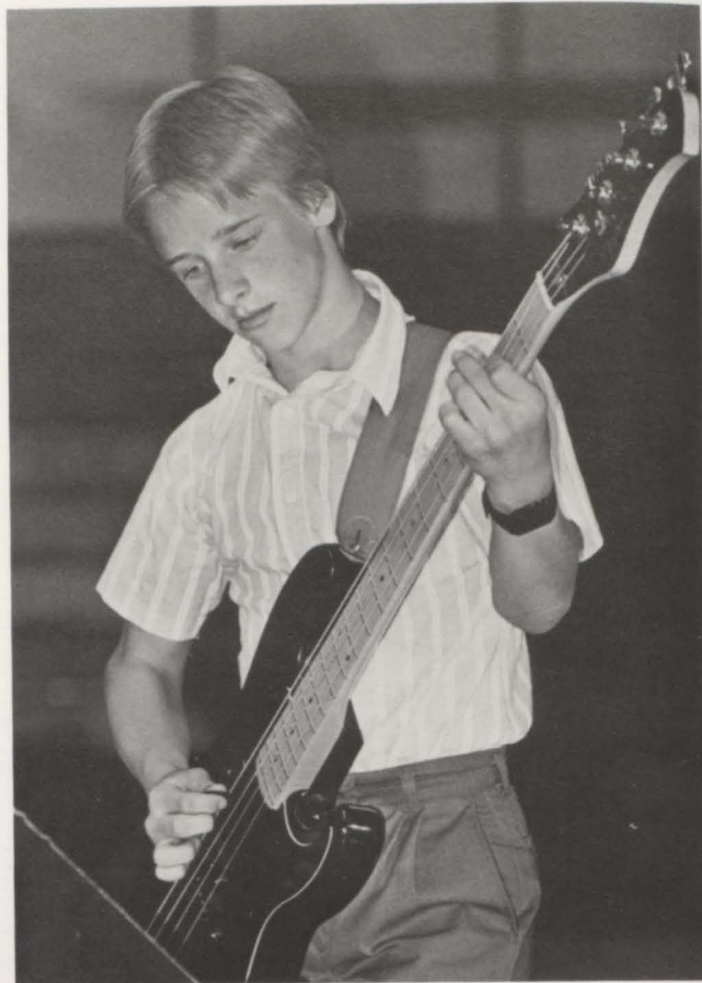

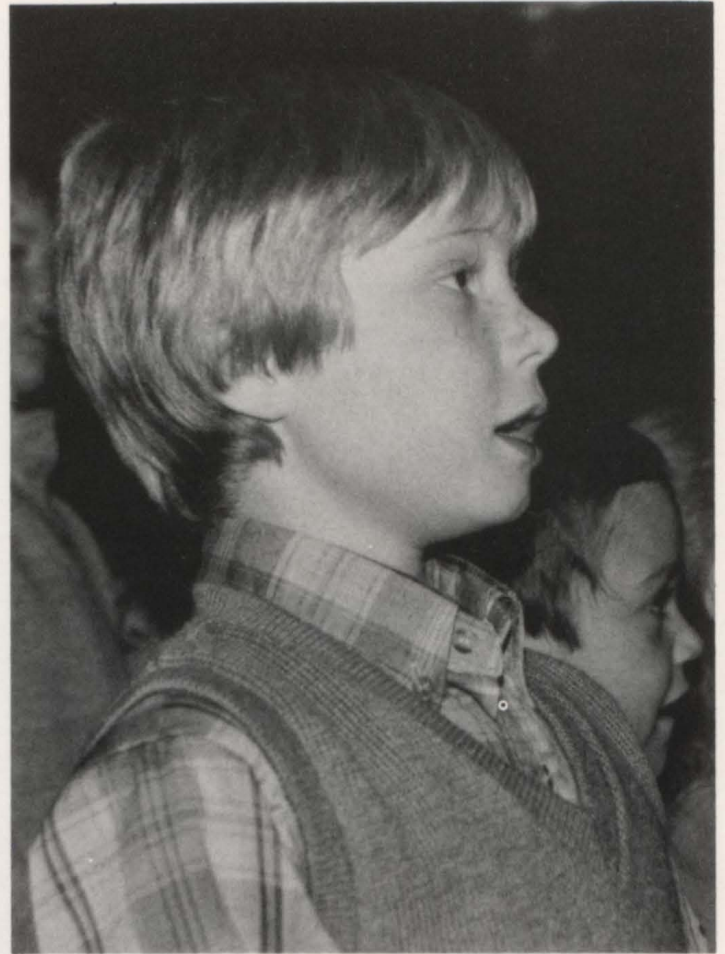

NASA Presents Assembly

Marc Horn of the Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas, gave a school assembly on Tuesday, October 22 as part of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) celebration of the space program's centennial. Explorer I was launched from the Strato-Bowl north of Rapid City on November 11, 1935. Both elementary and high school students attended the assembly to learn about exploration of the solar system, the space shuttle, and products that have been developed for the space program like ziplock bags and velcro.

Interest in the space shuttle flight that was to put Christa MacAuliffe into space was high. Fourth graders described the tragedy of Tuesday, January 28 as very sad and shocking. 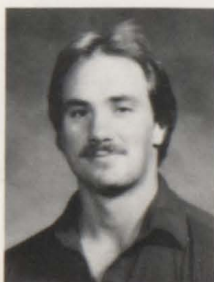

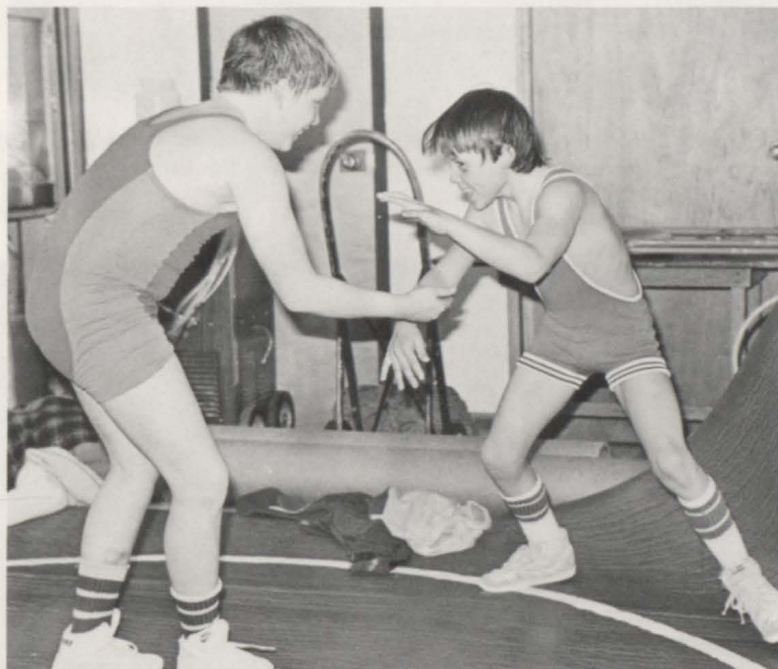

The class held a monthly party for those who followed all the assertive discipline rules. For these parties they went bowling, watched VCR's and had treats and games.

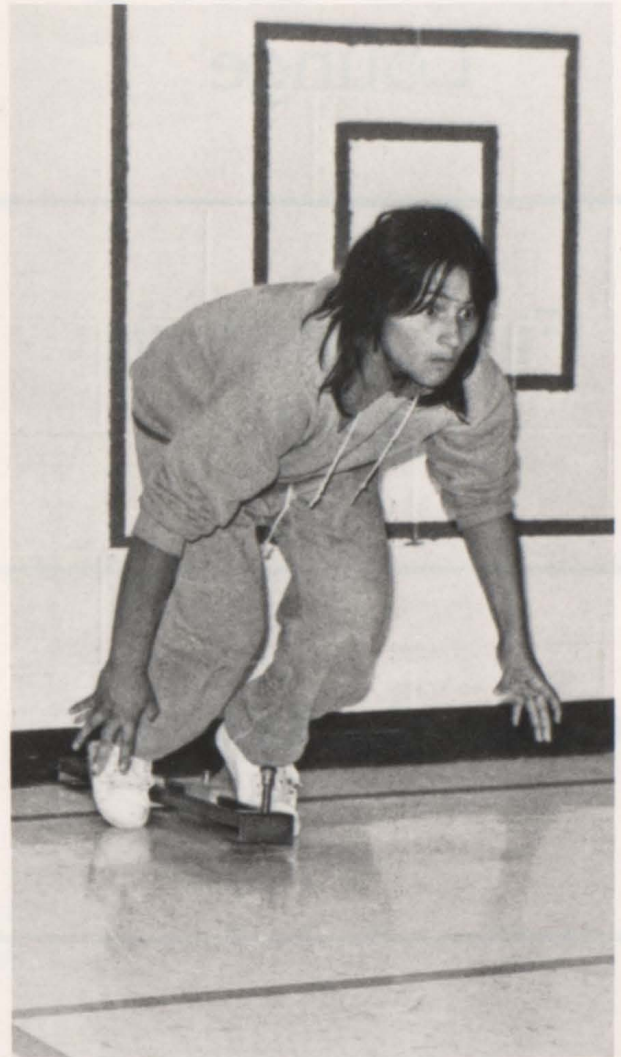
